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INTRODUCTION

This is a descriptive catalogue of 308 kaifiyats of historical importance selected from the collection of Marathi records available in this Library. These are recorded in Modi script. For the easy location of the manuscripts, a list containing the descriptive number assigned to each record and the number of the volume in which the record is available, has been provided. The Alphabetical Index and the index showing the subject-matter of each record are already published. The condition and the extent of the record with a brief contents and the name of the author and a few lines in the beginning and colophon are some of the important features of this catalogue. Most of the records in this volume describe the origin and the history of the Maratha Rulers and the Peshwas, and some of the historic families and personalities who contributed to the formation and the growth of the Maratha Confederation. The graphic description of the wars and sieges, the success and the reverses and the results and the influence of the above on persons and places are illustrated in some of the kaifiyats. A few kaifiyats describe the pilgrim centres and places of importances. The following few kaifiyats which contain historic importances, are given below :—

This relates to the history of the principality of Anegondi, situated on the northern bank of the Thungabhadra and close to the present village of Humpi in Bellary district.

It is stated that the Kaiḷiyat was copied from a transcription of a stone inscription recorded on the walls of Sri Virūpākṣha Svami Temple at Humpi and owned by an aged gentleman named Rāmaya of Harpanahalli. This place is a taluk in Bellary district. The date of the episode, or the date of the inscription or that of the scribe has not been recorded.

Rashidulla Khan, the deputy to the Bahdur Sha of Delhi besieged the fortress of Anegondi for a long time. Finding that it was impossible to take the fortress by storm, resorted to foul means, approached and succeeded in purchasing the help of the prime minister (?) [two Muslim generals of Vijayanagara] to the then Raja of Anegondi at a great cost. The prime ministers agreed to surrender the forces and betray the Raja himself if circumstances permitted. When this information

leaked out, certain patriotic and well wishers of Anegondi represented the facts to the Raja and offered their assistance against the Khan and the prime minister. The Raja accepted their offer and Rashdulla Khan was defeated. The prime minister also was punished for his treacherous conduct. Remarks—On the left hand corner of the upper part of the 1st folio, it has been recorded, that this was translated on the 18th March 1807 and was despatched to Mysore. The name of the place is spelt differently in the following Kaifiyats but it refers to Anegondi only.

Since Colonel Mackenzie was not able to procure the manuscript from the owner, he sent word for the same through some of the military officers to the palace of the Nawab, where the copy of the Kaifiyat existed. As the folios are not correctly arranged and bound, some difficulty is felt in reading the Kaifiyat. The Kaifiyat begins on folio 20 and continues up to folios 22 and 23. The date of the transcription or the name of the scribe is not mentioned.

This volume contains 778 pages wherein a number of Kaifiyats in Tamil, Telugu, Kanada, Malayalam and Marathi are transcribed from the original manuscripts, as per the orders of the Reverend W. Taylor. Regarding the Marathi Kaifiyats it is stated that they were transcribed by one Venkata Rao, a Munshi employed by the Rev. W. Taylor. A large number of words are mis-spelt and the writing illegible. The content is the same as described in D. Nos. 1, 2 and 13. The latter part provides some information regarding the sovereignty of Hyder and Tippu Sultan.

An incomplete but a very old collection recorded on Indian hand made paper (mended and rebound) describing an account of the conquest and loss of Anigondi Samastanam belonging to Rama Deva Raya, son-in-law of Krishnā Deva Raya of Vijayanar dynasty by the Moguls of upper India.

The first part of the narration describes the circumstances under which Krishna Deva Raya was cursed by a sage for offending him. Second part describes the reasons for Rama Deva Raya punishing a Muslim Saint for polluting the waters of certain tanks in the State. In the last part it is stated that to revenge the insult to the Muslim Faquer, the three Sultans, namely, Ali Adil Shah, Ibrahim Qutb Shah and Huzsain Nizam Shah with their united forces attacked the Anegondi State and finally succeeded in slaying Rama Deva Raya. The local geography of the Anegondi State and the spot where the battle took place between the Shahs and the Raja have also been described. The battle is said to have taken place on the banks of the Krishna.

This is an incomplete narration recorded on hand-made country paper relating to the origin and the history of the temple dedicated to Sri Harahadēsvara Svami, situated near Arcot. It has been stated that Pandavas, spent the period of their exile on the banks of the Pinakce. (Pinākinī or South Peṅṅar as it is called locally). It is stated that they consecrated and worshipped the God Harahadesvara Svami and received his blessings. The caves wherein the Pandavas lived and the cooking utensils used by them and some other relics are said to exist there even now. The leaf containing the name of the Hindu Raja who granted extensive endowments for the upkeep of and worship in the temple is much injured and so it cannot be made out. The date and the name of the scribe not recorded.

Begins on folio 32 (a) of the Volume described under D. No. 1.

This paper seems to be a detached portion of a big volume. Since the Kaifiyat begins only from the 9th page, it has to be concluded that the first 8 pages are wanting in the beginning and this MS. is also incomplete in the end. Date of the transcription, the name of the scribe or the source of information for recording this has not been mentioned. Asuphjaha is one of the surnames of Nizam-ul-Moolk. Though the paper entitled "Asuphjaha Kaifiyat" it contains nearly 9 sections each describing the historic events that occurred in the latter half of the 18th Century, when the Moguls, the Nawabs and the Marathās were the rulers of this country. The various chivalrous acts of Nizam-ul-Moolk in his young age, his march against (Aurangazib) *Almijeer* Bahadur of Delhi, his conquests in the south and his ability in administering justice, and his campaigns for territorial expansions have been very graphically described. The names of the various officers, civil and military, and the districts controlled by them are mentioned. A long list is given of the names of the persons who competed for the throne at

Burdhanpur in *Hijeri* 1155 after his death. On the 40th folio it is stated that *Asupjah* became an ally of the Marathas and fought several campaigns in the north. On the 42nd folio the name of Monsieur *Bussy*, the interference of the French in the local affairs of the Indian Rajas, the battles at Corikode and Vorangal in which the French sided with the *Mughals* are described. In the fifth section of this *Kaifiyat* the second Carnatic war or the dispute about the succession to the throne of Hyderabad between Nazarjung and Muzafarjung has been very graphically described mentioning the names of the persons, both French and Indian Rulers who sided with other party. The *Seige* of Arcot, the defeat and flight of Anwar-ud-din Khan in the battle of Ambur, the *intervention* of the English, the annexation of territories both by the English and the French and the conclusion of this war of succession in the Carnatic are narrated. In the last few pages; that is from the 47th to the 110th folios, the battle of Savanoor, the causes and its results are explained.

The breaking of hostilities between the English and the French at home and its influence in India, the inefficiency of Bussy and Lally and their recall to France under the orders of the *company*, the help rendered by the Holkar of Indoor, the death of *Visvusa Rao* and *Nana Fudnis*, the accession of Madava Rao as Pishwa and the collection of chouth in the Carnatic, and the part played by the Holkar and the intrigues at the Courts of the Marathas in the west and the brief history of the *Nawabs* of the Carnatic have also been very graphically described.

This Kaifiyat begins on the 59th folio of this volume. The handwriting is fair and legible. The folios are in damaged condition. The first page contains a prayer to Sri Ganesha. Though the first 8 pages are missing the origin and the history of Fort Ahamad Nagar is complete. The Kaifiyat in the beginning explains that this great city was a small hamlet during the rule of Ramadeva Raya. The topography of this place is explained. The next four folios describe the defeat and death of Ramadeva Raya by Ahamad Nizam Sha. The rule of the Naick King and the condition of the State is very graphically described. This small hamlet was said to be known by different names by different people. It is stated that Ahamad Sha directed to construct a fort in the vicinity of this hamlet and called it after his father's name. The history of this illustrious fort during the invasion of the Moghuls, Marathas and the English respectively is very elaborately and graphically described. The Kaifiyat describes dynasty after dynasty who ruled at Ahamadnagar. The episodes about the sieges, wars, victories and defeat relating to this fort are explained. The list showing the names of the important Hindu and Moghul officers who resided in this fort and the names of the gateways, rooms, palaces, and other buildings that remained in the fort are described. The Kaifiyat ends by explaining how the English succeeded in defeating the Marathas and annexing the fort to their territories. The name of the author or the sources of information for recording this Kaifiyat is not mentioned. It is stated that this work was transcribed on the 28th December 1805 and was despatched to Col. Mackenzie.

There is neither a separate heading nor an end to this record. A short description of the topography of Ahamad Nagar and its environments, and the temples, shrines and masjids is given. The author of this record states that he was not able to get any information about the origin and the history of this place. Since the Kaifiyat is not complete, it is not possible either to state the name of the author or the date of the author.

This Kaifiyat begins on the 20th page of this volume. Though the pages of this volume are not correctly numbered and bound, the Kaifiyat mentioned here is a complete one where the birth and the history of Ahamed Sha Hasan Gangu Bamin, the founder of the Bamani dynasty. The first few pages describe the parentage and childhood of Bamani. The Kaifiyat explains how the dynasty was called as "Bamani Dynasty." The next few pages describe the territorial expansions and the successful campaigns that Ahamadsha fought with the Bijapur Sultans and other Hindu rulers. The last page describes the administration of Ahamadsha. The dates for certain episodes are given in Hijiri. Neither the name of the author nor the sources of information obtained for recording this Kaifiyat. is given

Begins on the first folio of Vol. 39. This is a thin mended and bound volume consisting of 18 folios of quarter size hand-made paper written with indelible ink and in extreme condition of decay. The entire volume describes the history of the origin of Arcot and its founders.

The episode seems to have been copied from the original by different persons. The names of the scribes the source of information obtained for recording the Kaifiyat and the date on which it was transcribed are not mentioned. Certain portions in some of the folios have been so badly damaged that their contents could not be made out.

In the first folio the location of the village (Arcot) and its geographical descriptions have been narrated. A legend illustrating how a saint blessed a Muslim boy and how he became the Sultan has been very graphically described. The ancestry of Tamurlane and how he became the Badusha of Delhi and the successive ascendancy by Babur, Humayun, Akbar, Shahjahan and Aurangzeb have been stated. It has been recorded that during the Mogul rule Arcot was also included in the Mogul Empire. Fall of the Vijayanagar and the Mogul Empires and the rise of the Marathas have been very graphically described. The rise and fall of the Bijapur Sultans and the decline of the Maratha confederacy and the causes of the first Carnatic war, the part played by the Marathas under the leadership of Rajarao and Murrar Rao his occupation of Arcot and Jinji have also been recorded. In the last three folios the part played by the English and the French in assisting the Nawab of Arcot and Nizam of Hyderabad and the final victory of Lord Clive and how Arcot was annexed to the East India Company has been described. The dates in Hijiri Era have been provided for all the important occurrences, throughout the Kaifiyat.

This Kaifiyat begins on folio 9 and relates to the history of the origin of two Temples, one dedicated to Narshimaswami, and the other to the Goddess Durga. It has been stated that these two temples were constructed by Kapila Rishi on the uma parvathas. This Kaifiyat further describes, that a Mutt was constructed by one Satyananda Saraswati (a disciple of Sri Sankaracharia Swami) and gives the particulars regarding the endowments granted to the maintenance of the Mutt and for carrying on the worship of the above said two Temples. It has been recorded that the endowments were confiscated by Tippu and by the efforts of certain people the same were revived in the days of the East India Company.

Though the Kaifiyat has been recorded in a neat hand on English-made paper, some difficulty is felt in studying it, since the folios are not properly arranged and bound. The name of the scribe and the sources of information obtained for recording the Kaifiyat have not been mentioned. In the beginning of this, it has been stated that this Kaiñiyat was recorded on the 13th day of Chitrai month in Akśya year.

Certain legends explaining the powers of the sacred waters in certain tanks have been graphically described. It has been stated that this place is situated in the Mysore State. In the latter part of the Kaifiyat, certain caves have been described and it has been recorded that the Pandavas lived in these caves during their period of exile. This place became an important town during the reign of Hyder and Tippu Sultan and the existing fort was said to have been constructed by Hyder Ali Khan. The name of the author and the sources of information obtained for recording this Kaifiyat are not mentioned.

This big volume contains 727 folios wherein a number of Kaifiyats and other historic records in Tamil, Telugu, Malayalam, Kanarese and in Marathi are transcribed from the original manuscripts records as per the instructions of Mr. Teylor. The first Kaifiyat in Marathi recorded in Modi script appears on folio 665. Though the hand-writing is neat and legible, the entire Kaifiyat contains a large number of words badly spelt and with incorrect punctuations.

On the top of the folio No. 665, it has been recorded that this is 3rd Kaifiyat in a big manuscript volume bearing No. 20. In concluding the Kaifiyat it has been stated that this was transcribed from an original manuscript record preserved in one of the Masjids at Ahmadnagar by Annanda Rao on the 11th May 1806.

In the first few pages, the names of the various Mogul rulers who ruled Ajmir are mentioned. In the second part of the Kaifiyat a brief account of the Marata chieftains and Peshwas, such as Nana Fadnavis and other prominent persons is given. Some information regarding their marches, conflicts and wars with the Moguls at Ajmir has also been described.

In the end of the Kaifiyat, it has been stated that this was transcribed from the original by a clerk named Sunder Rao.

Regarding the origin of this village it has been gathered that by the efforts of Varadaraja Pandarathar, zamindar of Kandarsikottai, this town came into existence. The names of the successors of the founder and the temples and tanks in the Paliput have also been described. In the end it has been stated that this information was obtained from certain old palm leaf records possessed by a member of the poligar family, residing in the same village. The name of the scribe is not mentioned.

This kaiḥiyat describes the origin and the history of a village named Kapistalam and the temple dedicated to Sri Gajendra Varada Rāja Swāmi. It has been stated that this was the place where the divine elephant Gajendra received the blessings of Vishnu and afterwards this

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temple was worshipped by Sri Rama and Nala Raja. The improvements and the additional constructions and the stone inscriptions in the temple were said to have been carried out by Rajendra Chola. The names of the tanks and the surroundings of Kapistalam have also been described. In the beginning of this Kaifiyat, it has been recorded in English, that the information for preparing this Kaifiyat was obtained on the 30th March 1818 from certain old palm-leaf manuscripts possessed by the temple authorities and some information from the stone inscriptions recorded on the walls of the temple. The name of the scribe has not been mentioned.

This describes the origin and the history of a village named Kapistalam in the Tiruvair taluk, Tanjore district. The legends and mythology relating to the sacredness and the powers of Sri Gajendra Varadaswami has been narrated. It has been stated that this Kaifiyat was prepared from the information obtained from the stone inscriptions of the above-said temple. The improvements and further additional construction of buildings attached to the temple and the tanks were said to have been carried out by Raja Raja the Great. The Kaifiyat further describes the local history of the village and certain other temples and the above stated facts were said to have been gathered from the aged persons employed in the temple.

This volume contains 170 folios of various sizes and some of them are French papers and the rest recorded on country made papers. This seems to be a collection of Kaifiyats transcribed by different scribes. The Kaifiyat of Kamarali Khan begins on folio 79, and since the ink has faded away, certain interesting portions are beyond the scope of deciphering.

The first four pages describes the various Sultans of Kutub Shail dynasty who ruled at Delhi. Their travels and the marches, certain chief events during their regime and the names of their ministers have been mentioned. In the last three folios, the travells made by certain Sultan (whose name has been damaged) describes his visits to the Court of Nana Fadnavis and Sawaye Mahadeva Rao. In concluding the Kaifiyat it has been stated that this was transcribed by Annand Rao as per the directions of Cat. Mackenzie on the 11th May 1805. A large number of overwriting and striking has been found throughout the Kaifiyat.

Though the date on which this Kaifiyat was recorded has not been mentioned, the signature of the person who transcribed this has been noted in the end.

The subject-matter of this Kaifiyat deals with the origin and the history of a family who migrated from Mysore to Anegonde, and then became the virtual rulers of the principality itself. The hardships they underwent during their efforts in founding the principality and such other superfluous matters of less importance have been very elaborately described.

This Kaifiyat begins on folio 118 and has been recorded on quarter size hand-made country paper and the subject-matter has been described in Kannada language recorded in Modi script. This is an incomplete narration, describing the origin and the history of certain temples and much importance has been given to Sri Gopalaswami temple and Sri Venkateswaraswami temple at Srengapatnam. This further describes the endowments granted by Rulers of Mysore for the maintenance of these temples. Some mythological legends regarding the divinity of the deities and the various additional construction of buildings by the Rajas of Mysore have been inscribed on the walls of the temples. It has also been recorded that the temples were well taken care of by Hyderali and Tipu Sultan during their regime at Mysore.

The first two folios describe the parentage of Purnia, who lived in a village known as Valamanur, and then emigrated to Srirangapatnam to find out means for a living. The father of Purnia is said to have been serving as a writer under a local money lender and then as a clerk in the office of Sarishtadar in the Mysore Government. It is said that Purnia used to assist his father in his office work. When this was brought to the notice of the Sarishtadar, he appreciated the work of Purnia, and took him also in the Government service. In course of a very short time Purnia by his intelligence and sincere work rose to the position of the Minister under Hyder Ali and Tipu Sultan respectively. The various measures passed by Purnia to quell the usury practised by the money-lenders at Mysore and instances wherein Purnia displayed his skill in deciding the charges brought against certain corrupt officers and how helpful he was to the Rulers of Mysore have been very graphically described. The name of the scribe and the sources of information obtained for recording this Kaifiyat are not mentioned. The folios are not serially arranged and bound.

and the places he visited in Upper India. The first two folios describe the geographical and climatic condition of Kāyāgāva. It has been stated that this town is situated very near to Nasik and a highly reputed pilgrimage centre ; and much importance has been attached in describing the temple of Sri Thriumbakeswara. The author further describes, that this place was reconquered by Shau, the grandson of Shivaji the Great with the assistance of his able and talented Peshwa, Baji Rao from the possession of the Moguls. It has been stated that Baji Rao granted extensive fertile lands as endowment to his Brahman followers and to certain charitable institutions. In concluding the kaifiyat, it has been stated that Yeswant Rao Holkar of Baroda, took possession of these lands and drove away the Brahmin residents of the village and the latter with the assistance of the East India Company regained their lost property. A list showing the names of the temples, shrines and tanks have also been furnished. It has been recorded that this kaifiyat was prepared according to the information furnished by Baboo Bhut, the resident of the village and from certain old manuscripts preserved in a Mutt, and this was said to have been recorded on the 31st of January 1806. The name of the scribe has not been mentioned.

The middle portion of the kaifiyat deals with the constructions carried out by the Jain rulers who became Rajas to Kurumbuda. Improvements made to the temple of Arunachellaswami situated on the Tiruvannamalai hills and the endowments granted to the several temples have been narrated. It has been stated that the endowments granted and the construction of additional buildings by the subsequent rulers have been inscribed on the stone walls of the temples. The kaifiyat further describes the names of Paligars of Marwa and Naidu castes, who tried to conquer the Fortress. The wars between the Bijapur Sultans with the Naick Paligars and the final subjugation of the Naicks by the Sultans along with the Bijapur State has also been vividly described. The causes that led to the construction of Kurumbai Fort and how it was fortified and the passing over the same to the Bijapur Sultans have also been recorded. It has been stated that this kaifiyat was copied from an original manuscript by one Venkata Sastri, a resident of Chaturanga Patnam on the 25th August 1816

The progress of various developments in fortifying the fortresses and the acquisition of the neighbouring States, by the successors of the original founders have been described in detail. Dates in Salivahana Era for all important occasions are provided for events such as wars, sieges, victories and demise of the rulers of Kelandhi. Much importance has been attached to the last lady ruler by name Veeramma, the widow queen of Kelandhi. The kaifiyat concludes stating that Krishnadevaraya the Raja of Mysore, directed his Military Commander Hyderali Khan to capture the State and the same was annexed in the year Chitra Bhanu.

In the beginning of this composition it has been recorded that this kaifiyat was recorded from the information obtained from an old and original document preserved by one Sivachari the then resident of Bellur, the date of the original manuscript being Doormukhi Era. The name of the scribe or the date on which this kaifiyat was recorded has not been mentioned.

After hearing the full story from Chandappa, the providential assistance he had in founding the Kelandi Samasthanam, he came to an understanding with Chandappa to bring down the unruly Paligars. Chandappa was successful in his efforts. Details further show that he was able to impose new Peshkish on the Poligars. Achutappa conferred the title of "Rayalu" on Chandappa and presented him with a jageer of eight villages. The coronation of Chandappa, the Rayalu of Kelandi and Rayalaseema has been described very graphically. The kaifiyat ends without mentioning the name of the scribe or the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat. Certain dates in Saliwahana Era have been mentioned.

Much importance has been attached to the temple of Sri Ramaswami, which is said to exist even before the springing up of Kelandhi. Certain legends attached to divine powers of the God of this temple and about the sacredness of the holy waters in certain tanks in the temple have also been described. The name of the scribe and other particulars such as dates and the sources of information for recording this Kaifiyat are not mentioned.

Though the Kaifiyat bears the aforesaid title it gives very little information regarding the Konkan Brahmins. The subject-matter contained in the D. No. 174 in Taylors, Volume III is repeated. The five sects of the Brahmins in the Maharashtra community is described. The mythological legends are also narrated in the kaifiyat. Neither the name of the author nor the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat is given.

This Kaifiyat begins on folio 22.

This is a complete narration recorded on hand-made country paper of foolscap size, dealing with the history of all the important

occurrences that happend in each year in the famous Fort of Shiveswar Gad, in the Taluk of Subukotta. The location of the abovesaid fort, which played an important part has not been clearly indicated. It has been described that this fort formed one of the monumenta constructions by Asaphsha. The Kaifiyat has been divided into four parts. In the third part, the invasion of Hyderah Khan of Mysore and how certain poligars guarding the Fort became submissive, and the capture of Fort by the Nawab has been discribed.

In the fourth part of the Kaifiyat, the invasion of the Marathas under the able leadership of Rudrajeo Jadve, Annand Rao and Balavant Rao of Sadasiva Gad and Shiveswar Gad and the Capture of Fort by them has been described. As a result of the weakness of the Marattas and the subsequent civil war amongst the Peshwas, the East India Company finally annexed the Fort. This Kaifiyat begins on folio 115.

This has been recorded on quarter size, hand-made country paper. The origin and history of a Town called Kōpam is the subject-matter. Though the Kaifiyat has been recorded in Modī script in Marathi language, a large number of Kanarese phrases and passages appear throughout the narration. The first two folios have been devoted to the circumstances which attributed to call the Town as "Kōpam". The mythological legend of the incarnation of Veerabadrāsami who killed Daksaprajapātī and his subjects to revenge the insult caused to Parvati has been described. It has been recorded that this Town contains a number of temples of great antiquity with stone inscriptions and buildings noted for their archæological splendare. In the fourth folio, the invasion and capture of the town by Chaundappa, the Raja of Vijyanagar and the improvements to the forts and the additional construction of buildings to the temples have been described. The funds for renovating the temples and fortifying this town said to have been carried out by Chaundappa from the valuable treasure troves he got from certain temples. Neither the date nor the name of the scribe or the sources of information for recording this Kaifiyat has been mentioned.

It has been stated that there are some stone inscriptions in the Temple of Veerabadrāsami. Since the folios are damaged, certain portions could not be made out. This town is said to have existed in the taluk of Hariharpur.

This Kaifiyat begins on folio 689.

This is a transcription of an original kaifiyat recorded on thick paper of foolscap size. The origin and history of the Kopam Town has been described. The geography of the surroundings of the town has also been described. The legendary birth of Veerabadrswami and the destruction of Dakshaprajapati, the Raja who insulted Goddess Parvati, are said to have taken place here. Since Veerabadra revenged the destruction in his anger this place was called as "Kopam" which in Tamil means "Anger."

The names of certain rulers who ruled at Vijianagar, such as Chandappa, Somasekar and others, and their contribution and the improvements to the temple buildings, and the charitable institutions and fortification of the fortress have been very graphically described. Much importance has been attached to Chavappa Naick and his administration. This transcription was made as per the instruction of Mr. Taylor. The name of the original scribe has not been mentioned and in the conclusion of the narrative it has been signed as "Ranga." This person may be the transcriber. Though the kaifiyat seems to be transcribed very fairly it contains a large number of bad spelling and incorrect punctuations.

This Kaifiyat begins on folio 47 describing the origin and history of Rāmasamudram taluk in Tiruppattur Firka. The entire taluk has been classified and measured up to the extent of an inch; and the names of the owners and the extent they possessed and the fertility of the soil, etc., have been graphically recorded. The second part of this description explains the extent of the lands owned by the Inamdars, who received the lands as gift. The third part describes the classification of the entire taluk and the kinds of crops raised in them. The land measurement has been said to have taken place in fasli 1263. In folio 62, the names of the persons who enjoyed the Inam lands and of the persons who granted them are given. From folio 49 to the end statements showing the accounts for the extent of arable lands, the income derived from them and the tax assessed, etc., have been furnished. It has been stated that the entire volume was recorded by Narayana Rao. The designation and details regarding the above said person are not furnished.

This kaifiyat contains supplementary details regarding the names of the rulers and their surnames, the number of forts each ruler owned and whether they were constructed or acquired by them. More information regarding the Forts and Provinces of Malwa, and the buildings in them and the valuable metals and precious stones that were utilised in their construction and such other minute details have been given.

In the end of the Second Chapter, detailed list showing the Forts which stood on the banks of the Indus has also been provided. It is said that Certain stone inscriptions were found on the walls of some forts. The name of the scribe or the informations obtained for recording this has not been mentioned. It has been stated that this kaifiyat was finished on the 16th August 1806.

This kaifiyat begins on folio 11, and it has been recorded by a neat hand on English-made paper of foolscap size. This describes the geography of certain mountains and the origin and the history of certain forts, temples and pilgrim centres of great antiquity. The name of the province or the particular locality whose history has been described in this kaifiyat has not been mentioned. But in one place it has been stated that Gundali Dweepa was a famous hill fortress in Rayala Seema. It has to be noted that this place, though called as Dweepa or an island has no water surrounding it. But it is a hill fortress in the Bhimeswar mountains. The mythological legends attached to the temples of Sri Janardana Swami and that of the Shiva temple in particular have elaborately described. Sri Agasthamuni is said to have renovated and consecrated certain deities in these temples. Regarding the shrines and the additional buildings and the cities around the hills were said to have been completed by Reddy Palligars and Naidu Rajas of Raila Seema. A number of stone inscriptions in Telugu characters is said to have been found on the walls of the temples. Since they are in the

obscure places, such as the sanctum sanctorum, the author says that he has omitted to describe the name of the scribe. The sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat and the date on which kaifiyat recorded are not mentioned.

Condition of the paper has become brittle and the letters faded. Gudiyatam is a taluk in the North Arcot district. This kaifiyat describes the prosperous condition of Gudiyatam under the regime of the Nawabs of Arcot. It has been stated that Memuli Khan was the first Nawab who ruled at Gudiyatam. The names of the successive Nawabs who ruled at Arcot and the improvements they made in fortyfying Gudiyatam has been described. It has been stated that there are two old temples, one dedicated to Shiva and the other to Vishnu. The period each Nawab ruled at Arcot has been given in Salivahana Era. The taluk is said to contain a number of Paliputs and the chief of them is said to be Muthurangappa Naick. A hill fort is said to exist in this place known as Kailsagiri which was constructed by the Nawab of Arcot. Information regarding the cultivation and the sources of water for irrigation and the local geography has also been recorded. It has been stated that the above information for recording the kaifiyat was obtained from one Subbia Pillai, a karnam of the place.

It has been stated that this place is a sacred Saivite centre for pilgrimage with a number of sacred pools and tanks situated in this ancient village of Mahabaleswar on the banks of the Krishna in the Bombay Presidency. Two legends have been narrated explaining the reason how the names Gokarneswar and Mahabaleswar came into existence. The first story explains the part played by Vishnu in securing the Lingam granted to Ravana by Siva and the consecration of the same which was then called as Gokarneswar. The second story relates to the relief granted by Siva to Bramhadeva and absolving him of his sins. It further describes the Sanctity of the sacred pools and tanks situated in the temple. The name of the author, the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat and the date of the kaifiyat are not mentioned. The paper is in a highly damaged condition.

The Gondagiri kaifiyat begins on folio 63. This is an incomplete discription, narrating the origin and the history of the three forts in Beligi taluk situated near the taluk of Chandragooti. The first three folios describe the history of the founder of these forts. It has been stated that one Naloo Eka Gonda Kudi, a resident of Beligi was childless. As a result of his services to a sage, he had two sons. The first son was named as AVADENAI (अवडेण वोडरु) VODARU and the second boy was called as MOODICHI-VODARU. Both these brothers by their united efforts established their Raj at Beligi. The kaifiyat further describes, that the elder brother became a Jain and the second as a Lingayat.

A list showing the names of the contemporary Rulers who ruled at Vijia Nagar has been given.

The territorial expansions they made by subjugating the Naick ruling have been given. The names of the places they conquered could not be read since those parts of the folios are damaged.

The kaifiyat ends on folio 65. The last part of this narration describes the boundaries of the Gondagiri Raj but it could not be made out. The name of the author the sources of information and the date of the occurrences mentioned in the kaifiyat are not mentioned.

This kaifiyat begins on folio 122, and has been recorded on English made paper of follscap size. This describes the story of the colonization of the French at Goa. When the native ruler Kadumba Raja was ruling at Goa, certain merchants of European nationality landed at MOORU Grammam a village on the banks of the backwaters. They saw the native Raja with befitting presents and requested him to grant a site, where they can construct sheds for living. The native Raja being pleased with the presents granted a site as per the selection made by the chief of the merchant party. It has been stated that the leader brought men and munition from home and in course of a very short period defeated Kudumba Raja and annexed his territories. Thus the French annexed Goa. The names of the first French merchants and the date of landing at Goa are not mentioned. The name of the scribe, the sources of information and the date of the kaifiyat are not mentioned. The last portion of kaifiyat explains that the Rajas of Nagar were also defeated in their efforts to reconquer the City of Goa.

This volume contains ten kaifiyats recorded on hand-made country paper of various sizes. There are two Tamil kaifiyats on folios 6 to 10. The folios are in damaged condition.

The kaifiyat is wrongly titled as "Golimandal kaifiyat" since the writer who copied this from its original should have mis-spelt it for Thondamanda kaifiyat for the letters तो and गो Sanskrit resemble alike in Modi. But in the subsequent narrations it has been correctly recorded as Thondamandal.

This kaifiyat may be divided into two parts, the first dealing with the origin of the Thondamandal Raj family and the second dealing with the history of the Vaishnavite shrine at Tirupathi.

Folios 25 and 26, which are in a very badly injured condition, contain certain mythological legends. Subsequent to this it can be noted how the

Thondaman Raja constructed a capital and a fortress at Narayanavaram. Besides this, it has been recorded that he made some improvements in the temple at Kalahasty and died in the year Yuva of Shalivahana era.

In folios 29 and 30 references are made regarding the invasion of the Moguls from Delhi and the subjugation of the GOBUR and annexing the Thondamandalam with their own dominion. The attempts made by the Raja of Kalahasty in preventing the Moguls conquering the Thondamandalam has also been explained. The names of the Rajas and certain dates mentioned are not legible.

Though the writer of this kaifiyat has not mentioned his name, states that a part of the materials for recording this kaifiyat was obtained from the information gathered from certain respectable and old residents at Thondamandalam and the rest from the palm leaf records preserved by certain descendants of the Thondamandalam Raj family. Dates for certain important occurrences are mentioned in Shalivahana Era.

The date on which the kaifiyat was recorded has been omitted.

The other works in this volume has been explained in D. No. 18.

This kaifiyat begins on folio 61 and has been recorded by a neat hand on English made paper of foolscap size. This seems to be a detached portion from a big volume, dealing with the origin and the history of the Ghorpades, of Sondur State. Sondur is a division in the Bellary district. The kaifiyat at the outset explains the genealogy of the descendants of Maloji Rao Ghorpade, a Commander in the service of the Sultan of Bijapur. His three sons, Santaji Rao, Bahirji Rao and Maloji Rao joined the ranks of Shahu, the grandson of Shivaji the Great in revolting against the Sultan of Bijapur and prospered in consequence.

This kaifiyat further describes the exploits of these three brothers and the services rendered in subjugating the Moguls and reconquering the provinces taken by the Moguls in the regime of Sambaji.

Owing to the sincere services rendered by the three brothers, Santaji Rao was elevated to the grade of a Jaghidar to *Kapasi*—a province in the Kolhapur State and the other two brothers were honoured with the distinguished titles of Hindu Rao and *Mamlakat-Madar-Senapati* and *Amir-ul-umar*, respectively ; has been elaborately described. In folios 62 to 64 the territorial expansions made by Santaji Rao with the combined efforts of his son Morari Rao the founder of the Sondur State and the famous chief of Gooty and the capture of Gajendra Gad in the Bijapur district has been explained. The rest of the kaifiyat deals with the history of Morari Rao and his successors. The invasions by Hyder Ali Khan and Tipu Sultan and the loss of Gooty and Sandur and the part played by Savaee Mahadeva Rao, Parasaram Bahri, and Nana Fadnavis has been explained. The battle at Srirangapatam, the death of Tipu Sultan, the intervention of the East India Company in the wars between the Marathas and the Nawabs of Mysore and taking back of Sandur and Gooty has been dealt in folios 64 and 65. As per the treaty of Bassen the East India Company granted the Jaghir of Sandur to Siva Ghorpade.

In concluding the kaifiyat it has been stated that the above information was furnished to Mr. *Words* Sahib, officer deputed to prepare survey maps in Salivahana Saka 1731 year Sukla. The name of the author and the scribe the sources of information obtained for preparing the kaifiyat have been omitted.

The other works herein are explained in D. No. 30.

This kaifiyat has been recorded on folio 113, legibly on hand made country paper. A chart showing the genealogy of the Ghorpades from the ancestor Maloji Rao Ghorpade to his last successor Shiva Rao Ghorpade has been provided. Though this kaifiyat is same in the subject-matter as that of the preceding kaifiyat, a lot of further details are provided.

Much importance has been attached to the History of Bhujanga Rao, the brother of Morari Rao. He was conferred the Jaghir of Gajendra Gad and certain other places in the Bijapur district. The adoption of Shiva Rao by Morari Rao Ghorpade and the troubles confronted in removing the regent ruler Narsinga Rao Ghorpade (who ruled Sondur in the minority of Shiva Rao) and the intervention of the Pishwas in enabling Shiva Rao to get back Sondur has been narrated. The visit of Baji Rao the Peshwa to Sondur and the formalities by Shiva Rao Ghorpade and such other matters of less importance have also been described.

In the last folio, the names of two East India Company servants are mentioned, their names being Gilcot Bruce and Colenel Potter, who restored Sondur State to Narsinga Rao Ghorpade as per the treaty of Bassin effected by the Anglo Maratta war.

In the conclusion it has been stated that this kaifiyat was prepared by Narayana Rao, a clerk of the Wards, the officer deputed to prepare

survey maps. The information was collected from the old records preserved by the elder brother of Bhujanga Rao residing in the Sondur State. The kaifiyat is stated to have been recorded on the 15th of Karthika month in the Sukhla year Shalivahana Era 1731.

The other works herein are explained in D. No. 45.

This kaifiyat begins on folio 48. The first 47 folios contain records in Telugu characters.

This is a collective descriptive work relating to the History of the Naick Rajas of Sondai afterwards known as Ikere Naicks. It extends to 18 pages and is recorded on hand-made country paper of quarto size. Though the kaifiyat is termed as Chennapatna kaifiyat, it is in no way connected to Madras which is known as Chennapatnam in Tamil. It describes the achievements and the administration of the Ikere Naicks of Tondamandalam. The fortresses and the places alluded to in the kaifiyat are situated in the province of Mysore and the Karnataka. The founder of the Tondamandalam State, Thondaman Chakravarti is said to have constructed two forts Sonde and Serisai. He with the assistance of his nephew Venkatapathi invaded and annexed the forts from the Paligars situated near their home.

D. Mar.—4A.

Venkatapati, being a pious man, constructed many temples and one among them was dedicated to Gowri Viswar which surpassed the rest in architectoive beauty. The names of the successors of Venkatapathi Naick up to his 10th successor are described. Some of them were converted to the Lingayat faith. The invasion of Kelech Khan, of Delhi and the defeat of the Naicks, and the restoration of the Raj of the Naick by a treaty is briefly narrated. On the eve of his renunciation he appointed his friend Balapaiya to manage certain forts. The names of the forts and towns granted to Balapaiya and the name of the successor to Sadasiva Naick could not be made out for they are pasted with slips of paper. The invasion of the Moghals and the history of the other Naick rulers are explained. There are half completed and blank folios in the kaifiyat. The name of the scribe and the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat are omitted. The dates are in Salivahana calendar.

This book contains 112 folios and seems to be a detached portion of a big volume, recorded on English made paper of foolscap size. The handwriting is legible and clear, but badly punctuated. The folios are not properly arranged. This record is divided into 14 sections. The first and the last two chapters are recorded separately and the rest of the manuscript is written in continuity. The first section begins on the first folio and ends on the 7th. The record describes the Chakravarti, from Janam ejaya downwards and it is stated that they ruled for thousand

and hundreds of years. The names of the Rajas and their descendants who ruled in the first three Ugas (three ages) with their Surnames, talents and attainments they have acquired and such other high sounding words in praise of them are recorded.

The second section describes certain inscriptions recorded on the stone walls of certain temples by the Rajas of Vijayanagar. The name of the village or the town where the temple located is not mentioned. The details regarding the number of villages that the Rajas of Vijayanagar owned is mentioned.

The inscriptions contain the name of Krishna Deva Raya both in the beginning and in the end. References regarding the names of the villages granted as endowment, with their boundaries and the source of water-supply, the nature and fertility of the soil and such other details are very clearly recorded. The major portion of the inscriptions bear the names of the individuals and institutions to whom lands were granted as endowment. The names of the temples with the principal and secondary deities housed in them and the allotment of funds for conducting daily worship and celebrating the annual festivals are mentioned.

From folio 100 to the end the kaifiyat deals from Salivahana Saka 1300 downwards to the accession of the Mahammaden power. In the interval of two to three hundred years references to the last rulers of Vijayanagar and Worngal occur, with various statements such as the foundation of certain villages, agraharams and temples. The downfall of the Vijayanagar Raj is very briefly described.

The folios are not arranged properly. In a separate paragraph on folio 112, the scribe states that this paper was transcribed from several old manuscripts and palm-leaf records. In folio 92 (b), it is stated that a portion of this paper was transcribed from a copy of inscription with the kind permission of Bahargava Chari (the owner) residing at Dravida Kanchi. The whole work is intermixed with Kanarese, Telugu and Sanskrit languages transliterated in Marathi and recorded in Modi script. In concluding the kaifiyat it is stated that the manuscript was transcribed by Deskmookhe Narahari Ayya, residing at Ellur Chakani Kottai and was completed on the 5th lunar day of the bright half of Baishak in the year Dunmathe—Salivahana Saka 1721.

This volume contains 172 pages dealing with the origin and the history of the Marathas. This work is divided into 25 sections and each section is again divided into small sub-sections.

The main theme of the Kaifiyat being to provide elaborate informations with accurate dates regarding the history of the Marathas from the time of their inception and much attention is paid on the part played by the Bhonsles of Sattara.

Certain mythological legends of less historic value are found in this section. It is stated that the first king to capture Hastinapuri from the Pandava ruler was Jaising. A long list of names of the various Hindu rulers who ruled at Hastinapuri and the period of their reign up to Salivahana Saka 512 is given.

Sanskrit slokas are quoted in Prakrit with their corresponding meanings. These informations are said to have been copied from the original manuscripts possessed by *Vimmala Pandit*. The first Muhamedan ruler, as per this Kaifiyat, is said to be *Rum-Ud-Din*—who fought and conquered Hastinapuri and named it as *Delhi*. A long list of the names of the Muhamedan rulers in India from the original king mentioned above up to the last ruler, and the number of years each ruled at Delhi is provided.

A separate section deals with the names of the places where the Salivahana, Vikramaditia Hijiri and Soorsen Calendars were in vogue.

The origin of Devagiri and that of the Modi Script is also mentioned.

The author of the Kaifiyat states that he picked up these two informations from the records possessed by *Voyekar Jeoshi*, dated S.S. 1158.

The next chapter explains the origin of Poona and the history of the two famous temples of great antiquity one dedicated to *Poonesuar* and the other to *Kedarisvar*. A Muslim faquir by name *Peer Abdulia* by his miraculous deeds gained the goodwill of the population of the neighbouring villages of *Poona* and converted to Islamic faith. He attacked both the Hindu temples, destroyed them and confiscated their endowments and constructed a masjid. The Brahmins who were conducting the worship in the temples were appointed as Mussafars. They are said to have been converted on their own accord, and a list showing their names and their descendants are provided.

A brief history of the Naizam Shahi, Adil Shahi and Imad Shai dynasties and its rulers have been narrated.

It is recorded that Shivaji was born on Thursday the 5th of the dark fortnight of Bishak month in S.S. 1549—Prabava at Sivaneri.

Folios 36 to 40 describe the boyhood of Shivaji under the careful guardianship of his mother, the character of Shivaji is also explained. It is stated that Shivaji had great reverence towards his tutor, who lived up to S.S. 1556. The dates in Salivahana era have been provided for all the acts of chivalry and the annexation of several forts by Shivaji up to 1591.

The eighth chapter deals the part played by Shivaji and the campaigns fought by him. In S.S. 1591 Shahin died at Kamakagri due to the injuries he sustained from a fall from his horse.

The next chapter deals with his territorial expansions and the construction of Forts for defending the Moghal attacks.

The coronation ceremony of Shivaji as Chatrapati is said to have been celebrated with great pomp and splendour officiated by learned Pandit Gagaphut Kasiker on the 1st day of Chaitra month of Annanda Erice in S.S. 1596. This chapter further states about the administration of Shivaji.

In 1602 S.S. Rudrodgari year Shivaji died by an attack of fever. His son Sambahji was not at his death bed. The eight ministers ruled on behalf of Rajaram for a while. The names of Moropant Pingle and Annajee Dethe find a prominent place in the folios wherein their activities have been explained. The downfall of the Maratha Empire and the last battle fought at Sangameswar in Sal. Saka 1610 with Imam Beg, the general of Aurangzeb with a large Mogul army and how Sambaji

was defeated, captured, tried and beheaded at Julapur by Aurangzeb is very elaborately dealt with. Shahu, the seven years old son of Sambahji and Yeosu Boi, his mother, were taken captives at Pratapgad and were removed to Delhi to the Court of Aurangzeb, the kind treatment Shahu and his mother had from the hands of Begum, the daughter of Aurangzeb is described.

The rest of the kaifiyat describes the Maratha history, explaining the rise and fall of the Peshwas till the East India Company finally conquered them.

The preceding account is said to have been transcribed from its original by Appaji Rao of Mysore and was finished at Mool Mutta, near Poona by the 12th April 1806. The name of the author of the kaifiyats is not mentioned.

Remarks—

It will appear from the above abstract that this volume will give more information and accurate dates for all the occurrences in the Maratha history from S.S. 512. It may merit a full translation and the subject matter and the dates mentioned may be compared and their authority may be ascertained by verifying the same with the other Maratha histories edited by eminent authors.

The other works in this volume are explained in D. No. 48.

This is an incomplete document recorded on hand-made country paper. Both the beginning and the end are missing. Reference is made about certain forts near Ginge and the history relating to the Naick Rulers. On account of the bad condition of the manuscript a successful restoration or to make out the contents is not possible.

The other works in this volume are described in D. No. 31.

This kaifiyat begins on folio 174 and is recorded on thick French paper and contains 42 folios, describing the origin and the history of Chitradurg. The folios are not properly arranged and are in loose condition.

In the beginning, the episode narrates the legend regarding the Pandavas. It is stated that they spent their period of exile near this Chitradurg.

The kaifiyat does not provide any information up to 1024 Sali. Saka.

Thirumala Rayer was a pious Naick and a worshipper of God Narshima and Goddess Durga. He is said to have constructed a Fort and a temple to the above gods from the wealth he acquired from a treasure trove. Thirumal Naicken to commemorate this happy event, named the Fort as Chitra Durg. A tomb is said to exist in the village Malti near Chitra Durg. It further describes that this Vobana Naick was an enthusiastic worshipper of Venkateswara of Tirupathi, and that he granted extensive landed properties for the abovesaid temple. His son Krishnappa Naick ascended the throne of Chitra Durg in S.S. 1137 and his territorial conquests and his acts of generosity are very beautifully explained. He is said to have renounced the world and abdicated his throne and crowned his second son Metha Kotti Naick. The enmity between the ruler of Vijia Nagar and this Matha Kotti Naick and the circumstances under which Krishna Rayer gave his daughter to the Gajapati prince and cemented the friendship is very briefly described. A brief history of the 27 princes of Yadava dynasty, who ruled one after the other, up to 1587 S.S., is very elaborately described,

A separate section deals with the commencement of the Yadava dynasty beginning with Sriranga Yadava Rayer. The invasion of the Moghals and how Chitra Durg and the Vizianagar Empire passed into the hands of the Mohamedans is narrated. The territorial expansions and the campaigns fought by the Marathas from Shivaji to the last Peshwa Savai Mada Rao have received a special attention of the author of this kaifiyat. The invasion of the Nawabs of Hyderabad and Hyderali Khan of Mysore and the part played by the French and English in the Carnatic wars and how finally Chitra Durg passed into the hands of the East India Company is very elaborately described. The name of the author and the sources of information for recording this kaifiyat are not mentioned.

Remarks—

Besides the things narrated this document gives a large number of historic facts explained with accurate dates. The period of the rule of the Marathas and particularly that of the Peshwas has received a very careful attention of the author.

The other works in this volume are explained in D. No. 25.

This is a copy of the kaifiyat explained in D. No. 55 and begins on folio 719 of this volume but the entire Kaifiyat is not found; bad punctuation and a large number of words misspelt are found in abundance. The name of the person who transcribed this and the date on which it was copied are not mentioned.

The other works in this volume are explained in D No. 43.

This begins on the 14th folio of this volume and contains 16 pages and is recorded on hand made country paper. This Kaifiyat deals with the wars and battles fought between Bangaru Thimmana Rayalu the Raja of Chingleput and Krishna Rayalu of Penugonda.

The first four folios explain the episode relating to the visit of Bangaru Thimmana to Penugonda and his interview with Krishna Rayalu.

The second chapter deals with the attempts made by Krishna Rayalu to install his illegitimate son Patchana Rayalu to the throne of Penugonda. While Pachana was a prisoner at Kanchi, he sent word to the Raja of Mysore to help him. The Raja of Mysore despatched, Vellore Venkata Reddy with a big army to assist Krishna Rayalu. An agreement was made and according to it Pachana Rayalu is said to have been released and became again the Raja of Penugonda. After his death Regupathi Rayalu became the Raja of Penugonda. Thimmana Rayalu and Regupathi Rayalu are said to have stayed at Tirupathi for a long time for invoking the God to bless him with children. This Regupathi Rayalu and Thimmana of Chingleput are said to be in inimical terms. Regupathi mobilised a very big army and took in service certain Commanders by name Hoosain Khan, Feroz Peerjal Khan and manufactured two big cannons named them as Rama and Lakshmana. Three battles are said to have been fought in the vicinity of Chingleput and in the end Regupathi was put to death. The above-stated facts are said to have been gathered from a stone inscription found in a temple situated in a village very near Chingleput. The name of the village or that of the temple is not readable, since they are damaged by insects.

The name of the author the dates of the episodes or the sources of the information for preparing this kaifiyat is not mentioned.

This work begins on the 30th folio and is recorded on English paper. It contains 12 pages. This Kaifiyat describes how a village in Nagapatam Taluk was annexed by the East India Company.

The first 6 folios describe that Daudkhan, the Foujdar of Arcot, directed some of his servants to proceed to Negapatam for locating the place, from where he could get some black granite stones. The servants informed Daudkhan that the required granite stones were found in one village known as Eddialacherry. The foujdar purchased the village from its owner. He obtained permission from the Nawab of Arcot and constructed a Fort. Haiderali invaded the Carnatic and he received assistance from the French. This village was attacked and captured. Haider being pleased at the assistance rendered by the French handed over this village to them. When peace was concluded at Europe the French returned the village to the East India Company. A mythological legend is narrated in the end. In the end a long list of names of the temples, masjids and tanks, etc., in the village is given. Names of certain Europeans are mentioned. The name of the author or the date on which either this episode occurred or the date on which this kaifiyat was recorded is not mentioned.

This volume contains 123 folios, entirely dealing with the origin and the history of Chandragiri and its rulers. This kaifiyat has been recorded on hand-made country paper of very thin variety.

The first folio describes that the source of information for recording this historic narration was obtained from certain ancient manuscripts and accounts maintained by certain Naick Rulers of Chandragiri in the possession of the karnam by name Krishnaswami Pillai of a village in Chandragiri taluk. This kaifiyat deals with three ruling races, namely, the Yadavas, the Naicks and the Mohamedans who ruled at Chandragiri.

The names of the Rajas who ascended the throne of Vijiyanagaram is described.

He constructed two Forts and called them as Rajempet and Ammapet. Several quarters for his relatives and dependants and beautiful palaces and gardens are said to have been constructed in them. In order to protect the Forts from foreign aggressions, he directed to mount two big cannons on the Forts. They were named as Rama and Lakshmana. It is stated that they were used only once. Seeing their havoc and the loud explosion, he directed his Commanders not to use them in future on any account. They are said to exist even now on the Forts.

A list of the palligars and the places where they were residing is described.

The last part of the kaifiyat describes the advent of the Moguls. In S.S. 1537, the Kutubshai dynasty established itself at Golkonda. The names of the Sultans who ruled in succession at Golkonda up to Parkoosh Padsha is described.

The attack made by Aurangzeb on the Sultan of Golkonda is explained very briefly.

The account relating to the Fort of Arcot and its founders, and the history regarding Daoud Khan, Sadilla Khan and the dates of their accession, the number of years they ruled is mentioned.

The accession of Mahamed Ali Khan, Wallaja as Nawab of Arcot, and how he attacked and annexed Chandragiri with his territories is graphically explained.

The name of the scribe or the date on which this historic narration was recorded is not mentioned.

This narration gives very little information regarding history but deals with the fertility and classification of the soil, the process and kinds of crops cultivated in the wet lands and the cess collected from the agriculturists.

It further deals with the approximate dates on which the flow of water was available for cultivation and the manures used for the fields.

The second section deals with dry crop cultivation.

The third section deals with the mines and the ores excavated from them.

The name of the author or the date or the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat is not mentioned.

The first few pages describe the mythological legends from Shiva Puranam. The names of the Kings of Solar and Human dynasties who ruled in the four ages are described. The names of the Chola Kings and the period they ruled and the temples visited are mentioned. There is nothing worth important either from the literary or historic point of view to note. The beginning is illegible and the end is in torn condition. The kaifiyat neither mentions the name of the author nor the sources of information obtained for recording this.

This kaifiyat begins on folio 26 and contains twelve pages and has been recorded on hand-made India paper. The folios are slightly injured by insects.

The subject of this narration relates to the origin and the history of two towns, Shimadripur and Jaganathapur in Tadpatri taluk.

When Naizam-Ul Moolk invaded South of India, he happened to camp at Tadpatri (Ellanoor Mahanam); and he found that north of Tadpatri was a dense forest. Two of his Brahmin followers by name Ramana Panth and Shinadri Panth requested the Nizam to grant these forest tracts to them as tax-free lands. Both these Brahmins and their colleagues took great pain in converting the forests into two beautiful towns fit for habitation.

The town constructed by Ramana Panth was called as Jaganathapur (since Jaganatha Panth being the name of the father of Ramnatha Panth) and the other as Shimadripur. It is stated that a 'sanad in Persian was executed by Naizam Ul Moolk granting these two places as tax-free lands to the abovesaid persons.

The kaifiyat describes how these two places were captured by Gooti Moorar Rao and returned them again to Govinda Rao. The last portion of the kaifiyat describes that in fasli 1210, Major Monro of the East India Company settled these two villages on shrotriam tenure.

In concluding the narration, it is stated that the origin and the history of these two villages were recorded on the 18th May 1811 at Gangoyam Ellanoor, Tadpatri taluk. The name of the author or the sources of information obtained for recording this narration is not mentioned.

The first Marathi kaifiyat recorded in Modi Script appears on folio No. 136. The pages are arranged in backward order and the kaifiyat ends on folio 11.

This is a memorandum issued by Tipu Sultan to the Tahsildar of Kankupai taluk, dated 15th Safar 1221 fasli. The Tahsildar is hereby instructed regarding the appointments of suitable persons as servants and sepayes, the salary and the batta that should be paid to them, and the nature of work that they should attend to and the punishments that are to be awarded for the disloyal and currupt officers. The order bears the signatures of four or five officers of the Sircar. The name of the scribe is not mentioned.

The other kaifiyat begins on folio 20-b. This explains the relative value of the coins which were in vogue and the names of certain weights are also mentioned. The name of the scribe or the sources of information for recording the Kaifiyat is not mentioned.

This kaifiyat contains 10 pages and is neatly recorded on English paper. The handwriting of the last page differs from the rest of the Kaifiyat. This explains the historic episode of besige of Jinjee by Salulla Khan, the Nawab of Arcot, against Raja Jai Sing.

The first two folios explain the circumstances how Jai Sing was made the Ruler of Jingee by the Badusha of Delhi. Since Jai Sing was in arrears to remit the tribute due to the Nawab of Arcot, the Nawab despatched an army under the command of Arni Venkata Rao to collect the arrears. The kaifiyat explains the talk of compromise that was mediated between the Raja and the Nawab. The Nawab became infuriated at the reply of Jai Sing, directed Mukunda Rao to proceed at once to Jingee and to capture the Raja. The march of the army and the places where it halted and the names of the chieftains who followed the army are explained. The fight between the Nawab and the Raja and the defeat and the death of the latter is narrated very beautifully. The name of the author or the date of the episode narrated is not mentioned.

This Kaifiyat begins on folio No. 23. This seems to be a detached portion from a big volume since it bears a number marked "48," and bears an English heading wherein year 1806 is recorded.

The first paragraph describes that the Fort Janjira is situated in the west of Fort Sadasiva Gad and was constructed by Raja Shivaji.

The second Fort Kurmagad is said to have been constructed by Sadasiva Naick in Pingala year.

The second paragraph explains the seige of Hyderali and the battle that took place near the Forts. The capture of the abovesaid Forts by Captain Carpetain of the East India Company and how it was returned to the Sultan by the Company is described in the third paragraph.

The last paragraph which is incomplete gives out the annexation of Madras. Here the Kaifiyat stops. All the events are dated as per Salivahana Calendar. The name of the author or the sources of information for recording this Kaifiyat is not mentioned.

The first section explains the historic accounts relating to the Sultanate of Bijapur during the period of faslis 785 to 1096. The names of the districts in Bijapur awarded to his son Kam Baksh are mentioned. The death of Aurangzeb and the crossing of the swords and bid for the throne of Delhi between the three sons of Aurangzeb is briefly explained but the narration stops here.

The third and fourth sections describe that in 1170, Visvasa Rao was defeated and killed at a battle fought at Delhi against the combined armies of *Gilja Rumi* and *Ali Gour Mahamed*.

It is stated that this *Gilja Rumi* was crowned as *Bahadusha* of Delhi and *Ali Gour Mohamed* returned to Arabia.

The last two sections describes the original names of the several places both in the north and the south and alias names used in the Courts at Delhi.

On the last page it is stated that this Kaifiyat was transcribed from an old record possessed by Shama Rao, brother of Sidappa, a resident of Bijapur. The name of the scribe is said to be a clerk under Colen. Mackenzie and this was transcribed on the 23rd September 1807.

The author whose name is not mentioned, seems to describe the origin and the history of the first Jain King, and then his successors. He mentions certain temples and towns constructed by them. Neither the name of the Gods nor the temples nor the name of the King who constructed them are given.

The Kaifiyat explains that one Bair Sa-Veder came and settled in the forest in Central India. He is said to have cleared the forest and constructed a Fort and a temple to his tutelary diety Padmavati. He is said to have acquired 12 more forts and added them to his territory. The author seems to have secured the matters connected with temple certain records. A list of names such as Moolar-Shavantru and Thalu are the descendants of the original founder.

Though it is purely a Marathi record in Modi Script, it contains a large number of sentences and phrases in Kannada language. This has been divided into four sections. The first two deal with the origin and the history of the Jain Mutts in the Carnatic and the latter two explain the history of some of the patrons of Jainism. Further the names of certain Jain mendicants and their brief biography and the places where they constructed the Jain Mutts are mentioned. This Kaifiyat is of very little importance since the entire Kaifiyat is recorded incoherently.

'847' The Tahsildar submits a report to the Sub-Collector how he disposed of a dispute regarding certain lands at Rajamanargudi and requests the Sub-Collector to approve his action. The record bears the signature of the Tahsildar and is dated 27th June 1849.

The second record is a letter addressed to Thirumala Rao, Sheristadar of Visakhapatnam by Mahmud Hussain, dated 22nd July 1848, to enquire and settle certain disputes regarding the cultivation of certain Inam lands between the inamdars and the cultivators.

The date of the orders, the name of the author and the sources of information secured for recording this Kaifiyat are not mentioned. These two orders reveal, how Tipu was impartial in administering justice to his Muslim and non-Muslim subjects and how he put down corruption in his state.

Tipu issued orders to the Muslims to observe the Moharam festival in a peaceful manner and the persons of either sect who caused disturbances were punished and the punjas belonging to them were confiscated.

This is a copy of an order issued by Tipu Sultan through his Sheristadar, Shaik Dattar Krishna Rao to the Tahsildar of Kanaka Kuppai. A large number of Arabic and Persian words and phrases occur in the narration. This order illustrates how Tipu Sultan took pains and care towards his low-paid subordinates and the measures he adopted to stamp out corruption amongst his officers. The kaifiyat mentions a large number of varrious names and designations of the servants employed in the State.

In the last portion of the kaifiyat the signatures of three important officers are found. The date of the order being the 25th Jamadiisani Fasli 1221—Pramadicha Year. The kaifiyat provides no information regarding the sources of information for the original from which this record was transcribed.

The other works in this Volume are explained in D. No. 70. The kaifiyat begins on folio 81 and contains 3 pages. The handwriting is very legible and is recorded on English paper of foolscap size. The paper has become brittle owing to antiquity.

This is a transcription of a receipt issued by Tipu Sultan acknowledging the collections made and remitted by Shake Esmail, a Revenue Officer of Kanakupai Taluk. This furnishes the amount collected from the various villages and grouped under two heads, as Land Revenue and Nazar payments. The accounts of collections are given in the then currency. The face value of the coins of Tipu Sultan and the equivalent value of the gold and silver coins collected from other places are very neatly and accurately recorded. In concluding the Kaifiyat it is stated that the receipt was issued as per the instructions of Tipu and written by Thirumal Rao on the 5th Moharam 1221 Fasli and correspondingly 5th Basisak—Pramadicha year.

This kaifiyat explains how Tipu Sultan was lenient towards his village folk. Tipu Sultan ordered his Sheristadar (the name of the Taluk is Wynad) to lease out certain lands to the villagers for cultivating tobacco and ganja on a nominal rent. Subsequently owing to unforeseen changes in the monsoon, the tobacco crops failed and the poor villagers were not in a position to pay the amount as per the agreement. When the villagers submitted a mahazar, Tipu directed his Sheristadar to grant a remission. The name of the author and of the sources of the formation obtained for recording this kaifiyat are not mentioned.

The kaifiyat appears to be a true transcription of the foregone one. Certain missing gaps in the preceding kaifiyat are found filled up in this. The beginning and the end are the same as found in kaifiyat No. 74.

Tadpatri is a taluk in the Anantapur district. This is spelt as Tadmari. The author explains why the name Tadmari was given to that place.

In concluding the origin and the history of Tadpatri and its Naidu Rulers, it has been stated that the above was transcribed from a record possessed by two respectable elderly persons residing at Tadpatri. This transcription was copied by Annanda Rao' an officer under Col. Mckenzie, on the 10th February 1811 while camping at Tadpatri.

This kaifiyat describing the origin and the history of a village by name Tirukanamalai, begins on folio No. 10. It is recorded on English made paper of foolscap size. The handwriting is legible but overwritings are found in large numbers. One China Chetty and his three sons of very humble means migrated to this lonely place and constructed some huts and lived there. On one day one of his sons proceeded to Mysore to find some job for him. He is said to have found out a wealthy merchant by whose help he opened a grocers shop and became a rich man. He is said to have purchased this entire village which was filled up with dense forest and constructed houses and temples. This village was said to have been attacked and devastated by Tipu Sultan, and a severe famine is said to have attacked this place and caused much hardship to the people.

The kaifiyat stops here. The name of the author and the sources of information for recording this kaifiyat are not mentioned.

The first two folios describe the legends that are attached to the inscription of the temple of Sri Nageswara Swami. It is recorded that a saint instituted this temple to Shiva as per the instruction of Saint Kaśapa (Kasyapa) and thus he was absolved from his curses. The second portion of the kaifiyat describes the origin and the history of the residents of Tirunageswaram. It is said that they came from Kanchi and were termed as Kai Kalar—the other particulars regarding their origin and development are very elaborately discussed. Their customs and manners and how they became the trustees of the temple of Nageswaraswami is very elaborately explained.

The name of the author and the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat are not mentioned. This is said to be transcribed on 2nd April 1818.

The details regarding the programmes of the festival that is to be celebrated for eight days is described. The paper seems to be a detached folio from a big bound volume. The name of the author and the sources of information for recording this, etc., are not mentioned.

former kings who ruled at Tirupati and arranged for daily allowances to the God of Tirupati at their time, is recorded. The kaifiyat was copied from an old record possessed by Malaparmall Pillai by Narayana Rao. The names of the Emperors belonging to the Solar and Lunar race who ruled in the first three Ages or Ugas are mentioned. The total number of years they ruled in each age is given. It begins with the name Kruta Vidha Rāja of the first Uga and ends with Thiru-buvana Chakravarti.

The kaifiyat relates to the history of the God at Tirumalai-Tirupati and the endowments granted by the various dynasties and its Rulers, for performing daily and occasional worships and offerings. The kaifiyat further explains the names of the dynasties and their Rulers and the period they ruled. On folio No. 8 the names of the Railu Rajas of Vijyanagar beginning from Bukka the founder of the Naick dynasty, to its last Ruler Sri Ranga Rāilu is mentioned. The dates of their accession and the number of years they ruled are provided.

The names of the Mogul and the Maratha Rulers and the period of their rule up to the advent of the East India Company are given.

The rates and the quantities of articles that were supplied to the deities during the rule of Sultan Abdulla Kutub Sha, Nawab Sadulla Khan, Subedar of Arcot and Anwardin Khan are recorded. The names of certain managers who were appointed to look after the purchase of articles and the performance of worship are also provided. In concluding the kaifiyat it is found out that the East India Company made final arrangements for supplying the quantities of articles for the worship.

The name of the author and the sources of information obtained for recording the kaifiyat are not mentioned. Dates are recorded as per Shalvahana Calendar.

This kaifiyat relates to the Devastanam of Tirumalai-Tirupati and the nature of its management. This has been recorded on hand-made country paper. The narration contains 54 pages. It is recorded in the first sheet of the kaifiyat in Telugu and English, that the particular account of Tirumalai Tirupati Pagodas, regarding the worship conducted daily and the festivals celebrated to the deities were copied from an original record which was in the possession of the Senior Jee Ayengar attached to the Pagoda.

The first four folios of the kaifiyat elaborately explains the names of the officers attached to the Devastanam and their duties from the early morning to the last worship to the deity late in the night.

This narration mentions the important and responsible duties of Jee Ayengars and his assistants, the manager or secretary of the Devastanam. The second chapter mentions the counting of the collections and such other valuable articles offered to the Devastanam by the devotees and the names of the officers who are to look after the revenues of the Devastanam.

The third portion of the kaifiyat explains the rights and honours and privileges that the Jee Ayengars and their deputies are to enjoy in the Devastanam. The fourth section describes the duties of the Devastanam subordinates in taking care of the temple, its properties and the arrangements they should do for the successful celebration of the festivals which are to be observed every month and the annuities that are to be provided to the large number of devotees who visit the annual Bramotsavams celebrated to Srinivasa, Padmavati and Govinda Raja.

The fifth section describes the religious ceremonies that are to be attended to by the Jee Ayengars and the Archakas.

The sixth section deals with the share in the offerings which each member of the management under the senior Jee Ayengar should get and the provisions that were made for the public to have a free accession to the temple to see the deities.

The last section deals with the sealing of the coffers, the store rooms, the interior doorways and the main gates of the temple and the handing over of the keys to the Senior Jee Ayengar.

This kaifiyat is said to have been transcribed by one Narayana Rao from the original manuscript possessed by the Senior Jee Ayengar attached to the Trumalai-Tirupati Devasthanam.

This further provides the information regarding the particular idol which should be used for celebrating certain functions attached to the temple. Some sentences are written in the spaces between certain lines and they have become pale.

The kaifiyat neither mentions the name of the author nor the sources of information secured for recording the same. No date is also mentioned.

Some gardens are described within their four boundaries and the constructions if any in them. This record is said to have been transcribed from the accounts maintained in the Tirumalai-Tirupati Devasthanam bearing the date 1773 Kara year, 2nd of Karthikai month as per Salivahana Calendar.

This Kaifiyat describes the various mantapas or pillared buildings belonging to the Tirumalai-Tirupati Devastanam, Mahant Mutt. Jee Ayengar Mutt and certain other private individuals. Some of them are said to have been constructed by private individuals and left to the use of the Devastanam.

It is stated that certain Mantaps are used for preserving the Vahanams and other articles used while the deity is taken out in procession. The names of the donors, the four boundaries and purpose for which the mantaps were constructed are explained.

This Kaifiyat also provides some information regarding the waste lands and the lands fit for laying out gardens. The boundaries for the above also is mentioned; the name of the author, the sources of information for recording the Kaifiyat [and the date on which this was recorded are not mentioned. The narration contains a large number of words misspelt.

This Kaifiyat begins on folio 66 and is recorded on hand-made country paper and contains 8 pages.

This Kaifiyat describes the four roads by which the Holy Tirupati can be reached. The roads leading from Shetty Guntah and Mamandur are said to have been the northern routes and they contain Mantaps and buildings and tanks wherein the pilgrims can halt and refresh themselves. A subterranean passage is also said to exist and is used by some Gods and Rishis. The narration then describes the roads in the west and the east approaching Tirumalai. The author explains the condition of the roads and their fitness for performing journeys in carriages drawn by horses and bullocks. The Kaifiyat explains the junctions of the roads and certain elevations on the hills.

A brief description of the origin of the Tirupati hills and the legends attached to it are explained. The names of herbs and trees that are available on the hills are also mentioned. The mountain and caves in it are also very briefly described to have been used as abodes by the hermits. The nature of the forest, the wild animals and reptiles that exists on the mountains and the forests are very vividly explained. The explorers and the mountain claimers who either try to explore the caves of the mountains or persons who question about the sanctity of the God are said to perish. The local description regarding the Town of Tirupati, its holy shrines and tanks and certain other roads leading from Chandragiri is very beautifully described. The author says that even the Pandiyans, Cholas, Yadavas and lastly Kailurs who tried to know much about the Tirupati mountains, were abstained from doing so by the ruling deity.

The name of the author and the sources of information obtained for recording this Kaifiyat are not mentioned.

The other works in this volume are described in D. No. 81.

This Kaifiyat begins on folio 31 and is recorded on hand-made country paper. The Kaifiyat contains 20 pages and a large number of overwriting and striking is found. A small Kaifiyat narrating the ordinary festivals has been described in D. No. 84.

This narrates about the principal annual festivals, such as Bramotsavams, etc., celebrated in the temples of Srinivasa, Govinda Raja, Padmavati and other temples attached to Tirumalai Devastanam. The dates on which these festivals should be observed and the number of days each Utsavam should be conducted has been explained in detail.

The preliminary functions that are usually observed such as bestowing honours, and distributing holy waters and taking oaths before the God by the Jee Ayengar, the senior and the junior, and the other officials attached to the Devastanam are explained. The Kaifiyat further explains the programme that should be observed during the days of festival and mentions the name and the quantity of the edibles that should be prepared for offering the same to the Gods. Then how the distribution of the same is to be done is also explained. A separate section deals with the duties of both the superior and inferior officials attached to the devastanam and the persons or deputies from the Mutt of the Jee Ayengar and specifically defines their duties and their hereditary privileges and rights, to which they are entitled to in the Tirumalai-Tirupati Devastanam.

The other works in this volume are explained in D. No. 16,

This contains 12 pages and begins on folio No. 23 and describes the origin and the history of a town by name Thiruvakarai and its surrounding hills, towns and villages and the temples in them. This town is said to be in the taluk of Valandavoor in the Arcot district. This town is said to be a most important place containing a large number of temples and stone inscriptions, and was considered as a strong hold by the Jains and Buddhists. The origin of this town and the temples are traced from the early Pallavas dynasty up to Hyderali. In the first page of the Kaifiyat it is stated that this was transcribed on the 12th January 1817.

The last section deals with the invasion of Hyderali and describes that Venkana Sastri, a learned Brahmin attached to the temples of Karnavakarai and Tiruvannamalai, is said to have removed all the original records relating to the history and the copper plates, wherein the endowments granted by the Rajas to an interior place and concealed them in a newly constructed temple to Vinayagar. That temple is said to exist even now and the God is called as Sundara Vinayagar. In concluding the narration the author explains that he was able to secure certain documents which were in the possession of two elderly Brahmin Gurukals, Appa Gurukal and Chendrasekara Gurukal residing at Tiruvakarai and recorded them on the 12th January 1817.

The Kaifiyat is highly interesting and provides highly valuable historic information and requires elaborate scrutiny. The Kaifiyat neither states the dates for the episodes alluded in it nor the name of the scribe.

This Kaifiyat begins on folio No. 39 and is recorded on hand made country paper.

In the first folio of the Kaifiyat it is stated that this narration relating to the origin and history of Thinivakarai and its surroundings with the temples and the stone inscriptions described in it were translated by one Venkata Rao for Scot Brown in 1817.

There is very little difference between this Kaifiyat and the foregone one. The slokas which are recorded in this are omitted in (Kaifiyat No. 91). In the previous Kaifiyat the slokas are recorded in Nagari characters. The Kaifiyat contains 18 folios. In other respects the contents of this Kaifiyat are the same as the Kaifiyat described previously; the beginning and the end are also similar and hence they are not recorded.

The other works in this volume are explained in D. No. 4.

This Kaifiyat begins on folio No. 709 and is recorded on English paper of foolscap size. There are four folios explaining the narration. Though the handwriting seems to be legible there are words either spelt badly or recorded without punctuation. The handwriting is bad and contains a large number of omissions.

This Kaifiyat narrates that a certain Raja (whose name and other particulars not mentioned) subjugated certain wild tracts at Thondarmandalam previous to the conquest of the Chola Kings. This king was childless for a very long time, and after hard penance, the God blessed him with a son and he became the successor of the former. He is said to have crowned himself as Thondarmandal Chakravarti. By the supernatural powers of the Brahmins he is said to have secured a large treasure, trove and made much improvements to his Kingdom. He is said to have proceeded to Sri Sailam and passed the rest of his life there.

The Kaifiyat makes mention of the names Sri Ranga Yadava Rayalu, Vira Narshima Rayalu and other rulers of great power. During the invasions of the Moguls and the Marathas this ancient town is said to have suffered a considerable damage. The Kaifiyat does not clearly state who conquered and ruled that place. Neither the name of the scribe nor the dates on which the incidents that are said to have occurred are mentioned.

In concluding the paper it is stated that the informations for recording this Kaifiyat were secured by going through certain palm leaves possessed by some elderly persons of the locality.

The other works in this volume are explained in D. No. 4.

This Kaifiyat begins on folio No. 12, describing the history of the three kings who ruled at Kanchi and Thondarmandal and their efforts to spread Jainism in the south and the gist of the stone inscriptions recorded by them at Kanchi, Tirnamalai and on certain hills round Tirnamalai. This Kaifiyat and Kaifiyat No. 30 are recorded in continuity (and the latter from folio 14).

In the last days of his rule, one, Thonda Raja ruler in Northern India invaded and defeated this Manar Bhut and put him to death. This Thondaman, an ardent Saivite, constructed the sixty-four temples for Siva at Tirnamalai. He pulled down a number of Jain temples at Kanchi. He is said to have coronated as Thondaman Chakravarti with Kanchi as his capital. A note on the first page states that this was translated by Baboo Rao on the 28th August 1816.

It is stated that one Venkatesa Sastri, a resident of Chathuranga Patnam, transcribed this on the 28th August 1816.

This is a transcription of Kaifiyat No. 94 and Kaifiyat No. 30 recorded continuously, explaining the history of the Rajas of Thondamandalam, their zeal for the Jainism, the climax and downfall of the same, the spread of Saivism and the construction of temples and the stone inscriptions in them and such other details. The beginning and the end are the same of the above. Hence it is not recorded.

The first section deals with the twenty-four Thirthankaras, sixteen Manus and twelve Chakravarties and the origin of the Jainism. The second section describes the territorial conquests and the expansion of Jain faith in South India by Chamundi Sagar Raja.

The last three sections explain the successive rule of the Cholas, Pandias and the Naicks of Vijia Nagar. Thondamandal became a target for every powerful ruler and experienced severe attacks by the Moguls and the Marathas. The Kaifiyat provides the names of various cities and towns that flourished and the history attached to them is briefly described. The Kaifiyat ends on folio 38a and makes no mention of either the name of the author or the sources of information for recording this narration. The Kaifiyat may be considered important for it gives a lot of information regarding the origin, spread and downfall of the Jainism and the history of the early rulers of Thondamandalam.

This is an incomplete Kaifiyat narrating the origin and history of the country "Tholi Desha" and the creation of a new set of Brahmins in that country. This is recorded on English papers of foolscap size and the record is fading owing to the poor quality of ink used for copying.

It is stated that Parasu Rama being enraged and the insult and death caused by King Kartha Veerya Arjuna, persecuted all the Rajas and captured all their possessions. He invoked the Sea God to grant him a new land, at the southernmost corner near Kanniakumari. Parsu-rama appointed one Moosoor Varma as the King of this newly obtained

which is land called as Thooloo Desha or Tholi Desha. The Kaifiyat then mentions certain fables which are of less importance. This contains four pages. The name of the author and the sources of information obtained for recording this Kaifiyat are not mentioned.

This Kaifiyat narrates the origin and the history of Thiruvavoor and the temples of Thiagarajaswami and Adhipureswaraswami at Mangapur. The writing is legible and is recorded on hand made country paper of quarter size and contains eight pages.

It is stated that once Thiruvavoor was covered with dense forest. Goddess Kali and Adhipureswaraswami incarnated here and the former is said to have caused the death of a large bulk of the population of this village. She is said to have married a Goldsmith. This village which became a deserted one was reconstructed by Chennappa Naick, a ruler of Naick dynasty.

The second chapter describes the finding out of Thiagarajaswami in the tank at Mangapur and consecrating the same in the temple of Adhipureswaraswami. The subjugation of kali by Sankaracharya is described in the third section. These shrines are said to have

been visited by a large number of Rajas who granted endowments for their upkeep. The Kaifiyat mentions some common fables and legends which are less useful.

The narration makes no mention about the name of the author or the sources of information secured for recording this kaifiyat.

This record appears on the 67th page of this volume. The handwriting is fair and legible. A large number of words misspelt and badly punctuated can be observed throughout the record. The first few pages in the beginning and some in the end are missing. This seems to be a transcription of a big work wherein the origin and the history of a Town called Dhar is explained. The genealogy of the Cholas and that of Naicks of Vijianagar and the names of the rulers and the period they ruled are described. The stories explaining the life of Vikramaditia and of Shaliwahana are also narrated briefly. Though the Kaifiyat bears the title as "Dhar Nagar Kaifiyat" very little information is provided about this place. It is said that this town was once inhabited by thieves and wild animals. Hari Har and Bookha with their joint efforts cleared the wilderness and laid out a town and called it by a Hindu name. This name is not readable. During the invasion of the Moguls it is stated that this place was conquered by them and renamed as Dhar Nagar. A small temple dedicated to the Goddess Kali is mentioned. The Kaifiyat explains very little worth recording. Since the Kaifiyat is incomplete the name of the author and the sources of informations are not provided. The word "Ranga" is found at the end of the record.

Basavappa, the original founder of the Kelandhi State, is said to have acquired a big treasure trove and an image of Rameswar Lingam in the wilderness of Kelandhi. His two sons Chāundappa and Badrapallal constructed a portion and named it as Nagar (or Nagaram) SadasivaNaick the son of Chāundappa became a close ally to the Raja of Anagondi, and he is said to have assisted in founding out the Rayalu dynasty of Vija Nagaram. Episode relating the origin and the history of the Sringeri Mutt and its four branches, is described in detail. These mutts are said to have received a good patronage by the Naick rulers.

The circumstances relating the origin of Virupaksha Swami and the construction of the temple and the other benefits it received by the Nayak dynasty is also explained.

The rise and the down fall of the Nayacks of Nagar and Kelandhi—and the invasion of Hyder Ali and the capture of these two forts by him are mentioned. Dates in Salivahana are mentioned in one or two places. The name of the author the scribe and the sources of information secured for recording this document are not mentioned.

One Basavappa, a merchant laid the foundations of this fort. He with his wife and two sons Chāundappa and Budrapallal, by the divine power secured a treasure trove and the image of Ramalingam. The mythological legend generally attached to promising persons is explained in detail. The birth of Sadasiva Raya to Chāundappa and the visit of Harihara and Bookha to Kelandhi is described briefly. The Kaifiyat is incomplete; the name of the author, the sources of information and dates for the incidents narrated are not mentioned.

This incomplete and highly damaged document contains 60 folios and is recorded on thin hand made country paper. The handwriting is fairly legible. Some folios both in the middle and the end are missing. The first section of this document describes the Pauranical fable of Agastya humbling the pride of the Vindhya mountains. The immigration of the Brahmins from the north to the south of the Peninsula and the establishment of Agraharams and temples in the south of Vindhyas is also elaborately explained. Here the document ends as some folios are missing. The second section deals with the origin and the history of the Brahmins at Gaya. Certain fable regarding a King named Nandana Chacraverti is described. This king is said to have bequeathed a big village to the Brahmins as Inam and this was called to be Nandavar Gav. The Kaifiyat further describes very briefly about the origin of Pancha Dravida Brahmins and Gauda Brahmins.

In one of the folios brief mention is made about the Nandi Varma dynasty. Here the record concludes apparently without a proper end. The name of the author the source of information received for recording this Kaifiyat and the dates for the episodes alluded to are not mentioned.

The other works in the volume are described in D. No. 2.

This incomplete historic narration begins on folio No. 130 and is recorded on hand-made country paper of foolscap size. This has been divided into 134 paragraphs. The Kaifiyat begins on folio 132. It describes the parentage, birth and the boyhood of Asaf Jah. His adventurous spirit and haughty character earned the hatred of his master and this made him flee to the Court of Alamgeer at Delhi. After the death of Jahander Sha, the Subehdar of Deccan, Alamgeer appointed Asaf Jah as the Subehdar of Deccan.

The narration further states about the campaigns Asaf fought at Lahore, his capture of Golkonda and the battle of Thanesh and Bahadur Sha and the subjugation and annexation of Bijapur.

References regarding the dismissal and death of Killich Khan and the defeat of Ali Abdul Sha and his fleet to Srirangapatam are mentioned in folios 259 to 260. Folios 262 to 266 describe briefly the history of Hydrali Khan—the Battle between Khambaksh and Bahadur Sha and the defeat and murder of Khambaksh and such other events that took place at the Mogul Court in Delhi. The various engagements that took place between Asaf and the Subehdars of Bijapur and Golkonda, the condition in the South and the Carnatic and the war of succession to the throne of Hyderabad fought by various claimants is described very elaborately.

The Kaifiyat further describes the part played by the Nawabs of Arcot and Trichinopoly, Bussy and Lawlly and the Marathas who sided the rival claimants in helping them to secure the throne of Hyderabad. The Kaifiyat makes mention of the history of the Peshwas and the causes that led to the down fall of the Marathas.

In the last few folios the wars fought by the Marathas siding Nazar Jung against Niyamathullakhan and Salabath Jung and the capture of Fort Askher is described. The part played by Janogee Shinde, Malahir Rao Holker and the Gaekward on one side and the part played by Nana Sahib and Vivasa Rao in moulding the fallen Maratha Empire and the decisive battle of Paniput that settled the fate of Marathas have been very graphically described. Here the account stops; so it is

uncertain whether the writer neglected to proceed further or the rest of the record missing is not furnished. Though the various events are discussed very elaborately, the dates for the occurrences are not provided.

The other works in this volume are explained in D. No. 48.

This Kaifiyat begins on folio No. 40 describing the origin and the history of Ghatikachalam and the temple dedicated to Narasimhaswami.

The Kaifiyat explains that one Vama Deva Rishi made penance and received the blessings of Lord Vishnu who appeared in the form of Narshima. It is stated that the wilderness where he received the blessings was very near Ghatikachalam. To commemorate the happy occasion and perpetuate the event, Vamadeva with the assistance of his friends and followers constructed a temple to Narshima Swami and brought up a small village and called it a Narshimapur. The narration further explains the various marvels by taking a bath in the tank attached to the temple, the divine powers of the deity and, the names of the devotees, Krishna Deva Raya of VijiaNagar renovated the temple and added some more spacious buildings and high towers to the temple. He is said to have granted extensive landed endowments to the temple. Certain other names of the dates in Salivahana calendar have been mentioned in two or three places but they are not legible. It is stated in the conclusion, that the subject-matter of this Kaifiyat

was gathered from the stone inscriptions recorded on the inner walls of the temple. Neither the date nor the name of the person who transcribed this is mentioned. This place is said to have been taken under the custody of East India Company. Two or three sentences in Telugu are found in the last part of the Kaifiyat.

The other works in this volume are explained in D. No. 61.

This Kaifiyat of great celebrity begins on folio No. 59 and is recorded on hand made country paper. This contains 49 pages, the handwriting is good; and certain portions in some folios are found injured. The Kaifiyat describes the ancient and famous Vaishnavite Shrine dedicated to Sri Narshima Swami at Goormakonda. As a mark of gratitude the Gods constructed this temple to commemorate the happy occurrence of Lord Vishnu's incarnation in the form of a man-lion and destroying the demon King Hiranya, the father of Prahalada. The destruction of the demon King was said to have occurred in the thick wilderness very near the Seshadri Range; Hence it was called as Goorma-Konda. Sage Narada is the first person to propitiate the idol of Sri Narashima Swami. A brief account relating to the names of the devotees who worshipped here and attained the blessing of the God is described,

The second part containing nearly 20 folios elaborately explains the names of the originators of the various weekly, monthly and annual festivals which are conducted in the temple.

The third section describes the arrangements that were made by the Paligars, for managing the temple and its properties. The temple is said to be frequented by a large number of devotees, annually, who paid their homages in the form of cash and kind.

Harika and Harihara, when they became powerful they took up the management of the temple and the properties and arranged to celebrate the festivals and the daily worships conducted in the temple in a more splendid manner. The Nayak Rajas of Vijia Nagar contributed larger endowments of landed properties and improved the construction of the buildings of the temple. Donations by Thirumanghai Naidu and Vijia Ragava is separately scheduled. The grants made for paying the salaries of the servants attached to the temple and the services they are expected to render in the temple is also stated. A special reference is made relating to the grant of four villages by Krishnappa Naidu.

Brief history of the formation of the Vaishnavite Mutt and the religious heads and how they became attached to the temple is described. The invasion of the Moslums of the North, the subjugation of the Vijia Nagar State and the state of the temple in the hands of the Moslum conquerors and how the properties of the temple were looted is explained.

The temple is said to contain a large number of inscriptions recorded on the stone walls in the inner side of the temple explaining the names of the persons who granted endowments and such other particulars. The Kaifiyat gives out neither the name of the author nor the sources of information for recording the Kaifiyat. But it has to be presumed that this narration would be an extract of the subject-matter found in the stone inscriptions recorded in the temple.

The other works in this volume are explained in D. No. 16.

This Kaifiyat appears on the 33rd folio and has been recorded on blue English paper of foolscap size. The handwriting is fair and legible. This record contains 6 pages and an explanatory note in English appears in the first folio explaining briefly the contents of the narration.

The record seems to be a compilation of various facts gathered from the old persons residing at Nagore. In the beginning Chandrasekara Raja cleared the wilderness on the western side of Nagoor and constructed a beautiful town and a temple to Shiva: owing to the unhealthy condition of the town the residents migrated to the west of the newly constructed city. During the regime of Jai Konda Chollan, a town was constructed and was called Nagoor. Here the narration breaks; and begins to explain the life of Meera Sahib.

In Hijiri 865, Sha Mohammed Hamid Kadher Shaib, afterwards known familiarly as Meera Sahib, with his father Sayed Hassan Kadher Shaib, and mother Fatimma Bibi came to Nagoor. They were said to belong to Manikapur. The Kaifiyat explains the miracles rendered by this Mohammed Kadher from his childhood up to his eighteenth year. It is stated that he proceeded to Mecca and became the disciple of the Saint Sayid Mahammed Gour Qualing (गुबालिरी). This Saint is said to have offered his daughter in marriage to this trusted disciple. Meera Sahib returned to Nagoor. The date of his arrival at Nagoor or the place where he resided is not mentioned. He used to hold prayers on the sea shore at Nagoor which was attended by devotees of various religions. He had two sons and two daughters, the name of the eldest being Yusuf. Meera Sahib predicted the date of his death and expressed his desire that he should be buried on the spot where he leaves his life. He died on the 10th of Muharam Hijiri 929 at the age of 68. Yusuf, his eldest son who was much attached towards his father constructed, a small Gori and was worshipping it.

The episode narrating how Thirumala Chetty, an officer serving in the East India Company, was tried and sentenced to death for committing misappropriation and for manufacturing counterfeit coins. He prayed Meera Sahib to save his life; the episode describes the circumstances, which compelled the officer to set aside the death sentence. In

commemoration of his acquittal and as a token of gratitude, he constructed a very big minaret and certain tombs. This is said to have occurred in Hijiri 1010.

There are six other minarets with stone inscriptions on them indicating the name of the person who constructed, the height and the purpose for which they were built. The name of the author or the sources of information for recording this narration is not mentioned. The Kaifiyat is said to have been recorded on the 27th September 1817.

This Kaifiyat begins on folio No. 57, and is recorded on hand-made country paper. The handwriting is legible but owing to the antiquity of the record, the folios are damaged. This may be considered as a transcription of previous Kaifiyat bearing D. No. 107. Some minor difference can be noted in the wordings but the subject-matter is the same. Some more fables or acts of miracles are explained. The construction of certain Masjids and how a large number of his admirers became his disciples is explained. Further the Kaifiyat narrates about the pilgrimage of Meera Sahib. The name of the author or the sources of information or the dates for the miracles and other marvellous acts

of Meera Sahib are not mentioned. An explanatory note in English describing the subject-matter of the narration is found in the first folio of the Kaifiyat. This Kaifiyat contains 34 pages.

The end is the same as is found in the previous Kaifiyat.

This Kaifiyat begins on folio 52 and is recorded on hand-made country paper. The first few pages and some folios in the end are wanting to make the Kaifiyat complete. The name of the author, the sources of information and the date of the Kaifiyat are not mentioned.

In folio 52 tables relating to the exchanges and the valuation of the Maratha currency and the equivalent value of the money with that of the Moghals and the East India Company is given. The names and the denominations of the various gold and silver coins used in the Maratha country are scheduled.

In the succeeding two folios the names of the various states and the currency of those states for instance, the coins of various denominations used in Surat and Delhi are explained. The second chapter discusses the weights and measures used in the Maratha country. This Kaifiyat may be considered less important as it gives no definite information regarding the weights and measures. The folios are not correctly arranged.

The other works in this volume are described in D. No. 37.

This Kaifiyat begins on folio No. 691 and contains 36 folios. A fore word in the beginning expresses that this was a transcription of an original Maratha record. Baker No. Countermarked 920.

This document contains accounts relating to the detailed history of the Marathas and especially the lives of Nana Sahib, Visvasa Rao and such other personalities. At the beginning Abaji Sahib is represented as inquiring into the past history of his race, which is narrated to him by the author. It is stated that several persons gave, what all they knew about the lives of the Maratha veterans and what they said was recorded on a roll of country paper. Two dates are mentioned in this Kaifiyāt. The first being the date on which the original was recorded (Sabtam 13th lornar day) Maga month and the other is the date on which it was transcribed 1st of Maga Rowdri year. The original manuscript is said to be one of the collections found in the possession of Nana Fadnavis. This Kaifiyāt contains a large number of words misspelt and blank spaces can be noticed in several folios. The last word with which the Kaifiyat ends is "Rangappa" and from this it is to be presumed that this Rangappa would be the person employed for restoring the manuscript.

The first ten folios of this document describe the history of the Nana Sahib and the circumstances under which he rose to prominence.

The next ten folios describe the position of the Moghul emperor at Delhi and that of the Nawabs of Carnatic and Hyderabad. The battles that were fought and the policy of the territorial expansion of the Peshavas especially in the days of Balaji Baji Rao and Rangunatha Rao Peshvas.

The Kaifiyat further explains the brilliant part played by Swai Madav Rao, Indu Rao Ghorpahde, Magādaji Sindiamudhji Boasle and other persons whose names are given.

The dates of accession and the death of the Peshvas and other events of historical importance are recorded in Salivahana Era.

This document may be considered as historically important and a close study of it will bring to light so many things relating to the splendour of the Maratha Court and confideracy.

At the close, it is stated that this document was transcribed by a special request, for Major Mackenzie.

The other works in this volume are (1) the account of the Yadava Rulers of Chandragiri 657 to 698.

The Kaifiyat begins on folio No. 665 and is recorded on foolscap paper. This is said to be a transcription of a roll of manuscript recorded on country paper. A note in English in the beginning states that this was restored from a roll of country paper manuscript which was without title or mark or number—relating to the history of the administration of Nanafadnavis. Some of the orders issued to the subordinates are also mentioned. Some of the orders begin with long salutations and in

some cases long narrations describing certain wars fought by Ragunatha Rao, Peshva and the Naizams are described. Blank spaces can be noticed in all folios and it has to be presumed these spaces represent that certain words are missing in the original.

The last portion deals with the character and the administrative ability of Nanafadnavis and Visvasa Rao. Instances relating to the appointment of certain trustworthy friends as Commanders and administrators can be also noticed.

It is stated that a clerk serving under Col. Mackenzie by name Rangappa has transcribed this from the original.

This Kaifiyat begins on folio No. 20 and is recorded on English-made paper of foolscap size giving particulars relating to the formation of Palipats or Jageers in the Province of Bangalore. It is stated that Senior Veera Gounda and his six brothers, residing at Kanchipuram emigrated to north and colonised themselves as paligars in the province of Bangalore.

The second section deals with the history of Veera Gounda at Ellatham in S.S. 1380.

The third section deals with the origin of Bangalore and how it was annexed by Veera Gounda. Innappa Gounda was said to be the originator of Bangalore and was defeated by Veerappa. The construction of certain temples and his contribution of extensive landed properties to a number of institutions and individuals are also explained.

The Moghuls invaded Bangalore under the leadership of Ranajoolu Khan. The names of the descendants of Veerappa Gounda up to Muthu Kappa Gounda are mentioned. The invasion by Hyder Ali Khan and the capture of Srirangapatnam and Mysore and how Bangalore was brought under his rule is very graphically described.

The name of the author or the sources of information obtained for recording this narration are not mentioned.

The Kaifiyat begins on the first folio of this volume, and has been recorded on thin paper of quarter size.

This Kaifiyat deals with the founding of Narayanapuri, and the image of Sri Govinda Raju Swamin and a brief history of the Rama Raja dynasty.

The lives of Kulothunga and Karikala Chola are briefly described. The Kaifiyat further proceeds about the story of the penance at Seshachalam made by Kulothunga and how he was blessed with a son. This child was named as Chakravarti. Sri Govindarajaswami Temple at Tirupati is said to have been constructed by him.

The few folios deal with the genealogy of the Chola dynasty up to Narayana Raja and the construction of Narayanapuri in the vicinity of the Tirupati Hills.

The biography of Narayana Raja, Accana Raja and Mittra Varma have been very briefly explained.

The last section of the Kaifiyat, explains, the circumstances under which Venkata Raja, the last ruler of Narayanapuri was defeated by a barbarian inhabiting at the Tirupati Hills. The name of the barbarian is not mentioned. In conclusion a long list of the names of the various rulers of Rama Raja dynasty is described.

This document bears neither the name of the scribe nor any date or the sources of information secured for recording this Kaifiyat.

This record begins on folio No. 132 and has been recorded on thin paper of quarter size. Though the Kaifiyat is titled as "Panchavati Kaifiyat" more details such as the local history of Nasic, Thiriambak and the biography of Hemada panth the originator of Modi script and the origin and the causes of the various courses and flow of the waters of rivers Ganges and Godavari are explained.

Hemada panth was said to have attempted to construct banks on either side of the Ganges and the Godavari. He is said to have constructed banks for nearly three miles. But any date or such of the proofs for his work are not provided.

This Hemada panth is said to have made a lot of improvements both to the defence of the Fort and for the amenities of the inhabitants. He is said to be also a famous doctor.

The Kaifiyat concludes without mentioning the name of the author, or the dates of the various episodes alluded to or the sources of information obtained to record the Kaifiyat.

This record appears on folio No. 110, and has been recorded on thin paper. The handwriting is fair and legible. This seems to be a copy of an original letter addressed to Ganesh Rao by Babooji Umaji in the form of a reply explaining the history relating to Rama Raja and the origin of establishing Devagiri State. The letter bears neither the signature of the writer nor the date on which it was written.

The folios are not correctly arranged.

The Kaifiyat not only explains the history of Devagiri but also provides more details about certain historically important personalities and also about the sacred places of pilgrimages and about the sanctity of the holy waters of certain famous rivers of the Northern India.

The second section of the Kaifiyat describes the construction of Fort Devagiri and the appointment of Hemada Panth as the Minister of the State.

The history of Joonath State and its rulers are also briefly explained. List of names of the princes who ruled Nasic, Panchavati and Thirumbak are also provided. The names of the Marathi Rulers and Chieftains such as Mularji Holkar, Powar, Thirumbak Rao, Deva Rao Pingle, Ragnatha Bhut, Gopy Boi, Naro Shanker and Ahilia Boi and the constructions and the improvements they made to the temples, Mutts and choultries and the amenities to the pilgrims are very concisely described.

The Kaifiyat makes no mention of the name of the transcriber or the date on which it was written or it was transcribed, or the name of the person or his address who possessed the original record.

Thirumalai Naick ruler of Tanjore, Trichinopoly and Madura, is said to have in his service, a very trustworthy and brave servant known as Kumaragiri. This Kumaragiri defeated and subdued the unruly

Sivappa, Palaigar of Vodiarpalaia. In gratification for the meritorious and heroic services rendered by Kumaragiri in subduing the Vodiarpalaia Paliagar, Thirumala Naick granted certain villages. He requested Kumaragiri to construct a fort and maintain an army and oblige him at times of necessity. The Fort constructed by Kumaragiri was known as Fort Pandanallur and he became the Palaigar of that Fort.

In concluding the narration, this Palaigar of Kadalangudi is said to have found out a big treasure trove ; he is said to have spent large sums of money in constructing and renovating the various temples and chatrams.

A short geographical survey of Pandanallur mentioning the names and the number of temples and tanks, etc., may be found in the end of the last folio of the Kaifiyat. The Fort is said to have been demolished by Hyder. The name of the scribe or the date, or the sources of information obtained for recording the Kaifiyat is not mentioned.

This is said to be a true transcription of the original owned by Bhavanji of Ahamed Nagar, and was copied as per the special orders of Colonel Mckenzie, dated 23rd December 1805.

This record appears on folio No. 152 and has been recorded on thin country made paper. The volume is a quarto, country paper and half bound. The first 22 pages are wanting to make the Kaifiyat a complete

one. Detail description of the originators of Pattna and Guzarat from Salivahana Saka 515 up to their conquest by Arabs, Moguls and finally by the Pshewas has been very elaborately given mentioning dates for all important historic incidents. The names of the rulers from the original founder Deva Rishi up to the last Raja have been mentioned marking the period they ruled. The names of the Jain and Buddhist poets and how they secured the supremacy at Guzarat during the reign of Jai Sing are well explained. Much importance has been attached to reign of Jai Sing and his son-in-law Vira Sena. The various intrigues in the Court at Guzarat and Pattana and how the rulers thereby became less powerful is very graphically described. The circumstances that led to the annexation of the surrounding towns by Jai Sing and the fables and legends of less importance can be noted in the last few folios of the Kaifiyat.

The last section of the record, states that the Arabs under the command of Ahmed-u-Jung marched from Arabia and conquered the country. The account narrates the strong resistance showed by the Hindus and the withdrawal of the Arabs from Guzarat leaving the task of reconquering Pattna and Guzarat to one of descendants Sultan-Ajam-ud-Jah. Finally both these two places were conquered by Peshwa Baji Rao. It is stated that the original manuscript in Guzarati script, was owned by a Jain Koshalen—Vajendra Jain and at the special desire of Major Mackenzie this was transcribed in Modi character by Appadi Mesur at Mula Multan on the 24th July 1806.

This describes the names of the Commanders such as Sadasiva Rao, Baboo Visvas Rao, Nama Sahib and Murari Rao, Holker who took active part in leading the Maratha army against Inaitula Khan, Nazarjung, Hiderali Khan and others who commanded the Mohamadan army. The battle is said to have begun at Delhi.

The heroic part played by Visvasa Rao and Sadasiva Bahoo in defeating Abdali at the cost of their lives have been very graphically described. List showing the names of the warriors who died during active service on either side is given.

The battle between Sudyatula Khan and Nijuba Khan Rohella with Balaji Baji Rao at Panipat and the death of Balaji Baji Rao Peshwa is described. The succession and the administration of the latter Peshwas were also explained. Dates in Saliwhana Era have been provided for all the important occurrences that took place both during the Maratha Rule and that of the Peshwas. Some references have been made regarding Ganeswar, the Maratha Poet and the date on which he died is also noted. This document is said to have been transcribed by Narayana Rao and Ananda Rao from the original record possessed by Bachobo, a resident of Paitan on the 25th day of July 1807.

This describes the local history of two places, namely. Porul Vaitha Sethi and Papa Kovil. History of these two villages is traced from the days of Karunakara Thondaman who was ruling at Tiruvarur. He is said to be the originator of the two temples in the abovesaid villages. The extracts on the stone inscriptions found in these temples, granting endowments and jewels to the deities in the temples are also provided. Legends relating to the divinity of the Gods are also described. The local Geography of the villages and short history of the people who resided in these villages and the finding out of the treasure troves in these villages by certain European officers, etc., are explained in detail. These two villages are said to be in Keevalur taluk, Tanjore district. This Kaifiyat is said to have been prepared from the information collected from the aged residents of this village and was completed on the 28th day of December 1817.

It gives particulars of the total number of villages granted as endowment to the various temples in the district of Madura. Particulars relating to the Sarwamanians, Ardamanians and the gardens and buildings granted as endowments to the temples of Sri Meenakshi and Alagiri-swami in particular are described more elaborately. Accounts relating to the extent of the inam lands belonging to the various charitable institutions and individuals in the district of Madura rough estimates regarding the income derived from these villages are also provided. Some words in Urdu can be noticed on the top right hand side of the first folio. Neither the name of the author nor the sources of information obtained for recording this document is provided.

This Kaifiyat provides more detailed account for the army under Narasinga Khade Rao. Particulars relating to the jageers granted to certain high officers serving under the Peshwa and the duties assigned to them are also briefly described.

In concluding the Kaifiyat it has been stated that this was copied from the original accounts of the Peshwas.

The name of the author nor the date on which this record was copied is not mentioned. Few lines are drawn and left blank.

The other work in this volume is Hyder and Tippusultan Kaifiyat ; this record appears on the 90th folio of this volume and has been recorded on English-made paper of foolscap size. The folios are brown and brittle. The handwriting is fair and legible.

This Kaifiyat describes the origin and the history of Bada Balapur, a city in the Province of Mysore.

The origin is traced from Fasli 948 and the gradual growth of the town is described.

It is stated that three brothers (Bahir Gounda and two others) of Canchipuram, being unable to support themselves migrated to the Town of PAYINGHAT and lived in small huts. It is stated that three large boxes came down the river containing the images of these deities and the same were picked up by the Gounda who constructed temples for them. The founder of the idols had a vision in the night, pointing out to a certain place where buried treasures were to be found, and directing the finder to construct a fortress and temples to the images. The fort which was constructed from the wealth of the hidden treasure was named as Bada Balapur, the Kaifiyat provides in detail the names of the descendants of the original founder and the number of years each ruled.

The third chapter of this describes the territorial expansion of Shivaji in the South. The dates on which he invaded Bada Balapur and conquered the same. The names of the persons whom he nominated to govern the forts are also mentioned. The history of the Peshwas and their rule regarding the territories in the south up to Parasuram Bheo is graphically described. The raise of Hyder and the conquest of Mysore, etc., by him and the rule of Tippusultan and how the English finally subjugated and conquered the entire Mysore province including Bada Balapur and the appointment of Krishna Raja Wodiyar as the ruler of Mysore is the contents of the rest of the Kaifiyat. The name of the author or the sources of information for recording this Kaifiyat is not mentioned. This Kaifiyat may be considered as historically important since the History of the Marathas and their conquest of the province of Mysore is dealt.

This record is short and gives different version regarding the founding of the Fort of Bada Ballapur, the legendary description regarding to the vision of the buried fortune and the securing of the idols that came floating in the river and the construction of the forts and the consecration of the idols in their respective temples constructed by Baira Gounda corroborates with that of the information alluded to in the foregoing Kaifiyat. This record provides the information relating to the birth of Chick Gounda to Baira Gounda and the construction of certain temples.

The Kaifiyat concludes that during the last days of Baira Gounda, he appointed his brother Thimmana Gounda to rule Bada Ballapur during the minority of his son. The record makes no mention of either the sources of information obtained for recording this, or the name of the person or the date on which it was recorded.

This is a short account of Balala Raya Durg. Its origin in this paper is ascribed to one BAKTALA RAYA under the following circumstances. It is stated that a Jain hermit was giving lot of trouble to the people of neighbourhood. This ascetic was said to have been killed by Baktala Raya by attaining the blessings of God Rama. The people rewarded this Baktala Raya with large wealth and by this he strengthened himself and conquered extensive places and built fort after fort. The first and the foremost he constructed was Raja Durga. He is said to have three sons, and they ruled in succession. At an early period of the second son the place is said to have been conquered by the Moguls and what all took place during their rule is mentioned. This paper seems to be an imperfect account of the origin of the Hoyisala dynasty.

It is mentioned that this was transcribed by one copyist named Rangappa.

Since the folios are in torn condition the place of the locality could not be made out. Both the beginning and end are in torn condition.

This is a short account of Rayadoorg. The origin of this place and the history of Bakhtala Raya are described.

A Jain ascetic greatly troubled the people of the neighbourhood and the abovesaid Bakhtala by the divine power he attained by the blessings of God Rama killed the Jain ascetic. The people in gratification for helping them by killing the ascetic, gave a large sum of money with; the means of this wealth he gathered an army and strengthened himself and conquered extensive districts and constructed several fortresses. The first fort he constructed was named as Rayadoorg. The Kaifiyat further

narrates the various details of minor importance. Genealogy of this Raja is also briefly mentioned. This fort is said to have been conquered by the Mohamadans and later by the Marathas. The paper appears to be an imperfect account of the origin of the Hoyisala dynasty and concludes describing the crops cultivated in the neighbourhood. The name of the scribe and the sources of information obtained for recording this Kaifiyat are not mentioned.

This Kaifiyat describes the historic events in the life of Baji Rao Peshva. When he became the Peshva he wanted to annex Aurangabad.

The Mogul Emperor despatched a big army under Nazar Jang to fight the Marathas. Pillagi Jadav, the Maratha Commander assisted by Thukoji Powar. Yeswant Powar and Ranoji Wagh is said to have defeated the Mogul army but seeming that the war was a long drawn one the Marathas persuaded Nazar Jang to change his side and accordingly he became an ally to the Marathas. Thus Aurangabad was completely and successfully annexed to the Maratha confederation.

The *Kaifiyat* explains in detail the places of the events and the number of persons engaged by each side in the war.

List showing the favours granted to Nazar Jang for the timely help is also mentioned. Episodes like the death of Baji Rao Peshwa at Ujain on the banks of the Narbada and the accession of Nanna Fadnavis to the place of Peshwa are also described very graphically. A separate portion of the *Kaifiyat* deals with the administration of the Marathas at Poona.

In concluding the narration it is stated that the above mentioned account was collected from a memorandum kept in possession of Koolkarani Shama Rao of Ahmednagar and was transcribed as per the request of Col. Mackenzie the 23rd day of December 1805 at Ahmednagar.

the first page it is stated that the historic event of the great battle between Baji Rao and Thriumbak was explained to Raja Shahu as per request. Baji Rao Peshwa was said to be at the helm of affairs at Guzarat. Thriumbak Rao Thubad, the military Commander of Shahu was promoted as the Governor of Tetingana Districts. He influenced the Raja and got himself posted as the Governor of Guzarat. This was against the will of Baji Rao. For this simple reason both of them declared war against each other. The Kaifiyat describes the chief events and the names of the places and the dates on which the battles were fought. The names of the Maratha warriors and the strength of each side are also mentioned. As the result of this war Thriambak Rao and his colleagues were said to have been killed. Baji Rao retained his Governorship of Guzarat. This narration was said to have been transcribed from the original Kaifiyat possessed by Ganga Ram, a resident of Aurangabad, as per the request of Col. Mackenzie on the 31st day of January 1816.

This paper deals with the early days of the Vijayanagar Kingdom. Barkoorchi is said to be the first place of origin from where the mighty dynasty of the Naick Rulers originated. The names of the first two rulers are provided. Chounda Gounda and his brother Bairava Gounda improved this place and ruled there for eighteen years in succession. This place was said to have been annexed to the principality of Anai Gondi and subsequently to Vijayanagar. Sevappa Naick, last ruler of Barkoochi constructed a number of temples, the names of some of them is mentioned. Certain legends regarding the finding of hidden treasures by certain Rajas and the fame of the stories relating to the Throne of Vikramadita forms the subject-matter of few pages. This place was said to have been conquered by the Jains and the causes of the decline is also described.

The Kaifiyat neither makes mention of the name of the author nor the sources of information obtained for recording this Kaifiyat.

The Kaifiyat is incomplete. Certain boundaries for the kingdom ruled by Bairava Gounda forms the last incomplete line of the narration.

of words mis-spelt ; the first folio describes the legends attached to the origin of this place. In the beginning it is stated that this record explains the origin of Bijapur and its history. This place is said to have been captured by the Marathas. Certain facts relating to the struggle between the Marathas and the Sultans of Bijapur is narrated. The death of Sivaji and the accession of his son Sambaji and how he lost the Maratha Kingdom is explained. The exact trial and the execution of Sambaji and the taking over his infant sons and wife and handing over them to the care of the daughter of Aurangzeb and how the Peshwas came into power is explained in the following two folios. The last two pages refer to the episode how Nanna Saheb was promoted to a responsible post in the Court of the Peshwa. The narration is incomplete. The name of the author and the sources of information obtained for recording this Kaifiyat are not mentioned.

Guru. By the blessings of the Guru, the Gounda secured a large treasure trove. His disciples constructed a small village and called it as Beligi. The record states that the above place was annexed later by Krishna Raja Wodayar of Mysore. This gives no other particulars and the other portion of the Kaifiyat is missing. The name of the author or the sources of information or the date on which this Kaifiyat was recorded is not mentioned.

The paper deals more with the four organised groups in the hunter community. The name of each group and the customs and their manners they observed, and the names of Gods they worshipped are mentioned. The Kaifiyat does not mention the place of the Bedars whose customs and manners are explained. The kaifiyat concludes stating that the females of the Bedar clan also dress themselves like that of the males of Sudra community.

The record neither mentions the name of the author nor the sources of information obtained for recording this Kaifiyat.

The heading of the Kaifiyat is missing; the right hand side margin and the bottom of the folio are also in a crumbling condition. The beginning and the end are the same as described in the foregoing one. This paper is of neither literary nor historic importance.

This paper appears in the 13th page of this volume and has been recorded on English-made paper of foolscap size. The handwriting is fair and legible. The folios are in loose condition.

The record deals with the origin of Belur Fort and the temples in it constructed by Venkatadri Naick, a Paligar promoted to the post of a chieftain by Rama Deva Raya of Are Gondi. Formerly this Fort and

its surroundings were ruled by Veerabalal, the grandson of Vishnu Vardana. Some of the Paligars are said to have become powerful and wanted to overthrow Veerabalal. They sought the help of the Mogals. The battle fought between them on the banks of the Krishna and the Thungabadra is described. Veerabalal finally became exhausted and requested Achutha Raya of Penukonda for help. A treaty was made between the Mogals and the Raja of Penukonda. After the death of Achutha Raya his two brothers Krishna Deva Raya and Rama Raya ruled in succession. During the period of Rama Deva Raya again the Mogals invaded but they were defeated. Being pleased at the brave deeds and loyalty shown by certain paligars Rama Deva Raya made them Jagirdars, Venkatadri Naick was one. He constructed a fort and named it as Belur. Certain temples were constructed by him and endowments were granted to them. These endowments granted to the temples are said to be inscribed on the stone walls of the temple. During the last days of Sevappa Naick, the ruler of Belur took his fort but was again captured by Krishna Deva Raya Wodiar who annexed this to the Mysore State.

The Kaifiyat breaks here. The name of the author or the date on which the Kaifiyat was prepared is mentioned.

The father of Jeenadatta loved and married a girl from the hunter community. The king was much influenced by the lady and he became a puppet in her hands. A son was born to her. She wanted to crown him. In order to set aside the claims of the heir apparent, she successfully persuaded the Raja to murder the first born. But by some mistake the son of the hunter lady was executed. She wanted to kill Jeenadatta by murdering him. Jeenadatta escaped from her and fled to Chitrakota where he constructed some forts out of which Biyer Fort is said to be an important one. The name of the king and that of the hunter lady are not mentioned. The kaifiyat neither describes the name of the author nor the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat. The kaifiyat is an incomplete one.

Each name ends with the word Boir and from this it can be presumed that the rulers had been in the custom of using this word as their surname.

Neither the name of the author nor the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat is mentioned. This record contains no relevant matter pertaining either to history or literature.

The early days of Sri Sankaracharia and how he was blessed by God Parameswara and became an ascetic is narrated. He is said to have also written commentaries on certain Sanskrit works. During his period the Budhist and the Jains began to convert large number of Hindus to their respective religions by antipropaganda against Hindu religion. They also employed certain orators who could debate and defend their new religion. Sankaracharya

by his piety and eloquence reconverted them to their original religion. By explaining various Vedic quotations he created in the mind of Hindus a sense of reluctance towards these new religions. The name of the Buddhist Priests who debated and lost their ground are also mentioned. He is said to have had a large number of disciples ; and out of them Sadananda was the best man. Illustrations to prove his sincerity towards the Guru and how he came to be known as Padmanada is also described. The kaifiyat is closed stating that these episodes form the subject matter of the First Chapter. Neither the name of the author of the work nor the name of the Book from which this chapter is transcribed is mentioned. The handwriting is fair and legible.

The kaifiyat is divided into twenty-six chapters : Blank spaces can be noticed invariably throughout the record.

The kaifiyat narrates the romance of the various Rajas who ruled Bharatpur and the same have been compared to that of the stories illustrated in Maha Bharata. This record contains no important historic

information except the names of certain Rajas of Bharatpur. Its object seems to have been to offer morals and instructions to children of the Rajas, and warning them of the dangers and advise them to shun from evil acts. Some of the tales of Mahabarata are retold. The splendour of Bharatpur is also described. This was said to have been transcribed by one, Narayana Rao, working under Col. Mackenzie from the original record owned by Nana shanker, a resident of Poona, on the 23rd August 1806. The name of the author is not mentioned.

This begins with a long salutation to Regunatha Dada by Regunath Yadve; explaining in detail the battle fought between the Marathas and the Moghuls at Panipat. Special mention is made relating to the chivalry of the Maratha soldiers and much importance attached to the acts of Bahoo Garidi and Sadashiva Rao Bahoo. List showing the names of the campaigns fought and the names of persons wounded and killed in the battle field on either side is provided. This provides certain important and minute details regarding the Battle of Panipat.

In conclusion it is stated that this was written by one Mahadeva Rao. The kaifiyat neither mentions the date of the incidents described in it or the name of the author or the sources of information obtained in recording this kaifiyat.

This kaifiyat, describing the origin and the history of the two towns, Bhoja Rajapatnam and Samaiavaram appears on the first folio of this volume. This is divided into four chapters. The first chapter deals with the reason for Bhoja Raja, a ruler in upper India, to travel to the South and establish a town and a temple to God Shiva near Samaiavaram. Samaiavaram is a town in Trichinopoly district.

The second part narrates briefly the life of Kavi Kalidas.

The third chapter describes the defeat of Bhoja Raja by Veera Deva Ranga Raya of Vijayanagar. The kaifiyat concludes by explaining the circumstances under which Goddess Mariamma was brought from Vijayanagar to the borders of Bhojarajapatnam. In course of time a big temple is said to have been constructed and the small village was called Samaiavaram. This is also a suburb in Trichinopoly. It is stated that the information for recording this kaifiyat was obtained from the stone inscriptions on the walls of the temple. Neither the name of the scribe nor any date is mentioned.

two sons Vitoji and Maloji, the great grandfathers of Shivaji, the Great. Their heroic adventures and the services they rendered to the Sultan of Bijapur and Padshas of Delhi are elaborately described.

The second part of the narration describes the life of Shivaji. The circumstances under which the various fortresses were constructed by the Marathas from the days of Maloji up to Sambaji are mentioned. The names of the persons, who were left to manage the forts and the part played by them in defending the invasions of the Moghuls are very graphically described.

The third part describes briefly the private life of Shivaji. The kaifiyat further provides the names of the trustworthy lieutenants and the part they played in establishing the Maratha confederacy. In conclusion, the capture of Sambaji, his trial by Aurangzeb, his death and the annexation of the Maratha confederacy by Aurangzeb are described. This narration contains good information relating to the Maratha history.

This entire volume is said to have been transcribed by Narayana Rao Ananda Rao on the 25th July 1807 at Poona from the original owned by Bachoba Paitankar.

Dates for all the above are quoted as per Shalivahana calendar. Historic episodes such as the ancestry of the Bhonsles, the parentage of Shivaji, his boyhood, the campaigns he fought for subjugating the Moghuls, and establishing the Maratha empire is very accurately described. The kaifiyat further provides informations, relating to the descendants of Shivaji up to the decline of the Marathas under Shahu. This record may be considered historically important and a careful scrutiny will throw much light on the history of the Marathas. The name of the author or the sources of information secured for recording this narrative is not mentioned.

Full details relating to the origin of the Bhonsle and Jadhav Families which were responsible for producing valiant warriors who founded the Maratha confederacy are given. Their adventures and the services they rendered under the Sultans of Bijapur and Padsha at Delhi and how they gradually became powerful form the second portion of the record. The kaifiyat further explains the history of Sivaji, the Great, from his birth

up to his death, mentioning in detail every episode such as his marches, his coronation at Raigarh, his territorial conquests and acquiring and constructing new Forts. List showing the names of the various Forts with their captains are also provided. The accession of Sambaji, his weakness as a ruler and how he was defeated and be-headed by Aurangazeb forms the contents of the third section. The state of affairs during the rule of Raja Ram, at Sattara and Poona and how Balaji Baji Rao, the first Peshwa came to power forms the last portion of the kaifiyat. Dates for all events as per Shalivahana calender have been provided. This record may be counted as a historically important document.

In conclusion it has been recorded that this document was transcribed by Annand Rao Narayana Rao from the original Manuscript owned by Bachoba Paintanker of Poona on the 27th July 1807.

Informations of minor importance are provided at random, which are of less historic value. The record mentions the history of Vikramaditya and the legends relating to his greatness, such as how he attained greatness, etc. The writer of this kaifiyat in conclusion has stated that he gathered the materials for recording this kaifiyat from various books to the best of his ability.

This place, which was once a very dense forest was converted into a town, with temples and buildings, tanks and streams by one Katharee Gounda. This town is said to be situated on the banks of Thungabhadra river.

When Ganga Raja of Kurumba dynasty was ruling, Katharee Gounda came across a big treasure trove, and informed the king. As a mark of appreciation of the honesty of the Konda, the Raja gave the entire treasure to him, who in turn spent the amount, in constructing temples and tanks and such other good things useful for the public. Since this place was an abode of one Mathu Rishi, Ganga Raya named

the town after the name of the Rishi. This kaifiyat throws no light either on the names of the temples and tanks constructed by the Gounda or the name of the author or the date on which this kaifiyat was recorded.

This explains the incident how Syed Yakub Sahib, the grandson of Syed Abdulla Bhai Fakeer was duped by the East India Company, of a jageer for the services rendered by him in subjugating Tipu Sultan and certain Nawabs of the Carnatic. A few paragraphs describe the miraculous power of Syed Abdulla Fakeer, and how the sons and grandsons of the Fakeer became powerful officers in the Moghul courts and under the Sultan of Bijapur. Some of the grandsons of the Fakeer became very powerful poligars at Madras, Balghat and Srirangapatnam. Syed Yakub was a trustworthy servant of Tipu Sultan. When Lord Martin of the East India Company attacked Srirangapatnam, Syed Yakub assisted the East India Company and brought down the fall of Tipu Sultan. It is stated that in appreciation of his services, the East India Company assured the present of a jageer to Syed Yakub. Since Lord Martin, not fulfil his promise, Yakub repeatedly submitted petitions to the East India Company and no reply was received by him from the Company. The kaifiyat neither mentions the name of the author nor the sources of information obtained for recording this. No dates are also mentioned.

It is stated that this Mayura Varma came from the Kurumba dynasty, who ruled certain tracts near Vijayanagar. The legendary introduction mentions the story how Parsurama was humbled down by Rama and the construction of a town by Parasurama. The record further mentions that Parasurama created certain Brahmins and one of them is the grandfather of Mayura Varma. Long list of names of persons in the Kurumba dynasty is mentioned. Finally it is stated that this dynasty was obliterated by the invasion of Harihara, the founder of the Vijayanagar dynasty. Certain dates in Saliwahana calendar are mentioned. This record was said to have been owned by Subramania Ayya and transcribed by Madava Rao on the 22nd July 1942. Certain Sanskrit stanzas with Marathi interpretation may be found in the kaifiyat.

This volume contains the first thirty-three Chapters and a short introduction for each Chapter. The first Chapter commences on the 42nd page. The folios are in loose condition, and some of them have become pale and brittle and a few perforated by microbes. The history of the Moghuls, the five Sultanates, the origin of the Marathas form the subject-matter of this volume. The handwriting is fair and legible. The name of the scribe is not provided.

This seems to be a copy of the original disclosing neither the name of the author or the date. This contains some legendary anecdotes in its beginning.

He handed over these towns to one of his trustworthy disciples. A short sketch of the Vijianagar history is narrated. The kaifiyat describes the life of Shaji and other Maratha leaders and bears considerable importance towards illustrating the history of the Marathas from the time of their origin. Short sketches relating to the life of Shahji in the Court of the Bijapur Sultan, the boyhood of Shivaji, and how he became powerful upto his death are narrated. The bad administration of Sambaji and the annexation of the Maratha confederation by Aurangazeb is very graphically described. The kaifiyat ends abruptly while describing the administration of Nana Fadnavis. The document discloses neither the name of the sources of information obtained for recording this or the dates of the episodes mentioned in it.

The life of Sambaji up to his beheading by Aurangzeb have been very graphically described. The history relating to the administration by Raja Ram and Tara Bai up to the accession of Balaji Baji Rao forms the concluding portion of the kaifiyat. All the events from Shalivahana Saka 1500 to 1664 are described in the chronological order and corresponding Arabic dates are provided. The kaifiyat provides no information regarding the name of the author or the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat.

The lower portion of the last folio is missing. In the remaining part of the folio it is stated that this volume was completed at Poona on the 12th April 1806. The name of the scribe or the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat is not mentioned.

were said to have been constructed by a Chola King: The kaifiyat provides neither the names of the kings nor the dates or the sources of information obtained for recording this. The customs and the manners of the residents of this place is also described.

Then it is stated after some lapse of time the Vodiya Rulers became powerful and took Mysore from the Yadava Rajas. Krishna Deva Raja was said to be the first ruler of Vodiya family. The kaifiyat explains in detail the names of the rulers who ruled at Mysore. The invasion of the Moguls and the Marattas over Mysore and how the Rajas of Vodiya family were defeated are also briefly explained. Special mention is made relating to the construction of dams and banks to River Cauvery and the Marathas took keen interest in helping the people of Mysore to irrigate their lands and grow more crops. Short

notes explaining the battles, sieges and victories and defeats during the period of Vodiya Rajas can be found in the last part of the narration. All the important occurrences and the period each Raja ruled is recorded as per Shaliwahana Era. The name of the scribe or the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat are not mentioned.

The endowments granted by the Hindu Rajas, Hyder Ali and Tippu and the arrangements that are made for conducting daily worships and festivals in the above temples are also described.

In conclusion, the names of the rulers who constructed the additional buildings to the temples at Srirengapatnam and Mysore are given. The folios are not properly arranged. The last folio of the kaifiyat can be found in the beginning of the volume bearing Page No. 7. The name of the author or the sources of information for recording the kaifiyat are not provided.

The kaifiyat concludes by giving the names of the Jagirdars and the relations of the Nawab of Arcot and the amount due to them from their villages. The name of the scribe or the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat are not mentioned.

The lands granted as endowment is said to be in Tirumangalam Taluk, Madura District and the names of the persons to whom the management of the endowment was entrusted is also described. The record further reveals the nature of the worships and the charities and the festivals that are to be celebrated from the income of the endowment is mentioned. The duties of the Sheristadar, Deshmook, Deshpandia, Koolkarni Gramma Kanak Samprathi and Nattavar are also described. These officers correspond to the Head Accountant, Revenue Inspector, Village Munsiff and Karnam. The name of the scribe or the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat is not mentioned.

One Arda Jama Katlai and the other Palla Kapu Katlai. The name of the third katalai is unreadable. The origin of the Ardajama Katlai is briefly described. The donor Thandavaraya Pillai who received a Jagir from Fauzdar Yusuf Khan was said to have endowed the entire village for the above said Temple. The date of the grant is not mentioned. A Tamil signature can be observed in the conclusion of the grant. The name of the village is unreadable. The second endowment was said to have been granted by Meenakshi, Consort of;

Vijia Ranga Chockanatha Naick of Madura. This endowment comprises an entire village whose income is to be utilised for the Shivarathri festival to be observed in the temple, and to be managed by one Gopala Iyer. The date for this grant is also not mentioned. A Tamil signature can be observed at the end. The name of the scribe or the sources of information for recording this Kaifiyat is not provided. A third grant endowing certain property may be noticed on the reverse also.

There are nearly 18 katalais or instructions for worshipping the deities of Sri Meenakshi, etc., by the doners of endowment. It can be noticed, that the Naick Rulers have granted their endowments for celebrating certain festivals which are known as Thirumala Naicken Kattalai, Muthamma Kattalai, Venkatk. ishna Naicken Kattalai, Madura Naicken Pillai Kattalai, Mannarappaian Kattalai, Meenakshi Amman Kattalai, Pillai Kattalai, Alagappa Mudaly Kattalai, Pallakappu Kattalai, Muthuservai Kattalai, Kotteswaran Ayan Kattalai, Thirgunanasambandar Kattalai, Muthappa Mudaly Kattalai, Thanappa Mudali Kattalai and Devadasi Kattalai.

Short notes relating to the origin of these Kattalais and why these endowments were granted, the extent of the lands granted and the approximate income that can be derived and the ordinary and special

worships that are to be carried on and such other details are given. It can also be noticed that the major number of these endowments were granted to the Sri Meenakshi temple at Madura by Tirumalai Naick, his ministers and his relations. Remarks such as the year and the name of the grantee and such other particulars can be noticed on the right hand side margin of the Kaifiyat.

The name of the scribe or the sources of information obtained for recording this or the date on which this record was transcribed is not mentioned.

Short notes on the endowments granted by Thirumala Naick, Venkata Krishnama Naick, Kalanji Madura Naick Pillai, Alagappa Mudali, Thanapa Mudali, Koteswaran and Muthanna Kattalai. This record explains the kind of Pooja or worship that should be carried on both on ordinary and festive days at the temple of Sri Meenakshi at Madura. The record further explains the names of the persons such as the Archakas and the managers appointed to look after the endowments and the Kattalais are also mentioned. Details relating to the purchases made by some of the grantees and the

fixed payment of salary to certain temple establishments are also mentioned. The names of the festivals and the amounts that are to be spent for celebrating the same are also recorded. Details for other charities and the inams granted to the Brahmins as Sarvamaniam are also briefly explained. The record mentions neither the name of the scribe nor the sources of information obtained for recording the same and the date on which it was transcribed.

This record also deals with the Kattalai endowments granted to Sri Meenakshi Amman temple at Madura by the Naick Rulers and other Philanthropic donors. The record begins, explaining Arai Kattalai. This endowment was said to have been granted by Krishnappa Muthu Veerappa Naick endowing Kothoor-Mooliam Kolam situated in Madura Taluk. The record describes the nature of worships that are to be conducted to Sri Meenakshi and Sri Sundareswara Swami. The names of the persons who were originally appointed to manage the endowments and to supervise the worships in the temple are also mentioned. Particulars regarding the continuance of the charities and the names of the persons who are at present looking after the villages are also mentioned.

The second Kattalai known as the Nitya Kattalai is very briefly described. Yusuf Khan, a minister in the service of a Nayak ruler, granted endowments to Sri Meenakshi Temple for conducting certain special worships.

The record further explains the origin of the endowment known as Piedlwarchana Kattalai.

The origin and the history of the Ardajama Kattalai and Shookraware Kattalai and Somawara Kattalai are described. The name of donor, the extent of the lands granted as endowment for the above kattalais to be carried for ever to Sri Meenakshi Amman and Sundareswara Swami are given. In the last page of the record the origin and the history of the Kattalai founded by Thandavaraya Pillai and certain Historic allusions are made illustrating the reason for granting this Kattalai. The name of the scribe or the sources of information obtained for recording this or the date on which this was recorded are not mentioned. The dates are recorded in Saliwahana Era.

The first two grants relate to the Meenakshi Amman Temple at Madura and another to Sri Alagiriswami Temple at Alagar Koil. Details for the grants given to Sri Venkateswaraswami and other Gods belonging to the Devasthanams such as Govindarajaswami, Alamelu Amman Temple at Thirurchanur, etc., by Sadasiva Rayalu are described. Particulars such as the names of the Inamdars, both institutions individuals are also given. The purpose for which the endowment was granted, the date and the extent of the lands granted with the names of the places etc. are elaborately described. There are three petitions with the orders passed thereon by the Naick Rajas relating to cash inams granted for celebrating certain katalais in the temple at Tirupathi. Shaliwahana dates are used in the dating the Kaifiyats. In the last page the names of the villages owned by certain Polygars and the income they derived by Kaval and customs fees collected in their jurisdiction are described. The kaifiyat bears no information regarding either the name of the scribe or the sources of information obtained for recording this Kaifiyat.

and wet lands and their income and certain other remarks such as the names of the manegars and whether the trust is conducted or not are described. It has been stated that this record was prepared in fasli 1225 by the Sheristadar of Chittoor District. The record bears signatures in Urudu, Modi, and in English and this record was said to have been forwarded to the East India Company on the 10th August 1815. Short notes relating to the origin and the history of the temples can be observed. This record was said to have been prepared by one Venkata Rao Sheristadar.

An introductory note on the second folio explains very briefly the contents of the record and it is stated that the same has been despatched for perusal and acknowledgment. The name of the sender or the person to whom the record was despatched is not mentioned.

The Record describes the names of certain principal cities and towns both in North Hindustan and Kabool which comprised the Mogul Empire during the sovereignty of Akbar. The boundaries of the cities, the names of the rivers, with their branches and tributaries, lakes

and Tanks, the extent of the lands cultivated and the revenue collected are described. The most important factor of this record is, it mentions the names of the cities both by their original *Hindu name* and the new *Islamic name* used by the Mogals. It is stated that Hastinapuri was called as Delhi, Ahamadabad, as Musta Karool, Isha Bad, Kasi as Benares, Priyag as Ilhabad, Patna as Bhair, Multan as Dame Ammon, and Kabool as Dame Moola.

The Kaifiyat further provides also the changed names of certain rivers.

The name of the scribe or the sources of information obtained for recording this Kaifiyat or the date on which the record was collected are not mentioned.

This record seems to be an order issued by Tippu Sultan to his subordinates in the Revenue Department (several dates are mentioned). The names of the officers to whom this order was issued is recorded. Tippu Sultan through this order directs his subordinates the procedure that they should adopt in collecting the kist, remitting the same in the Huzur Treasury, the maintenance of accounts and the payment of salaries to the village officers and the work they are expected to do. Particular instructions are issued to the Tahsildar of Kanakupi about the

collection of kist in his jurisdiction. In the last part of the kaifiyat, the names of the currency used in the Mysore State and their equivalents are described. A statement showing the collections made in Kanakupi Taluk on the 5th Moharam, fasli 1221 (Pramadicha is also provided.)

The kaifiyat neither mentions the name of the scribe nor the sources of information obtained for recording this.

Twenty-five such fords are described shortly; notes relating to the origin and the history of these fords are described. The names of the goods that were loaded and unloaded, the Customs and such other duties collected at each ford and the transhipment charges paid to the boat's men are also mentioned. The kaifiyat further mentions the names of the owners of those fords; and the commodities that were available for exporting from Nellore and Ganjam to other places. The name of the scribe or the sources of information and other particulars such as dates, etc., are not mentioned.

This record appears on the 17th folio of this volume. The handwriting is fair and legible. This kaifiyat describes the origin and the history of the Hill Fort, Sadasiva Gad. This is said to be situated near Shondai, a taluk in Vijianagar Empire. The topography of this place is also described. This kaifiyat is divided into nine sections. The first two sections describe the history of Anagondi and Vizianagar Empire during the rule of the Naicks.

To commemorate the success in a War, Sadasiva Naick of Vijianagar constructed a Fort on a hill and called it as Sadasiva Gad. The second and the third sections describe the downfall of the Naicks and that of Adil Shai dynasty. The invasion of the Dutch and the treacherous part played by the Naick Commander at Sadasiva Gad and the passing over of the Fort to the Dutch forms the contents of the fourth and the fifth sections. In the seventh section the invasion of Hyderali Khan and how he captured Sadasiva Gad is explained. The Wars between the East India Company and Hyder Ali and Tippu Sultan are also described. The invasion of the Marathas under the leadership of Babu Rao Shalanke and the treaty between the Marathas and Tippu Sultan are described in the eighth section.

In the last section the conquest of Sadasiva Gad by the East India Company and the death of Tippu Sultan are very graphically described. It is stated that finally the English conquered Sadasiva Gad in Shalvahana Era 897.

It is stated that the donor appointed one Chokanatha Bhattar as the manager of the trust. Some instructions for conducting the charities are also provided. The kaifiyat neither mentions the name of the scribe or the date on which it was recorded. Certain signatures in Tamil can be observed at the last portion of the kaifiyat.

The first and the third sections of the record mention that in total 5 villages were granted in the Madura District by Thirumala Naick and Chinnathamby Mudaly for conducting Vuchikala katalai charities in the Alagar Temple.

The second and the fourth sections describe the endowments granted for conducting Sairakshapujai katalai to Sri Alagar Swami Temple. The endowments are said to have been granted by Chinna Mudaly and Thanappa Mudaly.

The record further describes the names of the persons who were deputed to look after the endowments and the charities. The net amounts to be spent in the temple are also explained. Dates in Shalivahana Era are mentioned. The last portion of the record describes the endowments granted to Thirugnanasambanda Swami. The names of the villages and the extent of the lands granted as endowment is explained. Tamil signatures appear in two places of the record. The name of the scribe and the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat are not mentioned.

The Sardeshmook is directed to provide a certain number of horses and persons to the cavalry of the Peshwa. The name of the Peshwa who granted this inam is not mentioned. Since the last portion of this record is missing the name of the scribe or the sources of information gathered for recording the Kaifiyat are not given. The Inam is said to have been granted in fazli 1204.

The beginning of the Kaifiyat is legendary. It is stated that one Raja Vishnu Vardhna was the originator of this Town, which subsequently became an important Fort. Many sieges and battles are said

to have taken place for its possession. The record further narrates that the Fort was annexed by the Rayalu Rajas of Vizianagaram. During the Mohamadan attacks and the decline of the Vijianagar dynasty the Fort Engur became the property of Krishna Raja Udayar, the Raja of Mysore. The contents of the record trace the genealogy of the Mysore rulers from Chika Deva Raja. The ascendancy of Hyderali Khan and the accession of Tipu Sultan is also very graphically described. The fight between the Marattas, the French and the East India Company with Tipu Sultan up to his final conquest and death is beautifully narrated. In conclusion it is stated that the East India Company became the master of Mysore Province. The arbitration of Purnayya between Cornwallis and the Raja of Mysore and how Krishna Deva Raja Udayar, became the Raja of Mysore is explained. The Kaifiyat neither bears the name of the author nor the sources of information obtained for recording the same.

Peshwa and Mahadeva Rao Peshwa and the annexation of Engoor is very beautifully described. The names of the Maratha chieftains who took active part in the warfare are given. Again some more information regarding the part played by the East India Company in subjugating Tippu Sultan and the final annexation of the Mysore by the British is dealt with lucidly. By a final settlement Krishna Deva Raja Wodiyar became the Raja of Mysore. The dates for all important occurrences are recorded in Shaliwahana Era. The name of the author and the sources of information obtained for recording this narration are not mentioned.

It is stated that seven persons emigrated from Kanchi District and settled on the boundaries of Mysore and agreed to obey the command of Kempa Gounda. This Kempa Gounda by some divine power became more powerful and constructed a Town and a fort and called it as Yela Nad. He is said to be the founder of temple of Veerabhadra (S.S. 1380). The origin and the history of the Bangalore Fort is briefly narrated.

This same Kempa Gounda fought with a turbulent paligar Sankara Nayak and took his country. The genealogy of the Gounda family up to the last Gounda (?) is described. A list of Forts and temples and

the charitable institutions constructed by these rulers are given. The Mohammedans under the leadership of Kuli Khan(?) captured Bangalore and other forts. The Kaifiyat further describes the history of Chika Deva Raya Wodiyar and the marriage alliances with the original Gounda family. The usurpation of Hyder Ali Khan and how the Goundas retreated to a far off Fort at Poonganur forms the last part of the Kaifiyat. The name of the author and the sources of information gathered for recording this Kaifiyat are not mentioned.

The circumstances that led Kempa Gounda to begin the construction of the Town of Yelanadu and Bangalore are specially described well. The genealogy of the Gounda family, up to Mookudi Gounda is described. During his reign, the Moguls under the command of Ranajoola Khan attacked and captured the Gounda. Subsequent to a treaty the Gounda is said to have been set free and Bangalore annexed to the Mogal territory.

The Kaifiyat further describes the invasion of Chika Deva Raya of Mysore and the defeat and capture of Mookudi Kempa Gounda. Chikka Deva Raya made alliances with the Gounda family, and thus cemented the friendship of the Goundas and became the absolute ruler of Yelana and Bangalore. The rise of Hyder Ali Khan and the defeat of Chika Deva Raya forms the subject-matter of the last part of the Kaifiyat. The name of the scribe or the sources of information obtained for recording this Kaifiyat is not mentioned. The dates for all the important occurrences are recorded in Shaliwahana Era.

The Kaifiyat further explains the names of the persons who made endowments for the upkeep of the temple. The date for any incident alluded to in the narration is not given. The name of the author or the sources of information obtained for recording this Kaifiyat is not mentioned.

The duties of certain temple officers and the names of certain festivals are also mentioned. The names of the persons who endowed landed properties for the celebration of daily worship of the deity and for festivals are mentioned. The duties that are expected to be attended to by certain temple servants and the remuneration they have to receive are also mentioned. The name of the scribe or the sources of information obtained for recording this Kaifiyat is not provided.

It is stated that Rama Raja Bhonsle was responsible for establishing a Maratha State at Nagapur. The record further explains the achievements of Ragoji Bhonsle during his expeditions in the south up to Arcot for territorial expansion. After the death of Ragoji it is stated that his son Nanajee Bhonsle succeeded him. The Kaifiyat explains briefly some of the expeditions that he undertook against Tippu Sultan. The Kaifiyat provides neither the name of the scribe nor the sources of information obtained for recording this Kaifiyat.

Savayee Mahadev Rao was much interested in knowing the history of his forefathers, and it is stated that he requested Nana Fadnavis and Sripat Rao Dinkar to write a short account of his ancestors. As per the request of Savayee Mahadeva Rao, the above said persons wrote a short history and completed the same on Wednesday the 13th day in the bright fortnight of Maha month in the year Pariyudavi. This history is said to have been transcribed by Chimmana Rao and Regunatha Srinivasa Rao residents of Thulapur. As per the request of Col. Mackenzie, the above history was copied by Bhima Rao Ranga Rao.

The second portion of the Kaifiyat deals with the downfall of the Cholas and describes the origin and brief history of the Yadava rulers. In concluding the Kaifiyat it is stated that the Mogals defeated the Yadavas and established their kingdom. Dates for all important events are provided in Shalivahana Era. Though the name of the scribe is illegible, it is found that this Kaifiyat was transcribed from an original as per instructions of Col. Mackenzie and was despatched to him in 1806.

The origin and the rising of the Marathas under Shajee Bhonsle is narrated. The life of Shivaji is explained. The boyhood of Shau and how he was brought up by the daughter of Aurangazeeb during the minority is also very elaborately explained. The Kaifiyat describes the civil war and war of succession that broke out after the death of Aurangazeeb. In conclusion it is stated that Shau became free and succeeded to his ancestrol throne and the part played by Baji Rao, Nana Fadnavis, Sadasiva Rao Bhau in moulding the destiny of the Maratha empire is described. The name of the author or the sources of information obtained for recording this is not mentioned. In one or two places the dates in Salivahana Era are quoted in explaining the events. Though the Kaifiyat is called as Raja Pratapa Rudra Kaifiyat, very little account of this King is noted; and the rest of Kaifiyat deals with the history of the Marathas.

is said to be situated to the west of Chittra Dung. Rana Raya is said to be the 4th boy out of the ten children and was adopted by Vikramaditia. The name of the father or the native place of Rana Raya is not mentioned. This Rana Raya is said to have succeeded Vikramaditia. The Kaifiyat explains certain incidents that induced Rana Raya to construct the Fortress mentioned in this Kaifiyat. Here the record breaks abruptly. Neither the name of the author nor the informations obtained for recording this Kaifiyat and the dates on which the incidents mentioned occur are provided.

This seems to be the second Chapter of Kaifiyat described under D. No. 213. The beginning is legendary explaining how a Raja was blessed with a daughter, by a Goddess. Though the name of the Raja is not mentioned, it is stated that the daughter was named as Shanta Parameswari. The second part of the Kaifiyat describes very briefly the history of the eight Cholas. In concluding the record, the biography of Karikala Chola is told. The record breaks here. Some pages both in the beginning and in the end are missing.

The Kaifiyat neither bears the title nor the name of the author or the sources of information obtained for recording the Kaifiyat.

The Kaifiyat further explains how he recovered himself from the fatal clutches of a bogus mendicant. The second part of the record deals with the efforts evinced by Rama Raja in constructing the Fortress of Devagiri, and how he got himself acquainted with the learned Brahmin Hemada Pandit. In conclusion another legend is narrated explaining the voyage of Hemada pandit to the citadal of Vibheshana, to cure a disease. The record explains that this Hemada pandit was the originator of Modi script.

The record neither mentions the name of the author nor the sources of information obtained for recording this Kaifiyat or the dates on which the several episodes occurred.

This record deals with the origin of two places and provides a very brief account of Jainism. The first part of the kaifiyat describes the origin of a state Rastal. This State was considered to be a good trading centre. The information relating this to state is said to have been gathered from the biography of Raja Saheb, Begampur. The origin and history of Begampur is explained. A small village is said to have been improved into a big town by Akbar. This is said to be situated eight miles east of Aurangabad. To commemorate the birth of a daughter Akbar called this town as Begampur. The last portion of the kaifiyat deals briefly with the cult of Jainism at Bengal. The date of the kaifiyat is not mentioned.

According to his directions, an extensive garden was laid out with great labour and cost. Rare specimens of trees and plants are said to have been brought from distant places such as Kabool, etc. During the war between Lord Wallis and Hyderali, this garden was very much damaged. During the reign of Tippu Sultan, he remodded the garden and added some more buildings and masjids and called this garden as "Daulat Bag." The kaifiyat explains that Tippu granted extensive endowments for the maintenance of the garden and the masjids. This garden is said to have been finished in the year Nandana.

The name of the author or the sources of information gathered for recording this kaifiyat or the dates are not provided.

The former Devastanam is situated at Alagarkoil near Madura and the other is the famous shrine of Sri Meenakshi situated at Madura. It is stated that one Yusuf Khan, Commander of the Native forces stationed at Madura, granted extensive lands to Thandava Raya pillai of Madura on two occasions, of a birth of child to the former. The dates for granting the endowments to the abovesaid temples are provided. The account for the paddy received and the amounts fixed for carrying out certain daily worships and annual festivals, etc., are also recorded. The name of the author or the sources of information obtained for recording the kaifiyat is not provided. The entire document is in a highly torn condition.

It is stated that during the rule of Durva Raja (Vijayanagar dynasty) he wanted to have a sea port town fit for constructing ships and boats and exporting and importing commodities. After the death of Durva Raja this sea port was conquered by Sri Ranga Rayalu of Penukonda. The kaifiyat further describes that this town was demolished by the Moguls of Golkonda. During the period of Aruningel(?), a military officer of the East India Company bought this place from the Raja of Golkonda and constructed an emporium and a fort for the use of the company. This place after some days was considered un-suitable and so the company demolished the entire construction and shifted to Madras. A short report of the condition of the town and its surroundings have been described briefly. It is stated that the information for recording this kaifiyat were obtained from certain residents of this place. The kaifiyat provides neither the name of the author nor the dates for the various incidents alluded in it.

The first part contains the mythological allusions relating to the incarnation of Lord Vishnu Vittoba at Pandarpur.

The third part describes the life of certain ardent devotees such as Pundarik, Namdev, Thukaram and Gana Dev. The miracles they performed are also briefly described. The fourth part mentions the names of the various Maratha rulers and the members of the royal families and the Peshwas who granted endowments to the temple. The names of the Maratha rulers and the peshwas who were responsible for improving the temples and the dates on which these constructions of additional buildings and halls they built and other presents they made to the temple are also described.

The last part describes the grants made by certain Naik rulers to the temple at Pandarpur. The names of certain officials and the duties they have to perform in the temple and the topography of Pandarpur is also briefly recorded. In conclusion it is stated that this narration was copied as per the instructions of Col. Mackenzie by two brothers Mullhar Bhut and Lakshman Bhut. The work of transcribing is said to have been completed on the 27th August 1807.

The first portion of the kaifiyat describes the origin and the history of two temples in the newly constructed Town Vandhanapuri—the legends relating to the temples are also described. The abovesaid temples are said to have been constructed by the Naick rulers of Vijayanagar. The second part of the kaifiyat describes the construction of a Fort at Achuthapuram by Achuthapa Naicker. Temples to Kothanda Ramaswami and Veerabadra are said to have been constructed by him. The third portion of the kaifiyat describes the invasion of the Marathas under the command of Shankara Rao. This Shankara Rao is said to have ruled these places for nearly ten years. Aurangzeb conquered these places. Finally, after the downfall of Moghul rule, Ahammadali Khan, the Carnatic Nawab conquered all these places and brought them under his sway.

The name of the author or the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat is not provided. Dates as per Shalivahana calendar have been provided for certain rare occurrences.

The names of the various places in India and the Rajas who ruled them up to the end of Dvaparayuga are mentioned. From the fourth chapter onwards the history of India from the beginning of Vijayanagar Kingdom is described. The kaifiyat further mentions the various invasions made by the Moghuls from the time of Taimur and up to the downfall of the Mogul Empire. The history of the Marathas from the beginning up to their down fall is also described. The origin and the history of Sattara and the Maratha Rajas and the part they played during the Civil wars when the peshwas were ruling are given. The kaifiyat contains no historic important facts worth recording. This seems to be a composition of various matters borrowed from various books. The name of the author or the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat is not mentioned.

Peshwa Baji Rao is said to have constructed the banks and flight of steps in this Tank. This town is said to have contained an incomplete palace of Ahamed Naizham Sha of Ahmed Nagar. The above stated informations were said to have been gathered by Anand Rao Narayana Rao from Joshi Linga Bhut, an old resident of Pamdoor. The author states that he camped at this place on the 11th January 1806 and submitted this report to Col. Mackenzie on the same date.

The name of the author or the sources of information obtained for recording the kaifiyat is not recorded. In certain places Nagari characters are also used.

Though the handwriting is fair, it contains large number of words misspelt and badly punctuated. The words at certain places are scribbled and whose contents could not be made out. This record gives a brief sketch of the rulers of Vijayanagar. The beginning contains some mythological legends describing the founder of Vijayanagar. Though the names of several rulers of the dynasty are mentioned, some special care is devoted in explaining the rule of Krishna Devaraya. The wars he fought are repeatedly explained in various places. The territorial expansions made by him and the down fall of the Empire is also described. There is nothing worth to be described. Neither the dates for the rulers ruled at Vijayanagar nor the sources of informations obtained for recording this kaifiyat or the name of the author is mentioned.

This seems to be a detached portion from a big volume, wherein the history of the Bijapur and its Sultans are described. The genealogy of the Sultans from fasli 895, the names of the Sultans who ruled at Bijapur in succession and the period they ruled are also mentioned.

The names of the Subedars who were appointed by the Sultans and the Subas they managed and the list showing the names of the villages and towns that comprised the Bijapur Sultanate are also recorded. The Muslim names that were given to certain principle cities and towns forms a most important factor in this kaifiyat. For instance Darul Zafar was the name given to Bijapur. Gondwan was the name ascribed to Telingana, Shajahana Bad was the name given to Delhi. This record is said to have been transcribed from the original, possessed by Krishna Joshi, son of Ram Joshi, residing at Bijapur, by Narayana Rao, the Agent of Col. Mackenzie. It is stated that the work of copying was finished on the 12th September 1817.

This seems to be a detached portion of a big work and the first ten pages are wanting to complete the kaifiyat. It is stated that Sri Sringeri Sankara Charya established four muths at different places and appointed four disciples as their managers. The origin of the Vidya Nagar and biographical sketches of Harihara and Bukka are also mentioned. The kaifiyat further describes the origin and the history of the temple dedicated to Sri Virupakshaswami with all the mythological stories relating to it. Short sketch of the history of Rayalu Rulers and the downfall of Rama Raja is recorded. The last portion of the kaifiyat describes the growth of Vidyanagar into a Great City. The name of the author and the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat are not given.

This kaifiyat deals with the origin and the history of certain Zamindaris, Jaghirs and temples in Virinchipur situated in Vellore Taluk. The revenue collected from certain jagirs such as Chandragiri, Moola Kadu, Veeravalam, Bhoothamangalam and Thiruvaramangam is mentioned. A list of villages that surround Virinchipur is given. The mythological legends and fables relating to the origin of Virinchipuram are briefly narrated. This place is said to be a sacred pilgrim centre and temples dedicated to Sri Brahma Deva and Vishnu attaches great importance to this place.

The second chapter, of the kaifiyat describes the origin and the history of the temples of Sri Marghasahaya and Shayaiswaraswami. It is stated that this entire village was granted as jagir to one Gouda Muthu Rangappa Naick by the ruler of Vellore. Some of the mythological legends that occurred at the temples of Viranchipuram are described in detail. In conclusion it is stated that the informations for recording this kaifiyat were gathered from certain local records possessed by Vaidynatha Gurukkal and Ayya Joshi, residents of Virinchipuram and was completed on the 25th March 1800. The name of the author is not mentioned.

A square seal in black ink may be observed on the top of the left hand side of the first folio. This contains "Rami Dootha Sahaya Balakrishna Narayana Rao" recorded in Devanagar characters. In the beginning of the record, it has been stated that this kaifiyat of Viralgudi (a village in Chittoor Taluk) was prepared in fasli 1226 as per the orders of the East India Company. This entire Taluk was said to have been under the attachment of the East India Company in fasli 1225. Short history and the measurement account and the actual location of certain temples and other places of importance in Viralgudi is described. The extent of the main lands owned certain Temples are also given. In conclusion it has been recorded that this entire record was verified with the original by Appu Rao, the Sherishtadar of Chittoor on the 5th August fasli 1226.

The kaifiyat neither bears the date nor the name of the scribe or the sources of informations that are obtained for recording this kaifiyat.

This record was said to have been prepared as per the instruction of the Collector of Chittoor for forwarding the same to the East Indian Company in fasli 1225. In the last part of the statement it is stated that the informations regarding the origin and the history of the temples existing in the above said villages were gathered from the old residents of the villages and from certain old temple officers. In the last page of the kaifiyat a small square seal in Urdu characters may be observed.

The record describes the hamlets in Viralagudi and the number and the names of the temples and the extent of the lands owned by them. A short note for each temple describing the origin and the history of the hamlet and the temple and the names of the persons who granted endowments is also provided. It is stated that the abovesaid information was gathered from certain old inhabitants of the village and also from certain temple authorities. Some of the temples are said to be very old and were visited by Pandavas.

The first four folios describe about the Holkar, the Sindhe and the Ghorpade chiefs; and the military power and the territorial jurisdiction they had under their control. A brief history of the Moghuls at Delhi and the sultans of Deccan forms the subject-matter of the following five pages. The rest of the kaifiyat describes the rule of Balaj Baji Rao. The part played by Nana Fadnavis at Poona and the accession of Madeva Rao, a posthumous son of Narayana Rao and the ultimate division in the Maratha camp are very graphically described. The part played by the East India Company and the chief events and engagements that took place and the final treaty at Bassim forms the last part of the kaifiyat.

The name of the author or the source of information obtained for recording this historic kaifiyat is not mentioned. Though several sieges and engagements are explained none of them is dated.

The part played by Visvasa Rao and Sadashiva Rao Bhau and his trustworthy colleagues such as Gakewar, Angri, Gokale and Pawar are very graphically described. The names of the great Maratha warriors such as Anthaji Manekeswar Janakoji Shinde and Mudoji Holkar are mentioned. The kaifiyat further provides the details of the march of the Marathas to Sonpath and the dates and the places they halted on their march and the skirmishes that took place between the Moguls and the Marathas. Similarly the names of the warriors of Ahamadsha Abdully are also given. The dates for all the events, such as negotiations, sieges and battles, progress and retreat are recorded as per the Arabic calendar. The last four pages deal with the defeat of the Marathas. The defeat of the Marathas and the death of Sadasiva Rao and Visvas Rao and how Nanna Sahib was vexed to know the results of the war forms the end of the kaifiyat. It is stated that this kaifiyat was copied as per the directions of Col. Mackenzie from the original record possessed by Ganga Ram Thambatkar of Aurangabad on the 29th of January 1806 at Aurangabad.

Though the kaifiyat bears the name of a person, nothing is explained about any individual but short moral stories of very interesting nature are recorded. In total five stories are told and the characters in all the stories are personified by animals. It seems that Vishnu Sharma might have been the author for these short moral stories. The stories are recorded in dialogue form. Since the second part ends abruptly, it is not possible to state either the name of the author or the sources of information or the date on which the author finished these stories. Monkeys and crocodiles, asses and lions are some of the animals which are mentioned frequently.

The temple at Tirupathi and the adjoining hills and forests and the ways by which the temple could be approached is graphically described. The names of certain mantapams and the towers that were constructed by the Naicks and the Thondermandal Chakravartis are explained. The record explains the genealogy of the Thondamans and Cholas. The Rajas of the above two dynasties are said to have been chiefly responsible for the various charitable endowments and the festivals that are celebrated at the Tirupathi Temple. Extracts from the inscriptions in Telugu and Tamil are also mentioned. The names of the ministers and other philanthropic persons who contributed to the construction of certain golden edifices in the temple and the names and the duties of some of the Brahman officers and servants in the temples are elaborately described. The route leading to the temple above the hills and the names of persons who constructed certain resting places are mentioned. The topography of the hills and their surroundings are also given. The kaifiyat neither bears the name of the author nor the sources of information obtained for recording the kaifiyat. Since the names of the Rajas mentioned in the record are perforated and pasted with slips they are not mentioned. The names of the villages and the extent of wet and dry lands that were granted as endowment are mentioned.

This kaifiyat describes a short history of Venkatarama Dikshit and his son Srinivasa Dikshit. Though much is not mentioned about the origin or the meritorious acts they have done, the record reveals that they were the two important persons for managing an Agraharam at Meela Koonta. This place seems to be a hamlet in Chittoor district and was granted by the Naicks as endowment to Sri Govinda Rajaswami at Tirupathi. Besides this endowment, this kaifiyat provides details for the gifts granted by the Naicks to several Brahmans residing in six adjacent agraharams. The Tahsildar of this place at the direction of the East Indian Company had made enquiries and made a report regarding the existence of the original grants relating the Inams. Extracts of the grants relating to the endowments to Sri Padmavati Temple at Tiruchanoor and Sri Venkateswara of Tirupathi are also explained. The names of the endowments and the persons who managed them are also mentioned. The abovesaid charities were said to have been granted on the 12th of Magha month of the year Pramadicha 1655 of Sali-vahana. The name of the person who recorded this is not mentioned.

This kaifiyat appears on the first folio of this volume. The folios are in damaged condition and require immediate mending. This record describes the origin and the history of two towns, namely, Bijapur and Daulatabad. The record is divided into four parts, the first two parts dealing with the history of Bijapur and the other two parts describing the origin and history of Daulatabad. Much attention is paid in describing the temple of Sri Ghirshneswar where the rulers of Bijapur and Daulatabad worshiped. Extracts of the Marathi inscriptions recorded on the walls of the temple are also quoted. It is said, the Bhonsles and Holkars and certain other Maratha Chiefs, were responsible for constructing certain buildings and granting endowments to the temple.

The kaifiya describes the conquest of Bijapur by Shiv ji.

The second part of the kaifiyat describes the origin and the history of Daulatabad, which was formerly known as Devagiri. It is stated that one Khande Rao Holkar was the originator of Fort Devagiri. Some references relating to the persons who assisted Shivaji in framing the Maratha Confederation is also mentioned. The temple of Ghṛṣneswara is said to be renovated by one of the Holkars in 1672 S.S. The last part of the kaifiyat describes the topography of Bijapur and Daulatabad.

This record is said to have been transcribed from the original owned and preserved by Keshava Bhut of Sri Ghṛṣneswara temple as per the order of Col. Mackenzie and to have been completed on the 26th February 1806.

This record appears on the 20th folio of this volume. The handwriting is fair and legible. The left hand side of all the folios are badly injured and are in loose condition.

This record deals with the origin and history of certain forts constructed by the Marathas at Vellore. Though it is wrongly called as Verul it denotes the Fort Vellore in North Arcot District. Formerly this place was a great forest and one Bomia Reddy assisted by his brother cleared the forest and constructed a small fort on the hills at Sejari. The mythological legends how Bomia Reddy acquired a large treasure is explained at length. The existing temple and the ditch are some of the relics of the works of Bomia Reddy. The expedition of the Marathas under Venkoji, the brother of Shivaji the Great in the south and the battle between certain chiefs and the Marathas are also described. The names of the important persons who conducted the sieges at Vellore and Arni and how finally the Marathas became the absolute owners of Vellore is very graphically described. The kaifiyat describes various subjects such as the arrangements made by the Marathas and the towns they conquered during their march from Bangalore. The name of the author or the source of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat is not provided. It is stated that this was transcribed by Narayana Rao as per order of Col. Mackenzie at Vellore.

This kaifiyat also contains the same subject matter described in the forgoing kaifiyat, but some more historic information relating to the invasion of the Nawabs of Arcot and the part played by the English by helping the Nawabs till the English were able to annex Vellore is furnished. The second portion of the kaifiyat describes the history of Fort Nagari.

The description of places of worship of the Hindus and Muslims at Vellore and Nagari and the names of certain Zamindars forms the last part of the kaifiyat. The topography of both the places is also mentioned. Neither the name of the author nor the source of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat over the dates of the events mentioned in this record is recorded. In the end it is stated that this record was copied from an original record owned by a zamindar near Nagari by Narayana Rao as per the orders of Col. Mackenzie.

The names of the Hindu years, months, seasons, week days with equivalent translations in Urdu are given. The kaifiyat provides the names of the Hindu festivals with short notes relating to their origins and the mode of observing them. The names of certain Gods and Goddesses and the names of the animals they used as vehicles are also mentioned. The names of the important mountains, rivers and the puranic formalities and the names of the famous devotees are also mentioned. The kaifiyat further provides the names of important poets and authors and the important cities. The last few folios contain multiplication tables. The kaifiyat provides neither the name of the author nor the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat.

The first seven pages are missing in the first part and certain folios are wanting in the second part to make the kaifiyat a complete one.

This record explains the biography of Sri Sankaracharia elaborately making mention of the several anecdotes which occurred in his lifetime. The kaifiyat begins with a legendary introduction explaining the reason for the birth of Sri Sankara for advocating the advaita philosophy and for protecting the vedic religion from the Buddhist persecutions. The boyhood of Sri Sankara and his studies in the Gurukula up to his renouncing the world and becoming an ascetic forms the subject-matter of the first part.

The second part explains the pilgrimages he undertook and the names of the followers who came as his disciples. The kaifiyat neither bears the name of the author nor the source of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat.

This record appears in two places of this volume as the folios are not properly arranged and bound. This record also deals with the life and work of Sri Sankara. The legendary episodes mentioned in the foregoing kaifiyat are retold. This kaifiyat explains how Sri Sankara had to encounter the Buddhist monks and how he defeated them by proving the superiority of Vedic religion. In certain places the names of the pilgrim centres Sri Sankara visited are mentioned but they are not readable. The record contains highly exaggerated narrations relating the visits of Sankara to certain courts and cities. This seems to be an incomplete portion of a big work. The kaifiyat neither provides the name of the author nor the sources of information obtained or the dates for the occurrences alluded to in the record.

Though this record contains a title no information is provided relating to either the Rulers or the Town of Shandi. This place seems to be a small town in the Ceded Districts. The names of certain years and the months and dates as per Hindu calendar are recorded and for what reason these years and months are recorded is not stated. There is nothing particular to explain; but it is to be assumed that these dates refer to some of the important events which occurred in the household of the rulers of Shandi. The record neither provides the name of the author nor the sources of information obtained for recording the kaifiyat or the actual date on which the record was transcribed. The record is incomplete.

The kaifiyat begins with a legend describing the life of an excommunicated Brahman girl. The life led by her in a dense forest and how she was protected by a potter are graphically described. It is stated that during that period she gave birth to a son, who afterwards came to be known as Salivahan. The boyhood of Salivahana is also elaborately narrated. The record further describes the dispute between a demon and a Brahman relating to the ownership of a girl; same was referred to boy Salivahana for deciding the case; and the Salivahana was able to find out the legal claimant. The record concludes describing the obligations done by the

Brahman for releasing the demon from the curse. It is stated that this kaifiyat was copied from a record owned by Baskara Bhalte residing at Paitan. The name of the author and the date of the record are not mentioned.

The episode relating to the meeting of his grandfather with his excommunicated mother and the reasons for the excommunication and the help rendered by a potter to Salivahan and his mother and how he became a trustworthy leader of the locality is elaborately explained. The record describes how Salivahana came to know the secrecy of his birth and the efforts he took to meet his celestial father on the banks of the Ganges. The help rendered by the serpent king to Salivahana in defeating Vikramaditya is very graphically described. The kaifiyat concludes by giving a detailed account relating to the character and the ability of Salivahana. The kaifiyat ends abruptly and provides neither the name of the author nor the source of information for recording this record. In the last two sentences in folio 497 it is stated that the transcription of this work was completed on the 10th December 1870 at Ahamednagar.

This kaifiyat appears on the first page of the volume. The handwriting is fair and legible. This record describes the origin and the history of the Marathas from Sahaji up to the death of Sambaji. Much attention is paid in describing the origin of the Bonsle family and its Chief Shaji. The names of his wives and his three famous sons, Shivaji, Ekoji and Sambaji and the other important personalities who were responsible for forming the Maratha confederation are mentioned. The kaifiyat further explains the Mogal supremacy under Aurangazeeb. The life of Shivaji is described in the fifth chapter. The coronation of Shivaji and the amounts that were spent and the various ceremonies and functions that took place during the coronation are very elaborately described. A separate chapter deals with the administration of Shivaji. The third chapter describes the accession of Sambaji up to his defeat and death. In the fourth chapter, lists showing the names of the various forts and places that were under Shivaji and Sambaji and the number and the contents of armoury, and other departments that were functioning during the rules of Shivaji and Sambaji are dealt with. The last chapter explains the flight of Rajaram to Jinji and the war of succession to the Maratha throne. The name of the scribe or the author or the sources

of information for recording this historically important record is not provided. But it is stated that this was transcribed as per the request of Col. Mackenzie on the 17th December 1805 at Ahamadnagar and the transcription was completed on 10th Bahula of Shravana month.

The origin of the Marathas and the Bonsle family and the biography of Shau the grandson of Shivaji and short history of the Peshwas form the subject matter of this kaifiyat. The life of Lookji Jadare the founder of Nagapoor is elaborately described. The history of the Marathas and that of the Moguls during the period of Shivaji and Aurangazeeb is mentioned. The death of Shivaji and the accession of Sambaji and how he was defeated and beheaded is also very graphically described. Short account of the Peshwas like Blajai Visvanath and Baji Rao and Balaji Baji Rao is provided. The kaifiyat ends by describing the death of Baji Rao and the defeat of Raghunatha Rao by Naizam Sha. The kaifiyat neither mentions the name of the

author or the scribe nor the sources of information obtained for recording this episode. The dates for the occurrences explained are not provided.

This record relates to the history of the last days of Shau and the state of the Marathas and the invasion of Nizam ul Mulk of the south and of the Karnataka provinces. The wars of succession to the Maratha throne between Shau the son Sambaji and Rajaram of Kolahapur is narrated. The record explains in detail the marches and halts of the armies of the Marathas and the Nizam mentioning the names of the persons who fought the battle and a list is also provided giving the names of the persons who were killed on active service. The death of Shau and the administration of the Maratha country by Balaji Baji Rao is briefly explained. The last part of the kaifiyat describes the death of Shau and the claims put by the grandson of Thara Bai and Sakvarbai. This portion of the kaifiyat gives details of the pact made by Sakwar Bai and Balaji Baji Rao and how the Peshwas came to power. The kaifiyat mentions neither the name of the author nor the scribe or the sources of information obtained for recording this record. Nowhere dates are mentioned.

There is a short note indicating that this record was translated into English. Though the record is called as Shau kaifiyat, it deals not only with the history of Shau, but it actually begins from the origin of the Bonsles and the Marathas upto the last days of Rangunatha Rao. The record may appear to contain the same subject-matter explained in D. No. 252 but some details relating to the administration of the Maratha Empire during the Peshwas are more elaborately described. The life of Shivaji is briefly described. The defeat and persecution of Sambaji and the rule of Aurangazeeb is described in the third section of the kaifiyat. The death of Aurangazeeb and the disputed succession to the Maratha throne by Shau and Rajaram forms the subject-matter of this fourth section. The history of the Peshwas from Balaji Visvanath and how they became the unquestioned monarchs of the Maratha Empire is also described. The administration of the Maratha Empire under Balaji Visvanath, Baji Rao, Balaji Baji Rao Rangunatha Rao is very briefly mentioned. Though this kaifiyat is called as Shau kaifiyat, it deals with the entire history of the Marathas. Short sketches relating to the life

of some of the Peshwas, Nana Fadnavis and Sadasiva Bhoo are also provided. The kaifiyat neither mentions the name of the author nor the scribe or the sources of information obtained for recording this record. Dates in Salivahana Era are noted in certain places.

This kaifiyat appears on the 367th page of this volume. The handwriting is fair and legible. The folios are in loose condition and some of them are damaged by worms. This record describes not only the origin and the history of the Shindes but also vividly explains the Maratha history during the period of the Peshwas. The first Shinde to be mentioned is Savji Shinde who lived at Paltan, 20 miles east of Poona, when Shau II was ruling at Poona. Savji Shinde married Vooma Boi and had a son named Ranoji. This Ranoji is said to have played a very eminent part in forming the state of Satara. The part played by Savji Shinde and Dathaji Shinde in the wars fought by Balaji Visvanath and Nazar Jung and the wars with the Moguls and the active part took by Ranoji is also described. The kaifiyat further describes the death of Baji Rao in S.S. 1682 and the accession of Balaji Baji Rao and the wars that were fought during this period by Ranoji. After the death of Ranoji his son Jaige Shinde took up the command. The kaifiyat further explains the history of the Peshwas, such as Balaji Visvanath, Baji Rao, Balaji Baji Rao and Mahadeva Rao. The battle of Paniput and Sonpet and the part played by Dathoji Shinde is very graphically described. The

kaifiyat describes the state of the Maratha country during the period of Savai Mahadeva Rao. The disputed succession put forth by Regunatha Rao and Narayana Rao and how finally Narayana Rao became the Peshwa forms the subject-matter of the last folios of the kaifiyat. This kaifiyat is said to have been recorded as per the information given by Regunatha Rao an old man residing at Poona, and was recorded on the 10th April 1806 and was despatched to Col. Mackenzie.

This record appears on the 531st folio. The handwriting is fair and legible but contains a large number of mis-spelt and badly punctuated words. In the first folio it is stated in English that this record explaining the history of Shivaji and his wars against the Moghals was transcribed from a Marathi manuscript bearing No. 19 counter marked 931. This long kaifiyat contains sixteen chapters. The first two chapters deal with the origin of the Bhoneles and describe and the history of the forefathers of Shivaji.

The next three chapters deal with the history of the infancy and boyhood of Shivaji and how he became powerful. The conquests of several places and the construction of forts and how he managed to retain the acquired forts from Moghal aggression by appointing

trust worthy officers forms the subject-matter of the next two chapters. The state of the country and administration of the Maratha country by Shivaji is explained in 10th and 11th chapters.

In the 12th and the 13th chapters the expeditions that were taken by Shivaji against Aurangzeb is described. The last two chapters deal with the death of Shivaji and the accession of his son Sambaji. The kaifiyat neither mentions the name of the author nor the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat. The dates for some of the historic incidents are recorded in Salivahana Era.

A long list of the men and munitions used by both the Marathas under Shivaji and the Moghal army under Aurangzeb is given. Nowhere the battle is described, but it is stated that the wars were long drawn. The names of places where the military of the two parties halted are given but they are not correctly recorded. The name of the author or the scribe or the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat is not mentioned. The date of sending this record to Col. Mackenzie is provided.

This record appears on the 98th folio of this volume. This seems to be a detached portion of a big work and some pages in the beginning are missing. Though the kaifiyat bears the title stated above, this explains neither the life of Sivaji or Naizam ul-Mulk. The handwriting is fair but the ink and paper have become pale and brown and at some places the handwriting is invisible. The kaifiyat also bears a Urudu title. The accession of Shau and the wars that were fought for the succession of the Maratha throne are described in the first few pages. In the following five pages the rising up of Balaji Visvanath as Peshwa and the wars he fought with the Moghals and Nawabs are described. The death of Naizam ul-Mulk and the war of succession that was fought by his sons is also described elaborately. The kaifiyat explains the life and rule of certain peshwas up to Savai Mahadeva Rao. The part played by the East India Company and the territorial expansions they made during this period is also briefly told. This kaifiyat was said to have been narrated by Sripatha Rao Dinker and Nana Fadnavis as per the request of Savai Mahadeva Rao and was finished on the Monday the 13th of Maha of Parithavi Samwastram. This narration is said to have been recorded by Srinivasa Rao, a resident of Tulapur. As per the instructions of Col. Mackenzie the same was said to have been transcribed by Bhima Rao Ranga Rao and was completed on the 1st day of the dark moon of Magha in the year Rudhirodgari.

This kaifiyat appears on folio No. 101. The handwriting is very illegible and at certain places faded. A number of corrections and sentences are inserted between the lines. This seems to be a detached portion of a big work, and beginning and the end are missing. The first portion of the kaifiyat explains the exploits of Shivaji in the Moghal territory and in the Carnatic. The names of the forts constructed by him and those that were annexed are mentioned. Shivaji is said to have marched from Pannal Ghad against the Moghal troops stationed at Chandan Fort and he is said to have defeated the Moghals and annexed Forts Chandan and Vandan. A list showing the names of Forts and Ports that were captured by Shivaji is provided. It is stated that Shivaji married two wives Manasa Bai and Tana Bai at Fort Panal. The names of the children born to these ladies are given. The kaifiyat further explains, that with the council of his ministers he made a settlement dividing the Maratha Empire between his three sons.

The names of the places that each should take is also provided. The genealogy of the Maratha Rajas from E-koji to Tulja Raja who ruled at Tanjore is given. Here the kaifiyat stops. Since the kaifiyat is not concluded, it is not possible to record the name of the author or the scribe nor the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat.

The first few pages of the kaifiyat describe the state of affairs in the Maratha country. The second section of the kaifiyat describes the death of Aurangzeb and the disputed succession to the Moghal throne by the sons of Aurangzeb. The liberation of Shau and his bid for the Maratha throne against the bitter opposition of Rajaram is very briefly described. The rest of the record deals with the wars between the Maharathas and Nizam ul Mulk. The dates for the events mentioned in the kaifiyat are not provided. Since the kaifiyat is incomplet the name of the author and the sources of information obtained for recording the same cannot be made out.

The handwriting is fair and legible but at certain places the folios are damaged by insects. This entire record deals with the history of the Marathas. The first part of the kaifiyat describes the state of Hindustan under Aurangazeeb. The origin and the history of certain distinguished Maratha families who were employed in the Bijapur Sultanate are described. The boyhood of Shivaji is narrated. The next few folios describe the conquest of certain forts by Sivaji and how he arranged to recover some of the forts from Aurangazeb. The coronation of Shivaji at Rai Gad and the amounts spent for the celebrations and the details of the rituals that were done at the ceremony are very elaborately narrated.

The administration of the State newly founded by Shivaji and the names of the eight ministers who were appointed to look after the country are also given. A list showing the names of the forts and harbours Shivaji had under him, and the names of the officers who were appointed to look after them are also given. The death of Shivaji and the accession of Sambaji are very concisely described. A separate chapter deals with the life of Sambaji from this coronation up to his execution by Aurangazeb.

The dates of all the important events that took place during the rule of Shivaji and Sambaji are provided in Saliwahana Saka. The name of the author and the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat are not provided. In conclusion it is stated that this kaifiyat was prepared on the 17th December 1805 as per the orders of Col. Mackenzie. In more than three places the same kaifiyat is noted.

The territorial expansions and the forts constructed and conquered by Shivaji and his commanders are also mentioned. The names of the persons who were appointed as the Ashta Pradans and the commanders who were entrusted with the work of defence of the newly acquired territories are also given. The last days of Shivaji and how Sambaji succeeded to the throne is narrated very elaborately. The death of Sambaji and the wars that were fought by Shan and Tarabai assisted by Rajaram at Jinji is described. The kaifiyat ends with the advent of the rule of the first Peshwa. The names of the various Maratha warriors who took keen interest in moulding the Maratha confederacy are included in this kaifiyat. The name of the

author and the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat are not given. Dates in Sahaliwahana Era are provided in certain places. This kaifiyat is said to have been prepared as per the request of Col. Mackenzie and was finished on Shravana Bahula Dasami at Ahamed nagar and was despatched on the 17th December 1805. In two different places this history appears.

This kaifiyat begins in the first folio of this volume. The handwriting is fair and legible. The folios are slightly damaged and the volume is in loose condition. This kaifiyat describes the origin and history of a town called as Boja Raja Patnam and the famous Mariaman Temple at Shanmugapuram. It is stated that one Boja Raja (the place where he was ruling not mentioned) travelled to the south and halted at Vikramadiyapatnam. This Raja is said to have been cured from his longstanding chronic disease by worshipping the Narasimha Moorthi. As a mark of reverence Boja Raja reconstructed this old and small village and called after him as Boja Raja Patnam. He is said to have constructed another temple to Siva and called it as Boja Rajeswariswami.

The life of Kalidassa as described in the stone inscription on the stone works of the temple is described. This is said to be inscribed in 1,000 Saliwahana. These episodes appear in five places. The second episode relating to the origin and the history of the Kannanoor Mariamman

contains nearly 6 folios. Vijya Ranga Raja, ruler of Vijianagar was requested to worship a margosa tree and from that tree an image of Mariamma was carved and was venerated when famine devastated Vijianagaram. The Naick ruler asked his ministers to remove the deity to some place in the south, the minister on their way to Trichinopoly placed the image in the vicinity of Boja Raja Patna and they were unable to remove the image from that place. As per an oracle they left the image of Mariamma at Samiavaram (a small village). Since a large number of ant mole formed on the deity it was said to be called as Kannanur. Vijiya Ranga Chokka Naick who ruled at Madura, worshipped this Goddess for a long time and was responsible for reconstructing the temple and a fort and the extensive endowments granted for the upkeep of the temple. The topography of both the places is also given. This kaifiyat neither bears the name of the author nor mentions any date for the occurrences. But it is stated that it was written by a cultivator Chithambaram Pillai, aged 60 years, residing at Mahaligudi in Lalgudi taluk in Trichinopoly district. Both the places are said to be in Trichinopoly district. This is said to have been written at Shamiapuram on the 15th December 1820.

The Island of Srirangam is said to be a thick wilderness and the image of Sri Ranganathar is said to be in a dense thicket. It is stated that one Veera Chandra Railu of Penukonda dreamt about the existence of the image of Sri Ranganathar and excavated it and constructed a temple from the wealth which was found along with the image. The construction made by certain rulers are also narrated. The names of certain towers and gates in the temple are also recorded. The names of certain Rajas who succeeded Veera Ragavalu and the endowments granted to the temple and the names of the persons who were appointed to look after the trust are recorded. The names of Ramadevaraja of Anagondi and Krishna Deva Raja of Vijayanagar are mentioned in two places. The kaifiyat describes the downfall of Anagondi and Vijayanagar kingdoms. Short history relating to the administration of Srirangapatnam during the reign of Tipu Sultan is also mentioned. The kaifiyat is incomplete. The name of the author is not mentioned.

The names of certain towers and the gates in the temple are also recorded. The other part of the kaifiyat deals with the origin and the history of Srirangapatnam. The endowments granted by Krishna Deva Raya of Vijayanagar and Rama Deva Raya of Anagondi to the temple of Sri Ranganatha of Srirangapatnam are described. The last part of the kaifiyat describes the administration of the temple by certain Rajah and Naick rulers. Since the kaifiyat is incomplete the name of the author or the dates for any occurrences are not mentioned. The kaifiyat is found in four different places.

The Rulers of Vijayanagar are said to have granted extensive lands as endowments to this temple for performing daily pujas and annual festivals. The names of certain Rajas and other persons, who either granted endowments or constructed additional buildings to the temples are also mentioned.

The island of Srirangapatnam in Mysore is also mentioned in the record. The topography of the island is very briefly narrated. Since the kaifiyat is incomplete the name of the author and the sources of information obtained for recording this are not mentioned.

A short biographical sketch of Vikrama Rayalu, Veera Chandra Rayalu and the Second Ganga Rajulu, is narrated in the second part. The construction of Shankara Linga Patnam and the temple of Sri Neelakanta and that of Sri Ranganatha are also very graphically described. The origin of the Udayars of Mysore and short history relating to Krishna Raya Udayar, Narasa Raja Udayar, Rama Raja Udayar, Doda Deva Rajulu Udayar and Chick Devarajulu Udayar are mentioned. Chick Deva Raja Udayar was responsible for the springing up of Bangalore. He with the help of two Maratha paligars Jeogi Ghanlake and Nimbogi Patnaick improved Bangalore. The wars that were fought between the Rajas of Vijayanagar and the Naick rulers are very concisely reported.

The temple of Sri Ranganatha and the endowments granted by both the Hindu Rajas and by Hyder and Tippu are shortly described. Since the kaifiyat is incomplete the name of the author or the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat are not recorded. Dates as per Shalivahana Era are provided while describing certain important events.

This kaifiyat appears on the 107th folio of this volume. The handwriting is fair and legible. The first and some folios in the end are missing. This record deals with the history of Srirangapatnam and some of the temples in it and the origin and history of the construction of the Fort walls and towers at Bangalore by Hyder Ali Khan and Tippu Sultan.

It is stated in the first two pages that Tipu Sultan fortified Bangalore by constructing the existing Fort. Certain main gates and towers are also mentioned with their names. Tipu also constructed certain palacial buildings for his use and for his civil and military officials. Those buildings are also described. Later after the defeat and death of Tipu by Col. Wallis of the East India Company handed over the abovesaid buildings to the custody of the military officers.

During the rule of Hyder, it is stated that he laid down a very big garden at enormous cost and labour and called it as "Dault Bag" afterwards known as Lal Bag. The description of the Garden and the Masjids, and the endowments granted for the upkeep of the Garden and the Masjids are also narrated. The construction of certain town extensions such as "Shar Ganzam" and the "Id" Masjid are said to be most important. Tipu during his rule improved the temple buildings of Sri Ranganatha and Sri Gangadharaswami at Srirangapatam and Narsimha Swami and Varahaswami at Bangalore. He renewed the old grants and granted fresh endowments for carrying out the worships in more splendid and elaborate way. The topography of certain villages are also mentioned. The dates in Saliwahana Era are recorded for important things such as the construction of the Daulat Daria Bag (Lal Bag) and the construction of towers and fort walls at Bangalore. Since the kaifiyat is incomplete, the name of the author and the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat or the date on which this was recorded are not mentioned.

This record relating to the history of the temple of Sri Venkateswara Swami, the Seshachala mountains and the Chandra Pushkarni at Tirupati, begins on the first folio of this volume. The folios are in loose condition. The handwriting is fair and legible. The topography of Seshachalla hills is also recorded. The origin of Chandrapushkarni and how it became the important tank at Tirupathi is briefly described. The temple is said to have been under the management of the Rulers of Kalahasti. Ranganatha Raja of Kalahasti is said to have granted extensive endowments and constructed additional buildings and gopurams to the temples. Ranganatha Thondaman is said to be responsible for reconstituting the temple management and for conducting systematized worships both in day and night and for celebrating fortnightly, monthly and annual festivals in the temple. The names of certain geers who were managing the temples at Tirupathi are mentioned. The names of certain Nawabs who have contributed for the worships of Sri Venkateswar are mentioned. The Rulers of Anagondi are said to have constructed many mantapams and choultries both at Tirupathi and Tiruchanoor, and also granted endowments for these two temples. Though the kaifiyat is a complete one, neither the name of the author nor the scribe or the sources of information obtained for recording this record is mentioned.

This work begins on the first folio of this volume. The handwriting is fair and legible. The entire volume is reconditioned. This kaifiyat contains sixteen complete chapters relating to the history of the Bonsles and the wife of Shivaji the Great. Each chapter begins with a prayer of prelude to the foregoing chapter. The kaifiyat is recorded in the form of questions and explanations. In the end of each chapter the name of the composer of this work is mentioned. It is stated that this is a true translation of the Sanskrit "Shiva Bharat" in Marathi recorded in Modi script. The original author of the work is a Brahmin named "Paramandah", resident of Benares. It is stated on the first page that this record was procured from Reddy Rao, a Brahmin on the 2nd December 1802. The place from where this manuscript was secured is not mentioned. In this work Shivaji is personified as an incarnation of the God.

The first two chapters deal with the history of the Bonsle family and brief history of Shivaji. The third and fourth chapters describe the state of the country and the growing powers of the Muslims. The other chapters describe the life of Shivaji, his boyhood, his conquests of certain Hill forts, encounters with the Moghuls, and battles and sieges and the record ends describing the defeat and death of Afsal Khan. The rest of the history of Shivaji is not provided. The name of the scribe or the person who translated these sixteen chapters is also not recorded.

The kaifiyat contains 16 chapters but begins with the third chapter relating to the origin and the history of the Bonsles and the wife of Shivaji the Great. Each chapter begins with a prayer and prelude to the foregoing chapter. The kaifiyat is recorded in the form of questions and explanations. In the end of each chapter the name of the author "Pramandha Kavi" is mentioned. The subject-matter of this record is the same as explained in the foregoing kaifiyat, with slight difference in wordings. This is also a translation of Sanskrit Shiva Bharat in Marathi recorded in Modi script. The last chapter ends with describing the defeat and death of Afsal Khan. The name of scribe is not mentioned.

This kaifiyat appears on the 40th folio of this volume. The handwriting is fair and legible. The folios are reconditioned and some of them are in faded condition. and at some places the handwriting has become invisible. This Kaifiyat should have contained a large number of chapters and out of them the first five chapters are available in this volume. It is stated that the history of the life of Shivaji and his ancestors was told by kavi Bramhanada as per the request of the residents of Benares. The date on which the history was narrated is not provided. Each chapter begins with a small prayer and with a short introduction of the foregoing chapter. This seems to be a translation of the original Sanskrit Shiva Bharat in Marathi and recorded in Modi characters. The name of the scribe or the date on which the translation was effected is not provided the kaifiyat begins with the condition of the country and the conquest of the Moghals and describes the origin and the history of the Bonsles. The marriage of Shaji with Jigjabai and the birth of Shivaji and his boyhood. The descriptions are lucid. The conquests of Shivaji, and his successes in his territorial conquests are described in the second chapter. The kaifiyat ends with the description of one of the marriages of Shivaji. The name of the scribe and the dates for the occurrences mentioned in the kaifiyat are not provided. The kaifiyat is incomplete.

This work begins on the first folio of this volume. The handwriting is fair and legible. This kaifyat describes the origin and the rise and fall of an important city in the province of Tellingana. A Raja named Thrisangu on his way to a pilgrimage is said to have seen a beautiful image of Shiva Linga and as per the instructions he received from the God, he constructed a beautiful city and called it as Hari Kottah. The kaifyat further describes the appearance of a strange conch in a well attached to the temple. The kaifyat describes briefly how this city was conquered by the Moghals, the Nawabs, the Marathas, the Naiks and finally by the East India Company. In the beginning it is stated that this kaifyat was recorded from the oral information provided by the village officers and by certain old residents of this city. Neither the name of the author nor the scribe or the dates are provided.

The handwriting is fair and legible and certain corrections are made at some places. The episode of bridging the gulf at Rameswaram by Sri Rama is described in the beginning. It is stated that Sri Rama during his return voyage from Lanka, constructed a temple for two Shiva Lingas near the well situated in the temple of Sri Panduranga at Sri Harikotta where the conch explained in the previous kaifiyat was causing havoc to the city of Harikotta. The reason for consecrating two Shiva Lingas in one temple is described. The topography of the town and the sea near it and the history relating to the customs and habits of the inhabitants of this place is also mentioned. The names of certain rulers who ruled this place is provided. It is described that this place is an uninhabited place with two desolate temples with a number of inscriptions on the stone walls of the temples. This kaifiyat is said to have been prepared from the information gathered from the inscriptions in the temples. Neither the name of author nor that of the scribe is mentioned. There is nothing important except the description of the town and the legends.

This kaifiyat appears on the 714 th page of this volume. The handwriting is fair and legible. A large number of words are mis-spelt and badly punctuated. This seems to be a part of the kaifiyat described in D. No. 225. The kaifiyat begins with describing the origin and the history of the Marathas. It is stated that originally Sattara was a hilly place used as an ambush by the Marathas in attacking the Moghals. The life of Sivaji is also graphically described. It is stated that one Sydoji Holkar was chiefly responsible for the construction of the forts at Sattara. The history relating to the disputed succession to the Maratha throne by Rajaram and Satana is very graphically described. The condition of Satara and Poona during the period of Peshwas is also recorded. The genealogy of the Bonsle family who ruled at Satara is provided. Short sketches relating to certain Maratha chiefs and that of Balaji Nana Fadnavis and Savai Mahadev Rao are noted. In the end it is recorded that this kaifiyat was in possession of an elderly gentleman Mack[Deshpande] resident of Poona. As per the special request of Col. namedenzie a copy is said to have been prepared by Deshpande and was despatched to Mysore on the 12th April 1806. A word "Rangappa" can be observed in the end of this record.

This kaifiyat begins on the 126th folio of this volume. The handwriting is fair and legible. This kaifiyat describes the origin and the history of a fort known as Sadasiva Gad. A short history relating to the defeat and death of Ramachandra Naick by the Bijapur Sultan is narrated. Sadasiva Naick, the son of Ramachandra Naick, is said to have fled to the north and with the help of his followers constructed certain towns and fortress. Out of them Sadasiva Gad was more prominent. During the rule of Indu Sadasiva Naick, the Europeans are said to have attacked Indu Sadasiva Naick and a treaty was effected between them. The kaifiyat further explains that Hyderali Khan during his territorial conquests, attacked and defeated Indu Sadasiva Naick and he was deprived of all the forts. It is stated that Sadasiva Naick made treaty with the East India Company and thereby captured his forts except Sadasiva Gad. The Marathas and Tippu in succession had the fort in their possession. Finally the East India Company had a decisive victory over Tippu Sultan and after his death in the Second Mysore war Sadasiva Gad became the absolute property of the East India Company. The dates for all the events explained in the kaifiyat are provided as per Salivahana Calendar. Neither the name of the author nor the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat is mentioned. The topography of Sadasiva Gad is also provided.

This work begins on the 66th folio of this volume. The handwriting is fair and legible. The pages have become brown and brittle. This kaifiyat describes the origin and the history of the Sindhe family. It is stated the Sivaji Sindhe, married Voorna Bai and had Ranoji Sindhe who afterwards became the trusted friend to Shau II. Ranoji is said to have been appointed as a shoe bearer to Baji Rao. This Ranoji had three sons, namely, Jaiaji Sindhe, Dathaji Sindhe and Annada Rao Sindhe. Campaigns were led by Ranoji Sindhe for territorial conquests during Baji Rao's in S.S. 1678. The kaifiyat further explains the accession of Balaji Rao and the circumstances that led to the death of Ranoji Sindhe. Balaji with the help of Sindhe, Holkar and Powar captured Udayapur. Short history relating to the life of Dathaji Sindhe and Magadeyis Sindhe are also given. The services rendered by Janakoji Sindhe along with Sadasiva Rao Bahoo and Visvasa Rao against the Moghals and the battles that were fought at Paniput and Sonaput are very concisely described. The kaifiyat further describes the policy adopted by the East India Company in settling the jurisdiction of the territories of the Sindhes. In the end it is stated that all the information required for recording this kaifiyat was obtained from a very old

and respectable gentleman named Regunatha Rao, resident of Poona, and as per the special request of Col. Mreekenzie. This is said to have been completed in Saliwahana Saka 1728. Neither the name of the author nor that of the scribe is mentioned. All the dates are recorded as per Saliwahana Calendar. This kaifiyat was completed on the 10th April 1806.

The kaifiyat contains one hundred and sixty-four pages wherein the endowments granted by the Maratha rulers to their trustworthy commanders and well wishers are mentioned. The handwriting is fair and legible. The record is written on either sides in some of the folios in the beginning only. In the first folio, it is recorded in English and in Telugu stating that this record was transcribed from the original as per orders of one Narayana Rao. This grant issued by the Maratha rulers begins with the Jagir granted to one Nelakanta Mahadev Purandera. The names of the villages and

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the Taluk to which they belong and the revenue in cash received from the Jagir lands are mentioned. Regupath Rao Narayana Raja Bahadur, Regunath Rao Balawanth, Ganapath Rao Bhikaji, Chinthaman Hari, Chandra Rao Powar and Amarsing Jadav are the persons to whom a large number of villages were granted as Jagir. It is stated that this record was executed in fasli 1204 at Poona. Besides these Jagirs, some cash payments from certain villages were granted as charitable endowments to certain religious institutions and individuals for their maintenance. In the last folio certain words are written between certain lines. The Sanad bears neither the signature of the executor nor the royal seal.

The other works in this volume are described in D. No. 10.

This kaifiyat appears on the 148th page of this volume. The handwriting is fair and legible.

The folios are not properly arranged and bound. This same kaifiyat appears in more than two places in this volume. This document contains a rather full historical detail of the Marathas established at Poona. At the beginning Savayi Mahadeva Rao is represented as enquiring into the past history of the rulers of Poona which is narrated to him by the author; and this is said to have occurred in the year Annanda. The kaifiyat describes how Sivaji Mahadeva Rao and Sadasiva Bahoo with their armies attacked the Moghals and defeated them at Kolapur. The author explains how Shivaji became the honoured leader of the Marathas and his encounters with the Moghals. The death of Shivaji and accession of Sambaji and his defeat, capture, trial and beheading by Aurangazeeb are very graphically narrated. The release of

Shau, the wars of succession that were fought in the Maharashtra and the rise of the Peshwas, form the contents of the following few pages. The part played by Visvanatha Rao, Baji Rao, Balaji Baji Rao, Chimaji Appa is also described. This entire record illustrating the history of the Marathas, from the time of Shivaji is of considerable historical importance. The dates for the episodes such as encounters, defeats and success, capturing and surrendering forts by the Marathas are provided in Salivahana Era. The kaifiyat neither bears the name of the author nor the sources of information obtained for recording this historic kaifiyat.

This kaifiyat begins on the 15th page of this volume. The handwriting is fair and legible, and the first few pages are missing. Moreover the folios in this volume are not properly arranged. This kaifiyat begins with explaining the expeditions that were led by Sadasiva Rao Bhoo and Chimaji Appa, against Nizam ul Mulk. Description of the marches of the armies of both sides, the sieges and the battles that were fought and the results of the wars is long and vivid. The subsequent chapters deal with the minutes maintained by Baji Rao Peshwa

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in his court. The kaifiyat further explains the life of certain Maratha chiefs and officers such as Ramachandra Shanavi, Ragoji Bhonsle, Mahadaji Shindhe, Murari Rao Ghorpade and some other Moghul chiefs. The Carnatic and the Deccan expeditions by Baji Rao forms the subject matter of further few pages. The places of importance and the sacred shrines and temples that Baji Rao visited during his expedition are mentioned and special references are made to his visits to the Venkateswara Temple at Tirupathi, Venkatagiri, Vellore, Arcot, Trichinopoly and Tinnevely. Baji Rao is said to have granted jewels of great value and created an endowment for celebrating a day's festival during the annual festival of Sri Venkateswaraswami of Tirupathi.

The last few pages explain the domestic incidents such as the death of Shau, Baji Rao and Chimaji Appa. The wars that were waged by Sadasiva Rao Baboo and Nanna Rao with Nizam ul Mulk and the wars that were fought with Nazur Jung are mentioned. This kaifiyat contains many important unpublished historic facts. Since the kaifiyat is incomplete, it is not possible to state either the name of the author or the sources of information obtained for recording this narration. Dates for certain important occurrences are mentioned in Shali-wahana Era.

This kaifiyat begins on the first folio of this volume. The handwriting is fair and legible. The kaifiyat is in the form of answers to questions by a Rishi to his disciples wherein the origin of Bijapur and Devagiri is explained. It is stated that these two towns were in existence from time immemorial under various names and ruled by various dynasties. The author of this narration describes more graphically from the days of the Maratha rulers. The inhabitants of these two places are said to be the Maratha farmers and shepherds. The kaifiyat describes the topography of the places. The kaifiyat narrates how a shepherd Ramoji Gakewad was responsible for constructing the fortress of Bijapur and Devagiri. A short description of the Gakewad family is also mentioned. The life of Hemad Pandit, the originator of Modi script, how he assisted the Gakewad in carrying out the civil and military operations is briefly narrated. The invasion of the Arabs, the Turks and the Moghals, the names of the rulers and the period they ruled are recorded as per Shaliwahana Calendar. The original Hindu names of certain towns near Bijapur and Devagiri and the names of the towns which the Moghals renamed after their capture are also provided. The kaifiyat further explains the pilgrim centres and holy shrines. The names of the rulers who constructed the temples and the endowments they granted are also mentioned. Some of the verses from the stone inscriptions found in those temples are mentioned. The routes for ascending certain hills for visiting certain places where sacred shrines are situated are recorded. Though this kaifiyat bears neither the name of the author nor the original records, it is stated that all the information alluded to in the narration was obtained from two very old and respectable residents of Bijapur named Keshava Bhat and Ramoji. This kaifiyat is said to have been recorded as per the special request of Col. Mackenzie and was transcribed by Narayana Rao and finished on the 25th February 1806 at Aurangabad.

This kaifiyat begins on the 167th folio of this volume. The folios are damaged and in loose condition. The handwriting is fair and legible. The first few folios describe certain episodes from Ramayanam. It is stated that the towns such as Bijapur, Devagiri and Doulatabad were in existense even in prehistoric days, with different names. Those names are also mentioned. Chronological account of the Hindu rulers and the period they ruled is given. The name of the last Hindu Ruler who ruled at Bijapur before it was conquered by the Sultans is given as Rama Deva Gakewad. He is said to have been defeated by Sultan Nizam Sha. The genealogy of the Sultans and the period they ruled at Bijapur is also provided. The topography of Bijapur and Devagiri and the pilgrim centres and temples and the names of the Hindu Rajas who were responsible for constructing and endowing them with grants and inscribing them on the stone walls of certain temples is given. The history of the Sultans of Bijapur beginning from Sultan Thokalak Badusha to the last ruler Mahamedsha Badhusha mentioning the administration and the territorial conquests they made is described. In the end of the narration it is stated that these two places were annexed by the Marathas for a time being and the annexation with the Maratha Federation said to have been completed during the days of Sadashiva Rao Bahu.

It is stated that the information for recording this kaifiyat was obtained from an elderly Koolkarni Kandoji Appa and Bhima Bhit, both residents of Bijapur. This kaifiyat is said to have been recorded on the 25th February 1806, at Aurangabad, as per the special request of Col. Mackenzie.

This kaifiyat appears on the 695th folio of this volume. The hand-
writing is fair and legible but a number of words mis-spelt and badly
punctuated can be observed in the record. This seems to be a transcrip-
tion of a portion from a very long record dealing with the history of the
Hindu rulers of Solar race. Though it is stated that this kaifiyat deals
with the Hindu rulers of Solar race, a large number of mythological
legends from Ramayana and Mahabaratha are included. The origin of
certain pre-historic Hindu Solar rulers such as Harischandra, etc., is
narrated. Certain fables such as killing a demon or a ruler becoming
an ascetic are very elaborately described. The last few pages of the
kaifiyat describe briefly the history of Shaliwahana and Vikramaditya.
The history of the early Cholas, Pandyas and Cheras and some of the
meritorious deeds they did during the period they ruled are also very
briefly described. Though this is a very long kaifiyat, it may be consi-
dered to contain less historic facts. Neither the name of the author
nor the source of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat is
provided. Dates are mentioned in Shaliwahana Era for the number
of years certain rulers lived. In the end of the kaifiyat the signature
of the scribe can be noted.

The handwriting is fair and legible, certain folios are wrongly numbered and slips of paper are pasted on them from being further damaged. In the first folio it is stated that this kaifiyat was transcribed as per the instructions of Col. Mackenzie, and it is further stated that this work was completed by one Venkata Rao, a clerk under Col. Mackenzie. Though the year of completion is mentioned as 1820, the month and the date is not provided. This kaifiyat describes the origin and the history of two states, namely, Surapur and Gooty. The originator of these two places is said to be one Veera Nambi Naick. This Veera Nambi Naick a resident and influential person residing at Vishnu Kanchi migrated to Shiva Kanchi first and then settled himself on the banks of the Krishna and expanded his territorial jurisdiction up to the banks of Thungabadra. The kaifiyat further deals with the genealogy of the abovesaid Naick. These two cities are said to have been stormed and captured by the Nawab of Hooligal, a feudatory to the Sultan of Bijapur. The fall of the Sultan of Bijapur and the rise of the Marathas and how these two towns were acquired by the Marathas are very graphically described. The major part of the latter portion of the kaifiyat deals with the history of the period of the Peshwas, wherein the visit of the Peshwa Savai Mahadeva Rao and Nana Fadnavis to Gooty is mentioned. The kaifiyat mentions two personalities,

Lingappa Naick and Chockappa Naick who were appointed by the Savai Mahadeva Rao to rule over these provinces. The topography of these two places is also mentioned. The names of the villages and the names of the Zamindars in these two places are also mentioned. The last few pages of this record deals with the names of the persons to whom lands were granted by the Naick and Maratha rulers as free gift. The dates for certain important occurrences are provided in Saliwahana Era. The kaifiyat neither mentions the name of the author or the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat. This record contains a large number of historic facts relating not only to the Naick rulers but also of the Peshwas.

This volume contains two Maratha kaifiyats recorded in Modi script and the rest are Telugu records. This kaifiyat begins on the 84th folio of this volume. The handwriting is fair and legible and the record is written with Indian Ink on hand-made country paper. The description of the origin and the history of Sondur and its Maratha rulers is the subject-matter of this kaifiyat. The manuscript at the outset describes the genealogy of the descendents of Moloji Ghorpade, a commander in the service of the Sultan of Bijapur. It is stated that his three sons

Sambaji, Bhirji and Maloji joined the ranks of Shau, the grandson of Shivaji, the Great. The kaifiyat describes the circumstances and the divinely help Bhirji had, whereby he got a precious image of Shiva and a big treasure trove by which he was able to organise an army. The subsequent folios describe the territorial expansions made by Santaji Ghorpade with the help of his son Morari Rao Ghorpade, the founder of the Sondur State. The history of Morari Rao and his successors, the invasion of Hyder and Tippu and the loss of Sandur and how it was recaptured by the Marathas under the leadership of Savai Mahadeva Rao is briefly narrated. The kaifiyat makes mention of the part played by Nana Fadnavis and Sadashiva Rao Bahoo. The province of Sandur is said to have been captured by the East India Company during the Second Anglo-Maratha war. As per the treaty of Bassien the Fort of Sandur was returned to Shiva Rao Ghorpade, the adopted son and successor of Morari Rao Ghorpade. The topography of Sandur and Gooty, the temples and shrines and such other places of antiquity is given. The transliteration of a Marathi inscription in Telugu, recorded on one of the stone walls of a temple whereby the grant of a Jagir to Ramappa Naick was made by the Maratha ruler of Sandur may be seen on the 4th page of the manuscript. This kaifiyat is said to have been transcribed by Narayana Rao, an assistant under Ward by a paimash officer in the service of Col. Mackenzie and the transcription is said to have been completed on the 8th December 1809. The dates for the various facts mentioned in the Mss are recorded in Saliwahana Era. The kaifiyat provides neither the name of the author nor the sources of information obtained for recording the same.

This kaifiyat begins on the 46th folio of this volume. The folios are damaged both at the bottom and at the edges of the right hand side margin. The handwriting is fair and legible, but the folios are not correctly numbered. The record describes the origin and the history of two places, namely, Sonai and Chincholi on the banks of river Sonai. The beginning is legendary. This town and the river running beside it are said to have derived the name "Sonai", for a Rishi of similar name lived in this place which was formerly a wilderness. The topography of these two places is briefly given. The names of the temples and the population residing in them and such other particulars of local interest are also provided. The Jagirdar Babuji Amil was responsible for constructing a fort in Jagir which was subsequently attached and taken possession by Doulat Rao Sindhe. The record provides neither the dates for the events narrated nor the name of the author, but the materials for recording this kaifiyat are said to have been gathered from Koolkarni Damaji an old resident of Sonai.

This record appears on the 167th folio of this volume. The folios are in detached condition with perforations effected by microbes. The handwriting is fair and legible and at few places words are recorded between the lines. Fables and facts appear to be blended in the first portion of this account. Legendary statements regarding towns and the

rulers in the first three ages till the commencement of Shaliwahana in the fourth age Kaliyuga are described. The various avatars of Sri Maha Vishnu and the names of the persons whom he killed to protect the world are narrated. The names of the Hindu Rulers and the period they ruled up to their defeat by the Moghals forms the subject-matter of the second part of the record. The last part of the record explains the Bhonsales and other Maratha families. The birth of Shivaji and his achievements in the wars he fought against Aurangazeb and his coronation at Raigar and how he established the Maratha confederacy are stated very briefly. The history of Vijayanagar rulers up to the downfall of Rama Raya is also mentioned. The names of Saints who lived during the period of Shivaji, forms the last part of the kaifiyat. This kaifiyat is said to have been copied from the original owned by Ramanda Baba, a Brahman residing at Boodawarpet, Poona, as per the instructions issued by Col. Mackenzie and was furnished and despatched to him on 10th May 1806.

This kaifiyat begins on the 95th folio of this volume. The handwriting is fair and legible. This record describes the history of the ancestry of Syed Yakub and the life sketch of Yakub himself. Syed Abdul Hie, the grandfather of Yakub is said to have been residing at Bijapur for a long time. During the invasion of Aurangazeb against the Sultan of Bijapur, Abdul Hie with his five sons emigrated to Baswapatnam where

Dilwar Khan was ruling. His eldest son became a fakir and the miracles he did are also explained. Hyder Ali of Mysore invited Asaraf Sha, the fakir to his country and Sayed Yakub, the eldest of son the fakir, was given a post in the army. Sayed Yakub rose to eminence during the days of Tipu Sultan. The record describes the circumstances in which Sayed Yakub was directed to leave Mysore once for all by Tipu Sultan. Sayed Yakub then came to Madras and stayed at Mylapore for some time. It is stated that he approached the commander of the forces of the East India Company, to help them in defeating Tipu. So a large army under the combined command of Lord Walis and Yakub attacked and besieged Srirangapatam. Sayid furnished all the information and weak points in the fort of Srirangapatam and thereby the army of the East India Company defeated Tipu Sultan and captured Srirangapatam. As a mark of appreciation Yakub was granted a small Jagir by the East India Company. The kaifiyat provides neither the dates for the events alluded to nor the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat or the name of the author or the scribe. In conclusion it is stated that this kaifiyat was prepared from certain sanads.

This record appears on the 74th folio. The handwriting is fair and legible, but the folios have become brown and brittle. This kaifiyat deals about the origin and the history of a town Hamahali by name belonging to the State of Mysore. Episodes from Ramayana and Mahabaratha are quoted in the beginning. The kaifiyat furnishes certain names of the rulers belonging to various dynasties. The first historic name used in the narration is that of Someswara Raja of Vijayanagar dynasty. It is stated that he visited the hills Roopagiri and finding the old temple of Janardanaswami, renovated the construction and founded a town and this town was then come to be known as Hamahali. It is also stated that another town Brahmapuri is also the construction of Someswara and a Sanad granting the entire town as gift to Brahmins is also mentioned. The names of the descendants of Someswara who ruled at Hamahali and the dates of their accession and death are given as per Saliwahana Calendar. This place was annexed to Vijayanagar by Krishna Raja. During his regime, it is stated that the unruly paligars were checked and brought under control by Narsim Raja. Subsequently the kaifiyat mentions that the abovesaid two places were conquered by Hyder of Mysore and then they became absolute property of the East India Company, after the death and defeat of Tippu Sultan at Srirangapatam. The kaifiyat neither mentions the name of the author nor the scribe or the information obtained for recording this narration.

This record begins on the 274th folio of this volume. The hand writing is fair and legible. This seems to be a detached portion of a continuous work and the first 32 pages are missing in the beginning. Moreover the folios are not properly arranged and bound. The first four chapters are recorded continuously and the rest of the kaifiyat appears elsewhere in the volume. This incomplete work describes the origin and the history of the first Bamani Ruler, Hassan Imam Gangu Boi Imam and that of the Devagiri fort. Besides these the origin and history of some of the important personalities who were responsible for the expansion of the Bamani Kingdom and the springing up of some of the important cities during the latter period of the Bamani rulers. It is stated that Hasan was a boy of poor parentage and while he was a youth he became an ardent disciple of a Muslim saint. The episode relating the treatment received by Hasan from the hands of the Muslim saint and the blessings he obtained from the saint is explained very elaborately. The kaifiyat describes that Hasan and his Brahmin master with the help of persons such as Veera Gonda and Balal Ray took possession of some of the towns from the Vijayanagar Empire which was then dwindling to pieces. In the third Chapter, the name of the Muslim saint is mentioned. He was known as Hajarat Bahadusha. In commemoration of the blessings that Hasan received he constructed a town and named it Jafar Bad and presented it to the saint. The territorial expansions made by Hasan and his wars with the native Nayak rulers are very elaborately described. The list showing forts and the towns that were constructed by Hasan is provided. The kaifiyat bears neither the name of the author nor the scribe. The dates for the various occurrences mentioned in the record are not given.

This kaifiyat describes vividly the military equipments Hassan utilised for his territorial conquests in the south. The biography of Sambaji Anath and Anthaji pant the two trusted Maratha Brahmin friends and advisers of Hassan is given. The record explains the episode relating to the causes that led to the execution of Sambaji Annath. The revolts and the civil wars that broke out in the Bamani Kingdom and how it was ably put down by Kutub Sha is also narrated. The military expeditions that were carried out by Antaji Panth form the subject-matter of the last few folios. In the end of the record it is stated that this was copied from an original document maintained in the court of Hassan which was in possession of a gentlemen. This kaifiyat is said to have been transcribed by Narayana Rao, as per the order of Col. Mackenzie and was finished on the 15th January 1817. The dates for the various occurrences alluded to in this kaifiyat are not provided.

The names of the Hindu rulers who lived in the Shaliwahana and Vikrama eras at Delhi in succession are also provided. The origin and the history of the Vijayanagar Kingdom and the names of the rulers from Hari Hara up to the last ruler Narayanapuram Venkatapathi Rayalu and the period each Raja ruled is mentioned. The kaifiyat further explains the downfall of the Vijayanagar Kingdom and the rise of the Moghals. The history of the Marathas and the names of the rulers who annexed Delhi up to the final annexation by the East India Company forms the last point of the kaifiyat. List showing the names of the Subhas and the names of the Subedars appointed by the Moghal rulers in the province of Delhi and the net revenue collected from each subha is also provided. In the end it is stated that this record was transcribed from the original, which was in possession of Narayana Rao residing at Pandaripur. The transcription is said to have been done by Venkata Rao, a Subordinate under Col. Mackenzie.

The second portion of the record describes the origin and the history of the Vijayanagaram Kingdom up to its final conquest and annexation by the Sultan of Bijapur. The next few pages describe the condition of Delhi during the rule of Aurangazeb. The third portion of the kaifiyat describes the rise and growth of the Maratha power under Shivaji. The capture of Samhaji and his trial and execution is very graphically narrated. The last portion of the record describes the last days of Aurangazeeb and the wars of succession that were fought between Rajaram and Shau for the Maratha throne. Here the kaifiyat ends. Since the pages in the end are missing it is not possible to give out either the name of the author or the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat. The dates for the events described herein are also not provided.

The life of the Muslim Saints and peers, the miracles they performed and the places where they died are also briefly described. This record further gives out the names of the persons who received endowments and jagirs from the Moghal rulers of Delhi. The history of the Bijapur Sultans and the rise of the Marathas and the names of the forts that were constructed by Shivaji and the dates of the wars and battles that were fought between Shivaji and Aurangzeb are very graphically explained. The Kaifiyat provides the chronology of the Muslim rulers of Delhi beginning from Akbar to Aurangzeb. The history of the Carnatic Nawabs and the Sultans of Bijapur and a brief account of certain Peshwas are also described. The kaifiyat ends with the 29th folio. The record gives neither the name of the author nor the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat.

The list begins from the year Raktaksi and the first ruler whose history is mentioned is Raja Raja Sri Chand. In the last folio, a consolidated list showing the names of the dynasties the number of years they ruled at Hastinapuri is described. The kaifiyat bears neither the name of the author nor the sources of information obtained for recording this record.

seems to be a transcription of a part of long Modi document wherein the origin and the history of certain Hindu rulers of Solar and Lunar race is described. The life of Vikramadita and Shaliwahana are also briefly told. The kaifiyat describes the rulers of the Chola dynasty and the number of years each ruled. The names of the rulers of Yadawa dynasty and that of the Vijianagar are narrated. The fall of the Hindu States in the South and the spread of the Moghals rule by the Sultans of Bijapur and the Emperor of Delhi and the period ruled by each Sultan is also explained. The kaifiyat merely describes the name of the Hindu and Mohamoden rulers and the period they ruled and no other historic occurrences that occurred during their regime are not described. All the years are quoted in the Shaliwahana era. In the end it is stated that this record was copied from some old accounts and was despatched to Col. Mackenzie. The name of the author or the person who possessed this record and such other particulars are not provided.

folio and the other portion on the 686th folio. This record seems to describe some accounts relating to the fortress of Balala Raya Durga at Hebahali in the Mysore State. This fort is said to have been constructed by Veerabalaraya Raya. A short history of Veerabalala and how generous he was in granting inams and jagirs is also mentioned. The kaifiyat further explains the temples constructed by Balala Raya. The topography of both the places and the cultivations that were made in these places are explained. The other part of the kaifiyat recorded in 68th folio explains the invasion of Delhi Badusha and the defeat of Balala Raya. The name of the Badusha is not mentioned but the war that was fought between the two is very elaborately described. A list of temples and shrines constructed by Balala Raya is given. Neither the name of the author nor the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat is provided.

The perforations caused by micrales may be observed throughout the record. Though the kaifiyat is called as Hemada Pant kaifiyat, very little information about the person, who originated the Modi script is given. The kaifiyat begins in the form of a question by Adil Shai Bahadusha requesting Hemada Pant to describe the origin and the history of Fort Panahal. Hemada Pant is said to have described the origin and the

history of the fortress. The first few pages of the record describe the encounter between a big cobra and certain mendicant. The origin of the cobra is also mentioned. The mendicants got information from the cobra about certain hidden treasures in a tank. They with the help of an orphan tried to unearth the treasures. The kaifiyat describes that the prudent boy escaped with the treasures and constructed certain small forts. The name of the boy cannot be made out. This man is said to have constructed the temple of Goddess Bhavani which was later worshipped as the tutelary deity of Shivaji the Great. The kaifiyat provides no dates for the occurrences explained in it. This record is said to be in possession by Narayanji of Khand taluk in Joonar district. As per the special request of Col. Mackenzie this was transcribed by Narayana Rao and was finished on the 13th January 1807. The name of the author or the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat is not provided.

This record appears on the 95th folio of this volume. The handwriting is fair and legible ; but the folios are damaged by microbes. The first two folios describe the origin and the history of a temple dedicated to Ramalingeswaraswami and the circumstances that led the priest

of the temple to collect certain taxes. This temple is said to be situated in a dense forest. It is also described that the above priest got hold of a big tiger. The priest collected the taxes and constructed certain buildings and then a small fort. This place was then called as Bidamoor. The topography of the village is also narrated. The kaifiyat further describes that during the rule of Anangapala it was annexed to his territory. The second part of the kaifiyat describes the reigns of Anangapala, Vishnu Vardhana, and his brother Vindiarthi. The spread of Jainism during the rule of Anangapala and how the Jain monks tried to establish their faith at Bidanoor is very elaborately described. The details relating to circumstances that led to the construction of the temple of Hoyesala Iswara and the tanks near by, in the province of Bidanoor is very elaborately narrated. The record further describes the biography of Jackanachari, Bala Devaraya, and Veera Bala Raya. The kaifiyat mentions neither the name of the author or the scribe nor the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat. No dates for any of the episodes mentioned are provided. Some information regarding Sevapa Naick is provided in the end.

This seems to be a transcription of an original and in the end the name of the scribe is noted as "Rangappa." This kaifiyat explains the origin and the history of Bidanur in the province of Mysore and the rulers who ruled. It is stated that from the collections of revenue got from the temple of Ramalingeswaraswami, this fort was constructed and later on Anangapala included this in his dominion. The record further explains the life of Ananga Bala, Vishnu Vardahana and certain rulers. The names of certain Jain monks and how they spread Jainism at Bidanur is also explained. The origin and the history of Hosesala Ishwar temple in the province Bidnur is briefly given. The biography of Jakanachari and certain other persons who lived at Bidanur is also mentioned. The kaifiyat contains some other information which has been described in the foregoing kaifiyat. The kaifiyat mentions neither the name of the author nor the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat. The dates for the episode described in it are not provided. This is an incomplete record written by a bad scribe.

The other works in this volume are described in D. No. 131.

This work appears on the first folio of this volume. The handwriting is fair and legible. Some of the folios are in loose condition. This record contains the detailed history of Hyderali Khan and Tipu Sultan. A page or two in the beginning and some pages in the end are

missing. The names of Hyderali's ancestors, and how he rose to eminence from obscurity are specified very graphically. The second portion of the kaifiyat explains his military skill and his promotion as a Subedar. The various slips by which he acquired additional power and set aside former Wodiar ruler of Mysore, and the wars that he fought to establish himself on the throne of Mysore are very elaborately narrated. The names of the wives of Hyder and the way he led his domestic life at Arcot before he came to prominence are also described. The dates for each and every occurrence narrated herein are provided as per Shaliwahana calendar. The second portion of the kaifiyat describes Hyder's relation with the foreigners such as the French and the Dutch and how he disliked the English. The part played by Hyder during the Wars that were fought between the Nawabs of Carnatic and Trichinopoly are very elaborately described. Details for the military equipments Hyder had in his possession and the ability of his administration is also explained.

The third section of this record contains the accession of Tippusultan to the Mysore throne. The record commences with a reference to the seige of Trichinopoly. The capture of certain provinces in the South and the intention of Tipu Sultan to capture the Madras, his negotiation with the Maharatas and how he was successful in keeping off the Maharatas from attacking him are very graphically described. Subsequent folios explain in detail about Tipu's operations, chiefly against the English. His conduct at Vellore and his ill-treatment of the English prisoners, and alliance with the French are also given. The kaifiyat breaks off abruptly without giving full details about the operations which Tipu undertook in his South Indian campaigns. In some places, it is endorsed in English as "Life of Hyder and Tippu." The kaifiyat ends describing the battle between the English and Tippu, wherein it is stated that Tippu was defeated and killed at Srirangapatam ; and the East India Company declared Krishna Deva Raja Wodiyar as the ruler of Mysore. The kaifiyat mentions neither the name of the author nor the sources of information obtained for recording this record.

The record begins on the 2nd folio of this volume. The handwriting is fair and legible. The folios owing to antiquity have turned brown the ink being less bright. The handwriting is fair and legible. The entire kaifiyat is recorded in the chronological order and each historic episode is referred in a separate paragraph. The record begins from the accession of Tipu Sultan to the throne of Mysore, and how he began to reorganise the military power and the other reforms in the State. Subsequently the kaifiyat describes the various battles he fought with the East India Company, the Marattas and the Nawabs of the Carnatic. The treaties he made and the successes and defeats he had during certain campaigns are very graphically described. The name of the day with the date of the month as per Shaliwahana calendar is provided for every episode. The marches, the halts and the retreats he made during his expeditions against the English and instances of like nature are very carefully recorded. The names of the places either he captured or surrendered and the persons who fought on both sides are also recorded. The names of the East India Company officers, the French and the Maratha officers are also alluded to. The part played by the Marattas and the Nawabs of the Arcot are also explained. The last paragraph of the kaifiyat explains the arrangements made by the East India Company in fixing a camp at Bellur. Though the kaifiyat provides very interesting informations about the rule of Hyder and Tippu, neither the name of the author nor the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat is provided. This seems to be a true transcription of a certain portion of a very long record dealing with the history of the Mysore.

Summary.

The initials upon the title page are described in D. No. 127.

The record appears in the fifth page of this volume. The hand-
writing is fair and legible. The paper has become brown and brittle.
Some of the folios are in poor condition and few of them are damaged.
The narrative is divided into several paragraphs each containing the
important historical episode in the life of Hyder and Tipu Sultan. The
facts are arranged in the chronological order and the dates are mentioned
as per the Shalivahana Era. The first three folios describe Hyder's
invasion of Trichinopoly. The strength of the armies on either side
and the battles that were fought are very graphically described. The
second section of the record describes the history of Tipu Sultan. The
struggle between the East India Company and the Sultan is very graphi-
cally described. The relations with the French and the wars fought
against the East India Company are very elaborately explained,
mentioning the matches, battles and the campaigns. The names of the
officers and the strength of the forces on either side are also stated.
The narrative further describes the progress of the war and the places
captured by the East India Company during the siege of St. Louis.

patnam. The last portion of the record describes the arrangements made by the garrison of the East India Company for halting at Beher. Here the Kaifiyat breaks without mentioning the name of the author or the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat.

This volume contains two other works except the one described below. This kaifiyat appears on the 29th folio. The folios are very badly

damaged by microbes and some of the portions have also become brittle. This record contains somewhat a long account of the life and actions of Hyder Ali. In the beginning the origin and the history of a Kali Temple is described. The places where the temple was situated has been damaged and hence it could not be recorded. Formerly this place was said to be a small village known as Golakadavalam whose ruler was a Hindu King. The names of certain Hindu rulers who ruled at this place are recorded in their chronological order. The record further describes briefly the creation of the Subedars of Arcot. The origin and the history of Sri Gangadaraswami Temple at Hazwabad is also briefly explained. The information regarding the temple is said to have been gathered from the Archakas of the temple. The kaifiyat further explains of Hyderali's family connections and rise from the obscurity; and the various steps he contrived to acquire additional power to set aside his former masters. The wars he waged are also specified. His efforts to capture Madras and other belongings of the East India Company, the negotiations he made with the Marathas to keep them off and the peace terms that were demanded by the Marathas are briefly narrated. It seems that certain folios are missing in this record. There is a full specification of his officers, both civil and military, and the districts controlled by them. Mention is made of some of the French officers who extended their support to Hyder. A brief reference is made about the character of Hyder. The kaifiyat neither mentions the name of the author or the scribe or the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat. Dates are provided as per Saliwahana calendar for a few instances.

The kaifiyat appears on the 729th folio. Though the handwriting is fair and legible, a large number of words misspelt and badly punctuated can be observed. This seems to be a transcription of a original work wherein the history of Mysore and its ruler Hyder Ali and Tippu Sultan are described. The contents of this record seem to be the same as described in D. No. 305. A few further informations can be noticed regarding the plans made by Hyder with the French to drive out the East India Company from the shores of Madras. The alliances he formed with the French, and the names of certain officers of the French forces are also mentioned. The facts relating to the life of Hyder are not completely stated but a few passing remarks about his character may be noticed in the end. The campaign he fought with the East India Company and the Marathas are also mentioned. The dates on which the battles were fought or the causes and the results of the battle or the names of the chief persons who were responsible for the above campaigns are not mentioned. The kaifiyat ends stating that Hyder gave instructions for laying out an extensive garden at Bangalore. Neither in name of the author nor of the scribe or the sources of information obtained for recording this kaifiyat is mentioned.

The other works in this volume are described in D. No. 25.

This kaifiyat appears on the 83rd folio of this volume. The handwriting is fair and legible. This record describes the origin and the history of the Holkars, a subsect of the Marathas. Much attention is devoted in describing the history of Mularji Holkar and Yeshavanta Holkar. It is stated that Khandoji Holkar, the first Holkar known to history is said to be the forefather of this historic clan. A farmer by profession, he migrated to Bad Gava in Joonar district. The circumstances that led to his migration is not mentioned. His son Mularji Holkar became a powerful military officer under Shau. The kaifiyat further explains the military campaigns that Mularji Holkar led in the North. The patriotism of Mularji Holkar and his acts of chivalry and the territorial conquests he made and such other historic information are very elaborately narrated. The second portion of the record describes the history of Yeshavanta Holkar. The record gives very little information about the birth and boyhood of this person; the kaifiyat describes the part played by him in the battle of Paniput. The description of the war and the names of the Marathas who contested the Maratha throne between the Peshwa and the Marathas is very elaborately described. The dates are marked for certain important occurrences by Shaliwahana calendar. In the end it is stated that the above kaifiyat was prepared as per the information given by an elderly gentleman named Raghunatha Rao residing at Poona. This kaifiyat is said to have been prepared as per the special request of Col. Mackenzie and was completed on the 10th day of April 1806.
